A Proclamation**

**WHEREAS,** the Holocaust was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and annihilation of European Jewry by Nazi Germany and its collaborators between 1933 and 1945—six million Jews were murdered; Roma (Gypsies), people with disabilities, and Poles were also targeted for destruction or decimation for racial, ethnic, or national reasons; and millions more, including homosexuals, Jehovah's Witnesses, Soviet prisoners of war, and political dissidents, also suffered grievous oppression and death under Nazi tyranny; and

**WHEREAS,** the history of the Holocaust offers an opportunity to reflect on the moral responsibilities of individuals, societies, and governments; and

**WHEREAS,** the people of Vermont will always remember the terrible events of the Holocaust and remain vigilant against hatred, persecution, and tyranny; and

**WHEREAS,** the Days of Remembrance have been set aside for the people of the Vermont to remember the victims of the Holocaust as well as to reflect on the need for respect of all peoples; and

**WHEREAS,** pursuant to an Act of Congress (Public Law 96-388, October 7, 1980), the United States Holocaust Memorial Council designates the Days of Remembrance of the victims of the Holocaust to be Sunday, April 7, through Sunday, April 14, 2013, including the Day of Remembrance known as Yom Hashoah, April 8, 2013;

**NOW, THEREFORE,** I, Peter Shumlin, Governor, do hereby proclaim April 7-14, 2013 as

**DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE**

in Vermont in memory of the victims of the  
Holocaust and in honor of the survivors  
as well as the rescuers and liberators.
