Bravo, Deb. My name is Eric Law and I am the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund (DWSRF) Project Development Specialist. I would like to tell you a quick story when I first arrived here at the Water Supply Division. This would have been in 2004 and bottled water seemed to be everywhere, everywhere that is except the Water Supply Division (WSD).

The WSD hydrogeologists and engineers, the water professionals in our state, know the science all too well and if that isn't enough they survey and regulate the in-state bottled water companies. Unlike the general population savvy marketing couldn't sway these folks. I remember my first visit to a bottled water facility and being impressed by their professionalism, hard work, and pride in their product. I was impressed but certainly not more impressed than the professional, hard-working, and proud municipal and private water operators. The most noteworthy idea I had and still have is that we generally have well-protected and quality drinking water in the State of Vermont. Bottled water has its place, no doubt, but taking everything else into account—waste, transportation, and money—you can't beat tap water.

My coworker, Ashley Lucht, and I work hard to educate Vermonters on the “wise” use of tap water throughout the State, esp. at municipal and private systems which have recently made huge strides improving their respective systems using federal and state monies. A huge investment in both water infrastructure and bottled water is simply not sustainable. Deb, with one stroke of the pen, you and the Governor will make a very important (and for Ashley and I a reinforcing) statement today. I applaud your efforts.
