

TOWN OF RUTLAND, VERMONT ANNUAL REPORT

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2018



This year's town report is dedicated to Richard S. "Dick" Lloyd in recognition of his years of service to our town.



On December 7, 2018, Rutland Town lost a longtime friend. Dick Lloyd held numerous public positions, was a familiar face at local gathering places, and helped a lot of townsfolk.

Not long after settling in Rutland Town in 1968 with his new bride Mary Fran, Dick joined the Rutland Town Fire Department as a firefighter. Dick's enthusiasm for his adopted town led him to run for delinquent tax collector, a post he held for many years until his retirement in 2014. As tax collector, he worked diligently and compassionately with homeowners who had fallen behind on tax payments, negotiating reasonable repayment agreements so the town could get its money and the taxpayers could keep their homes and businesses.

Dick Lloyd was elected—and re-elected many times—to the position of Justice of the Peace. He took his job as JP seriously. He frequently served as ballot clerk and as late-night ballot counter, and delivered sick-ballots to voters too ill to get to the polls.

The Rutland Town Planning Commission benefitted when Dick joined the group. With his long history in the town and his deep knowledge of townspeople, Dick offered a unique prospective during planning sessions and deliberations. He was still serving on the Commission at the time of his death.

If there is one place most closely associated with Dick Lloyd, it's the Rutland Town Transfer Station. Working first with Tony Flory, then with Bill Bauer, Dick rarely missed a Saturday morning or a Wednesday afternoon at the Northwood facility. As station attendant, then manager, Dick oversaw maintenance, operations, repairs and the transfer station budget, and kept up on the latest laws on recycling, waste disposal and reuse. His friendly greeting and wealth of local news made a chat with Dick an imperative part of everyone's weekly dump run.

Richard S. "Dick" Lloyd is survived by his wife Mary Fran, his daughter Heather, his grandson Jacob, many family members, and by the Rutland Town community which he served so well.

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NOTICE TO VOTERS For Local Elections

BEFORE ELECTION DAY:

CHECKLIST POSTED at Clerks Office by February 3, 2019. If your name is not on the checklist, then you must register to vote. **SAMPLE BALLOTS** will be posted by February 13, 2019.

HOW TO REGISTER TO VOTE: There is no deadline to register to vote. You will be able to register to vote on the day of the election. You can register prior to by visiting the town clerk's office or going online to olvr.sec.state.vt.us.

REQUEST EARLY or ABSENTEE BALLOTS: You or a family member can request early or absentee ballots at any time during the year of the election in person, in writing, by telephone or email, or online at mvp.sec.state.vt.us. The latest you can request ballots for the March 5, 2019 Election is the close of the Town Clerk's office on Monday, March 4, 2019. (Any other person authorized by you who is not a family member must apply in writing or in person for a ballot for you.)

WAYS TO VOTE YOUR EARLY BALLOT:

- You may vote in the town clerk's office before the deadline.
- Voter may take his or her ballot(s) out of the clerk's office and return in same manner as if the ballots were received by mail.
- Have ballot mailed to you, and mail or deliver it back to the clerk's office before Election Day or to the polling place before 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.
- If you are sick or disabled before Election Day, ask the town clerk to have two justices of the peace bring a ballot to you at your home. (Ballots can be delivered on any of the eight days preceding the day of the election or on the day of election.)

ON ELECTION DAY:

If your name was dropped from the checklist in error, or has not been added even though you submitted a timely application for addition to the checklist, you can fill out a new registration form.

! If the clerk or Board of Civil Authority does not add your name, you can appeal the decision to a superior court judge, who will settle the matter on Election Day. Call the Secretary of State's Office at 1-800-439-VOTE (439-8683) for more information.

If you are a first time voter who submitted your application to the checklist individually by mail, you must provide a valid Vermont photo identification, or a bank statement, utility bill, or a copy of a government issued document with your name/current address.

If you have physical disabilities, are visually impaired or can't read, you may have assistance from any person of your choice. If any voters you know have disabilities let them know they can have assistance from any person of their choice.

If you know voters who cannot get from the car into the polling place let them know that ballot(s) may be brought to their car by two election officials.

If you have any questions or need assistance while voting, ask your town clerk or any election official for help.

NO PERSON SHALL:

- ! Vote more than once per election, either in the same town or in different towns.
- ! Mislead the board of civil authority about your own or another person's true residency or other eligibility to vote.
- ! Hinder or impede a voter going into or from the polling place.
- ! Socialize in a manner that could disturb other voters in the polling place.
- ! Offer bribe, threaten or exercise undue influence to dictate or control the vote of another person.

FOR HELP OR INFORMATION: Call the Secretary of State's Office at 1-800-439-VOTE (439-8683). (Accessible by TDD)

If you believe that any of your voting rights have been violated, you may file an Administrative Complaint with the Secretary of State's Office, 26 Terrace Street, Montpelier, VT 05609-1101.

If you believe you have witnessed efforts to commit any kind of fraud or corruption in the voting process, you may report this to your local United States Attorney's Office.

If you have witnessed actual or attempted acts of discrimination or intimidation in the voting process, you may report this to the Civil Rights Division of the United States Department of Justice at (800) 253-3931.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR VOTERS using Accuvote Ballots

CHECK-IN AND RECEIVE BALLOTS:

- Go to the entrance checklist table.
- Give name and, if asked, street address to the election official in a loud voice.
- Wait until your name is repeated and checked off by the official.
- An election official will give you a ballot.
- Enter within the guardrail and go to a vacant voting booth.

MARK YOUR BALLOT: For each office listed on the ballot, you will see instructions to "Vote for not more than one, or Vote for not more than two, etc."

- To vote for a candidate, fill in the oval to the right of the name of the candidate you want to vote for.
- WRITE-IN candidate(s). To vote for someone whose name is not printed on the ballot, use the blank "write-in" lines on the ballot and either write-in the name or paste on sticker, then fill in the oval.

CHECK OUT:

- Go to the exit checklist table and state your name in an audible voice.
- Wait until your name is repeated and checked off by the official.

CAST YOUR VOTE by depositing your voted ballot into the vote tabulating machine.

LEAVE the voting area immediately by passing outside the guardrail.

RUTLAND TOWN WARNING

The legal voters of the Town of Rutland, Vermont are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Rutland Town Elementary School on Post Road on Monday, March 4, 2019 at 8:00 p.m. to discuss Articles 1 through 23. At the close of business, the meeting shall recess to 7:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 5, 2019 at the Town Hall in Center Rutland for voters living on the west side of Route 7, and the Elementary School on Post Road for voters on the east side of Route 7, to vote by Australian Ballot on Articles 1 through 23 inclusive. Polls will close at 7:00 p.m. on March 5, 2019.

ARTICLES:

1. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to approve NINE HUNDRED EIGHTY SIX THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY SEVEN & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$986,277.00) for use toward the operation of the General Fund Budget to be offset by anticipated income & local option tax receipts from the State of Vermont, the remainder of which, if any, to be raised by taxes?
2. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed THREE HUNDRED THIRTY TWO THOUSAND, FOUR HUNDRED SEVENTY SIX & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$332,476.00) for use toward the operation of the Police Fund Budget?
3. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed SEVEN HUNDRED EIGHTY NINE THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED FIFTY & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$789,250.00) for use toward the operation of the Highway Fund Budget?
4. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed TWO HUNDRED SIX THOUSAND, NINE HUNDRED TWENTY ONE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$206,921.00) for use toward the operation of the Fire Fund Budget?
5. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed ONE HUNDRED TWENTY SEVEN THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY SIX & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$127,276.00) for use toward the operation of the Recreation Fund Budget?
6. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$500.00) toward supporting the work of Neighborworks of Western Vermont for the year 2019?
7. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FIVE HUNDRED THIRTY FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$535.00) toward supporting the work of the Vermont Center for Independent Living for the year 2019?
8. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed SIX HUNDRED SEVENTY & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$670.00) toward supporting the work of the Retired Senior Volunteer Service (RSVP) for the year 2019?
9. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed EIGHT HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$800.00) toward supporting the work of ARC for the year 2019?
10. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed NINE HUNDRED SEVENTY FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$975.00) toward supporting the work of the Bennington-Rutland Opportunity Council BROCC in Rutland Town for the year 2019?

11. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed ONE THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$1,500.00) toward supporting the work of the Southwestern Vermont Council on Aging Inc. for the elderly citizens of Rutland Town for the year 2019?
12. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed TWO THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$2,500) as our share toward Rutland Economic Development Corporation's budget to promote economic development in the Rutland Region and Rutland Town for the year 2019?
13. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed THREE THOUSAND & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$3,000.00) toward supporting the work of the Child First Advocacy Center for the year 2019?
14. Shall the Town of Rutland vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of THREE THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$3,500.00) for the support of the partial funding of Marble Valley Regional Transit District's (The Bus) public transit service to the residents of the Town for the year 2019?
15. Shall the Town of Rutland appropriate FOUR THOUSAND, FIFTY FOUR & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$4,054.00) to the Regional Marketing Initiative, a collaboration of the Rutland Region Chamber of Commerce (RRCC) and the Rutland Economic Development Corporation (REDC) along with area businesses and municipalities with the ultimate goal of growing the economy in our region for the year 2019?
16. Shall the Town of Rutland vote to raise, appropriate and expend the sum of FOUR THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$4,500.00) for the support of Wonderfeet Kids' Museum to provide services to the residents of the Town for the year 2019?
17. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FOUR THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED TWO & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$4,502.00) toward supporting the work of Rutland Mental Health for the year 2019?
18. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed SIX THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$6,500.00) toward supporting the work of the Rutland Visiting Nurse Association and Hospice - (\$500.00) Rutland Area Hospice and (\$6,000.00) RAVNAH home and community health services for the year 2019?
19. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes the sum of money not to exceed FIFTEEN THOUSAND & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$15,000.00) for scholarships, to be awarded to worthy 2019 High School graduates of the Town of Rutland, who have resided in the Town at least two (2) years and wish to attend institutions of higher learning?
20. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes the sum of money not to exceed SIXTEEN THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED SIXTEEN & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$16,216.00) toward the operating cost of the Regional Ambulance Service for the year 2019?
21. Shall the Town of Rutland continue its participation in the Rutland Free Library Association Inc. and to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed NINETY FOUR THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED SEVENTY NINE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$94,779) for the year 2019?

22. Shall the Town of Rutland annually fund its existing reserve account for the purchase, repair, and/or maintenance of Police Department equipment (a/k/a "police depreciation fund") by taxes raised at the rate of \$.0025 per \$100 of assessed property valuation?
23. To elect the following town officers:
- a. A Moderator for a term of one year;
 - b. A Grand Juror for a term of one year;
 - c. A Selectboard member for a term of two years;
 - d. A Selectboard member for a term of three years;
 - e. A Lister for a term of three years;
 - f. A Cemetery Commissioner for a term of three years;

Your elected officials, department heads, town employee's and community volunteers worked diligently to ensure that our busy municipality was well taken care of.

In January, our board made a great decision by hiring Rutland Town resident Bill Sweet to fill the position of, "Administrative Assistant to the Select Board." It's a big title with even bigger responsibility. Bill is our full-time employee at town hall that handles all work for the board. His job responsibilities range from clerical work to planning, grant writing and municipal water and sewer billing. Everyday is a little different in this unique position. The residents of our great town can rest assured that Bill is doing an exceptional job!



This past year we also welcomed a new board member, Sharon Russell. We wish to thank Chris Kiefer-Cioffi for her dedicated service. Chris was a strong member of our team and we needed someone with great ability and talent like Sharon to fill Chris' vacated position.

Our board continues to work well together, even when we disagree. Respect is always at the forefront of who we are as a governing board. Two votes in particular which were hotly contested and debated. The first vote was to inform the State of Vermont that a majority of our board did not support

the reduction of lanes through the business Rt. 4 corridor. The other was a 3-2 vote taking place later in 2018 to end the “service road” engineering study. This was a proposed road which would have been located at the south end of town.

Renovations have continued to take place at town hall. The outside of the building was a priority this past summer with new paint and a heavy-duty cleaning. We also continue to make improvements inside the building. Our latest proposed budget will once again include money for upgrades to our facility, including renovations to the town clerk’s office.

The town celebrated its second annual “town-wide celebration,” in July at the Northwood park. We saw hundreds of people come through for a free swim and cookout, full display of our fire trucks and wagon rides proved by Hathaway Farm. This is a tradition that we plan to continue each July!

We are excited about what the future holds. Our board has shown great support so far for the idea of a, “pocket park,” which will be located near Mead’s Falls in Center Rutland. This hidden gem will open great possibilities for Center Rutland, and will go nicely with the continued clean-up efforts which have taken place in this area of our town throughout this past year.

I could not conclude this report without being reminded of our dear friend, Dick Lloyd, who passed away in December of 2018. We had a wonderful celebration of life for Richard at the Rutland Town Fire Station II. Dick served in many different capacities over several decades, including the position of town Delinquent Tax Collector, on our fire department, as a planning commission member, Justice of the Peace, board of civil authority member and as our transfer station supervisor. Dick will be missed by so many!

The Rutland Town Police Department first would like to thank the residents of Rutland for your continued support of the Police Department.

As the Chief, I am assigned to the Child First Advocacy Center (CFAC) who reimburses the Town of Rutland for the time I spend at the CFAC investigating Child Sexual Assaults, Adult Sexual Assaults and Serious Childhood Injuries cases. The State of Vermont gives each Child Advocacy Center (CAC) in the State of Vermont \$60,000.00 towards the hiring of a Detective to investigate these cases, usually from local Police Departments and or the Sheriffs. In addition to the \$60,000.00, the State of Vermont requires the Vermont State Police to provide a Detective to investigate these crimes. In Rutland County the Rutland City Police Department assigns a dedicated Detective to assist in these Investigations as well.

In addition to working at CFAC I spend several hours each week working on administrative duties as well as taking calls after hours in the Town.

In 2018, the Rutland CFAC served 195 clients and their family members also to include community outreach and prevention services to all of Rutland County.

The Rutland Town Police Department over the last calendar year has responded to and handled 1053 calls for service, ranging from simple suspicious person complaints to felony cases.

Captain Washburn handled 525 of these complaints himself and as you can see, handles the bulk of the complaints coming into the Rutland Town Police Department and does many of the day to day administrative issues that come up at Town Hall.

Major Sly assigned to the Rutland Town Elementary School as the School Resource Officer (SRO) during the school year. During the summer months he works a patrol schedule along with Captain Washburn. In addition to this he teaches A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) Training and is a certified instructor. Not only does Major Sly work for us, he has also been utilized to assist local businesses and organizations in the Rutland area. Major Sly has an extensive knowledge of our computer systems and is often used in this capacity. Major Sly generated and handled 254 calls for service a bulk of these were started for working at the RTES.

Cpl James Gamble continues to work part time for the Rutland Town Police Department and does a nice job in this roll. Cpl Gamble not only brings over 10 years of experience in the private sector in dealing with Retail Security, he also received another level of training in the Mental Health Field. In addition to regular patrol and traffic enforcement, Cpl Gamble has taken it upon himself to remain active in assisting area merchants in the prevention of Retail Theft. The people who regularly steal from our local merchants not only do this in the Town of Rutland but in the entire County of Rutland. Cpl Gamble assists area stores in identifying the people stealing and helping other stores be on the lookout for groups and or individuals stealing from area merchants.

Lynette Gallipo continues to organize and file cases, ensure mandatory requirements by the state of Vermont are met, and handles each case making sure they will pass audits required by both the state of Vermont and the FBI. The Department would be lost without this vital position.

Lastly, this year we are asking to hire an additional Officer to work when Captain Washburn is on days off. With this position, calls will not be left for days until Captain Washburn comes back on duty. Last year I talked about different requirements by the State of Vermont. The fact that the Vermont State Police are not handling "Quality of Life" issues within the Town of Rutland. Animal Complaints, parking lot accident, Alarms not registered, and none violent neighborhood disputes are a few of the types of crimes VSP will hold until a Rutland Town Officer is working.

With an additional Officer we hope to have 7 days a week covered during the busiest times of day, and with an over lapping schedule we should be able to cover some evening hours as well. Our part time Officer will be able to focus on traffic enforcement within the Town of Rutland.

Annual Highway Department Report

Storm water improvements were completed this summer at the school. A rain garden in front of the school holds and retains rain water from part of the school's roof system. Detention/plantings in the parking lot median in front of the school hold the parking area runoff and some additional roof runoff. This system partially treats storm water before discharging the water to the existing storm water system. Another detention system near the flagpole accumulates runoff from more of the parking lot and treats the water through a special planting soil then releases the water slowly to the existing storm water system. Finally an infiltration trench on the side of the lower parking lot holds the runoff from the parking lot allowing the storm water to absorb into the ground. I would extend my appreciation to some volunteer gardeners who pitched in with short notice and helped with the plantings. The volunteers are Marsha Baron, Carol Bam, Lynn Ryan, and Linda Mullin. Thank you ladies, you were a big help.

Paving this year consisted of reclaim and new pavement for a short section of Park Lane to correct a dip in the shoulder, reclaim and new pavement for a section on East Pittsford Road to correct the shoulder area, reclaim and new pavement for part of Old Wood Road and Bittersweet Lane, shim and overlay North Grove Street from Old Wood Road to McKinley Ave., installed a pavement grid on North Grove Street under the new asphalt to correct cracking. Hitzel Terrace, Farham Lane, and Lilac Lane were shimmed and overlaid.

The large culvert at the bottom of Hitzel Terrace was replaced and a storm water retrofit structure was installed to control the rate of runoff. This was the first project completed as part of our flow restoration plan for the Moon Brook.

The mandatory road erosion inventory was done this year. A grant from Vtrans paid for my time and a consultant's time to do this inventory. Over 800 road erosion reports were written detailing any deficiencies found on our roads. A small list of projects was developed into a capital improvement plan. When this plan is approved by Vtrans I will be able to apply for additional grant funding to help complete these projects over time. All of this work and projects are part of the Lake Champlain cleanup efforts.

Thank you taxpayers your support of the highway budget is appreciated. I look forward to working for you next year.

Rutland Town Fire Department Annual report

The members of the Rutland Town Fire Department would like to thank the citizens of Rutland Town for their continued support. A majority of the projects under taken by the Department have been completed or are very close to completion. This year some of the projects we will be undertaking is the replacement of our one ton pick-up and the improvement of our fire ground radio channel so we can communicate across town more effectively and eliminate dead spots.

The officers and members of the department continue to train and up-grade their skills by attending trainings and classes provided by the Department to maintain their level of proficiency on the firefighting equipment and their Vermont State firefighting certification. There are currently 36 active regular firefighters of which 24 are certified level one or greater by Vermont Fire Training, and two are currently in Level one class. We also have 3 junior members.

The Rutland Town Fire Department is always looking for new members, we have 3 levels with-in the Department: Cadet Firefighter 14 and 15 years old, Junior Firefighter 16 and 17 years old, and Senior members 18 years old and up. If you, or anyone you know is interested please stop by either one of our fire stations on any Wednesday evening. This is our regular training night; you can meet with the members and get a feeling for what is involved in the fire service and see if it is something you would like to pursue.

One of the most important activities the department is active in is Fire Prevention and Education. The Department conducts monthly building tours for familiarization of local occupancies and works closely with the Fire Prevention Division of the Vermont Department of Public Safety, The annual Fire Prevention Program at the Rutland Town School for which we provide materials to the students to stress fire prevention has been in place for many years and in the past two years was expanded to provide information to all grades from Kindergarten through grade eight. We also provide Fire Prevention / Fire Safety Materials to the public at events we attend. Apparently our persistence in this area is working because we have had a reduction in major fires in Rutland Town the past few years, let's keep up the good work.

During the past year we had only two major structure fires in Rutland Town and have responded to several incidents in the area as part of our Mutual Aide agreement with other Fire Departments in Rutland County. A large volume of our calls are the result of accidents involving Motor Vehicles, some of which are serious and require the extrication of the occupants from the vehicle.

This past municipal election we requested \$125,000.00 from the taxpayers for the replacement of our Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) which were nearing the end of their life expectancy. This expenditure was approved and we now have 24 new SCBA units in service along with 2 RIT packs. The Select Board also approved our request to replace the water well at Station #1 with an expenditure from the Capital Improvement fund which also has been completed.

I would like to thank the Town Clerk\Treasurer and the Assistant Town Clerk\Treasurer who provide information, guidance and assistance with the paperwork involved with my administrative duties. I would also like to thank the Town Administrative Assistant to the Select Board who also provides me with much needed information and computer assistance.

I would like to also thank Byron Hathaway and the Town Road Crew for their assistance and Chief Ed Dumas, the Rutland Town Police Department and Constable/Fire Police John Paul Faignant for all of their support during daily and emergency operations.

In closing I would like to thank all of the members of the Rutland Town Fire Department and especially their families for all of the sacrifices, dedication, hard work, and support you provide to make this Fire Department a well maintained, highly trained and professional organization.

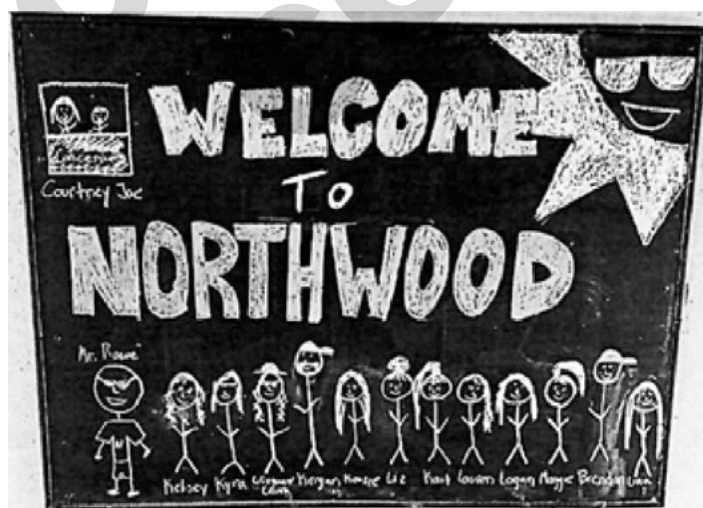

RUTLAND TOWN PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT - 2018

We were deeply saddened by the sudden passing of our colleague Dick Lloyd in December. Dick held a number of positions with the town over the years and rejoined the planning commission in 2017. Without a doubt, he will be long remembered as a devoted public servant to Rutland Town.

In early 2019, the Select Board will be filling Dick's position and another vacancy on the commission. Sherman Hunter was appointed as a new member of the planning commission in 2018.

Business Route 4: The planning commission spent many months in 2018 evaluating two recent studies for developing Business Route 4. Although a recommendation for a road diet (reduced lanes on Business Rt. 4) attracted the most attention, the two studies had more than 30 other recommendations for Center Rutland and the Business Rt 4. The planning commission evaluated all of them and used nine criteria to score them:

- Encourages investment in the corridor;
- Improves the corridor's visual appeal;
- Preserves historical, cultural and/or natural features;
- Increases a sense of community;
- Local support and/or political will;
- Ease of implementation;
- Funding availability;
- Value for money (cost effectiveness); and
- Value for money (sustainability).

The commission then compiled its evaluation into a report for the Select Board and suggested that results could be categorized into several themes:

- Build on Center Rutland's village center and gateway features.
- Begin to extend the village center westward with a focus on mixed use along Business Rt. 4. in Rutland Town.
- Continue to work with West Rutland on ways to link projects, such as a marble theme, wayfinding system or shared-use paths.
- A need to pursue planning grants like MPG and preliminary engineering studies.

Enhanced Energy Plan: The principal purpose of the town's enhanced energy plan is to figure out how Rutland Town will meet the state's goal of by 2050 having 90% of all energy used come from renewables. The most recent draft is tucked into the Town Plan and can be found on the town's website: <https://www.rutlandtown.com/wp-content/uploads/2018/08/draft-Rutland-Town-Plan-August-2-2018.pdf> The energy section begins on p. 38.

The commission calculated how to make the switch from fossil fuels to renewables and made suggestions about where and where not to site energy (mostly solar) development. It also addressed whether the town's 20 viewsheds (or most valued views) should be protected from renewable energy development. A Middlebury College class assisted the commission with mapping and evaluating the viewsheds. Please stay tuned for the results of that work and more public hearings on the draft enhanced energy plan in early 2019.

We have had a very busy year in 2018! Your School Board members have been working in several areas this year including policy development, facility upgrades and contractual negotiations with employees. We have also been working hard to prepare the school budget for the upcoming year. Our goal is to develop a budget which meets the needs of our students. At the same time, we are cognizant of the financial challenges facing residents and therefore have prepared a fiscally responsible budget.

Our proposed FY 20 expenditure budget has increased by 3.2%. Please keep in mind that there are several factors which affect our school budget which are outside of the Board's control. These include the number of high school students who require tuition, the cost of health care which will increase by 11.8%, and unfunded mandates from the state Agency of Education. In addition, the common level of appraisal has decreased by 2.47% which increases the tax rate. The legislature sets the property yield and statewide homestead tax rates after Town Meeting.

Last year, the Rutland Town community voted overwhelmingly in favor of remaining as a single district and joining the newly unified Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union (GRCSU). Through this vote we have ensured our future stability and the continuation of secondary school choice for our resident students in grades 9-12. Dr. Debra Taylor leads the GRCSU and member schools as Superintendent. We are looking forward to continuing to work together with our seven partner schools in the SU.

Deborah Rodolffy and Sarah Tetzlaff lead our school staff and students as Co-Principals. Ms. Rodolffy is new to our administrative team this year, appointed to the role as of July 1. We welcome her and recognize her extensive teaching and leadership experience which will propel our school forward. We are also pleased to announce the promotion of Sarah Tetzlaff to the position of Co-Principal. Ms Tetzlaff has extensive teaching experience and has served as Assistant Principal for six years. We appreciate the hard work of all of our teachers, support staff and administrators. Congratulations to Sue Quesnel who was recognized as SU Teacher of the Year in 2018. We would also like to commend Cecile Howland - school secretary - for all her hard work in anticipation of her upcoming retirement.

There are so many wonderful supportive parents and community members who give generously of their time and talent in support of our school. The Board appreciates the time, talents and contributions of our many school volunteers. We also appreciate the voters, residents, parents and community members who have supported our district. We could not accomplish the tasks necessary without your financial support.

Dear Parents, Guardians and Community Members,

This has been an exciting year! We are proud to introduce our newly unified Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union, which began official operation on July 1, 2018. Transitions have been our focus during the year as we implement the voter-approved governance unification resulting from several years of planning. Our new school system includes Ira, Quarry Valley, Rutland Town and Wells Springs School Districts.

We would be remiss if we did not take this opportunity to recognize the hard work of our school board members, in particular, our retiring school districts. As a result of GRCSU unification, the Rutland Southwest Supervisory Union and Rutland Central Supervisory Union concluded their oversight of their respective school districts on June 30, 2018. As a result of the merger of the Wells Springs and Quarry Valley School Districts, five town school boards concluded their work last June as well: Middletown Springs Town School District, Wells Village School District, Poultney Town School District, Proctor Town School District and West Rutland Town School District. The years of board member stewardship of our town schools represents a long history which we must honor as we transition to our new school system. While all of our schools continue to serve children and families in our communities, our school district board and supervisory union board governance has unified. We remain committed to achieving stronger schools and communities through newly forged partnerships across our communities. Together we are better!

Last year, our excellence in education was recognized by the Agency of Education as we were featured in a video demonstrating best practices in Vermont which is now posted on the state website. In December, we were honored by a visit of the Integrated Field Review Team from the Agency of Education. They are charged with providing us with feedback concerning our implementation of the Education Quality Standards which are required of all school systems in Vermont. We are pleased with their feedback. One area in which we received commendation was that of Safe and Healthy Schools. Here we were pleased to learn that students and parents across our supervisory union speak highly of teachers, support staff and administrators within their buildings and feel they are safe and well-supported. Staff embrace a growth mindset about addressing the changing needs of our students both academically and socially. Students in all our schools are cooperative and well-disciplined. They have performed many acts of kindness to help others in our communities. This overarching spirit of cooperation and generosity is the hallmark of our schools' cultures.

Last year during our transition work with school boards, teachers, support staff and administrators we developed our GRCSU vision and mission. **Our GRCSU Vision is to L.E.A.D. - Learn, Explore, Aspire, Discover.**

Our GRCSU Mission is to create an engaged learning community by empowering students to:

Learn collaboratively and independently.

Explore their own passions and choose their own pathways.

Aspire to achieve success.

Discover their own roles as contributing local and global community members.

Instruction & Learning: Instruction in GRCSU schools is moving toward ceding agency to students by ensuring they have choice around how, where, and when to access and demonstrate evidence of their learning. Teachers are working to

provide opportunities for students to identify where they are and where they're going in their learning, self-reflect on their learning, and learn cooperatively with and from each other.

This year we are fortunate to have assembled a team of grant-funded Innovation Coaches to help teachers identify individual goals and entry points into transforming their instruction. They provide embedded, ongoing support for teachers to meet those goals while building in opportunities for them to reflect on new learning. Coaches are working with teachers to create project-based lessons, performance-based assessments, and self-directed learning opportunities. Unlike typical workshops or conferences, our coaches provide ongoing, personalized support to teachers, a professional learning model that is research-based and proven to help transform practice.

GRCSU teachers also draw on their unique areas of expertise and learn cooperatively with and from each other. Each Tuesday afternoon, they examine student performance data, identify student needs, and share strategies in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). These meetings are scheduled synchronously across GRCSU districts so that teachers from different schools can collaborate and share their experience.

Future Planning: Our excellent educational opportunities will grow and expand in our newly unified school system. We will continue to implement student-centered learning in proficiency-based, personalized environments where all students learn at high levels. New educational opportunities began as early as July 1, 2018, such as centralized technology and joint educational program offerings, and our future will continue to unfold in a positive and productive manner as our Board and administration engage in a process to build our collective future plan for years to come.

Community Outreach: As we build our new school system, we understand that community outreach and parent partnerships continue to be very important. There are several ways that we look forward to building these robust connections. First, we are updating our GRCSU websites and plan to embed our schools' social media and superintendent blog to allow for real time information sharing and feedback. We will continue to publish and distribute online our school principal monthly reports to keep our community apprised of the great work underway in our schools. Our principals are utilizing Twitter to share essential information concerning school and student success stories - and there are many! When you see an administrator at a school/community event (such as athletic matches, school music performances, parent teacher conferences and school board meetings), please feel free to reach out to any of us with your ideas or to ask a question. Of course, you may call or email any time!

District Annual Reports and Budget Presentations: Each school board will hold public meetings to present the annual education budget for voter approval. Mark your calendars for these important meetings: Quarry Valley Unified Union School District Annual Meeting on Tuesday, February 26; Wells Springs Unified Union School District Annual Meeting on Wednesday, February 27; Ira School District Town Meeting on March 4; and Rutland Town School District Town Meeting on March 4. Through our community outreach and engagement efforts, annual reports, forums and annual meetings, we hope all of you will become familiar with our school budgets and the important educational programs and plans they support. Our schools are an investment in our students and our future.

Thank you for your continuing support of all our students. Remember, we have a remarkable history and a promising future. We look forward to excellence in our schools and students into 2020 and beyond!

Director of Student Support Services Annual Town Report

February, 2019

Greater Rutland County Supervisory Union (GRCSU) provides special education programming in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA) and the Vermont Agency of Education Special Education Rules and Regulations, which ensures that all students with disabilities have available to them a free and appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment that emphasizes special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs and prepare them for further education, employment and independent living.

As of December 1, 2018 our GRCSU Child Count for special education recognized 286 (Prek-12) eligible students with disabilities categories including Autism, Developmental Delay, Emotional Disturbance, Hard of Hearing, Learning Impaired, Other Health Impaired (such as chronic health impairments, attention deficit or attention deficit with hyperactivity), Specific Learning Disabled, Speech or Language Impaired and Traumatic Brain Injured.

GRCSU provides special education services for identified 3 & 4 year old students along with their regular education peers typically through grade 12, or in some instances through the time the student turns 22. Beyond direct instruction, many students also need to access related services such as speech and/or language instruction, occupational therapy, physical therapy and counseling.

Any one or a combination of services may be necessary to address the needs of the whole child. However, for a very small percentage of our students, specialized instruction may not be enough, and a special alternative program may be required. To be legally compliant, each eligible child is provided with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Depending on the need, a student may require any combination of the services detailed above. We are legally required to provide a free and appropriate public education to each student on an IEP and we must do so in the least restrictive environment possible.

Finally, we would like to recognize the efforts of all our Special Educators, Instructional Assistants and Service Providers. They are professionals dedicated to meeting the students' needs. They take their responsibilities very seriously and they consistently exceed expectations. If you have any questions, please contact the GRCSU central office at 802-775-4342.

Please, if you suspect a child residing in one of these towns may be in need of special education, make a referral.

It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of \$15,553.43 per equalized pupil. This projected spending per equalized pupil is 5.15 % higher than spending for the current year.
2. Shall general obligation bonds or notes of the Rutland Town School District in an amount not to exceed two hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$235,000.), subject to reduction from the receipt of available state and federal grant-in-aid, the application of reserves, and other financial assistance, be issued for the purpose of financing school building improvements, namely, Elementary School safety and security replacements and upgrades, at an estimated cost of Two Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$235,000.)?
3. To elect school district officials as required by law.



Act 148 - Universal Recycling Law

July 1, 2020

Haulers must offer food scrap collection.

July 1, 2020

Food scraps are banned from landfills. 20 mile limit no longer applies.

Implemented:

July 1, 2017

Transfer stations must accept food scraps.

Generators of 18 tons of food scraps (½ ton per week) must divert if facility exists within 20 miles.

July 1, 2016

Leaf, yard waste and clean wood are banned from landfills. Haulers must offer leaf and yard debris collection.

Generators of 26 tons/year (2 tons per week) of food wastes must divert if composting facility exists within 20 miles.

July 1, 2015

Residential trash must be charged based on volume or weight.

Recyclables are banned from landfills.

Transfer stations must accept leaf and yard waste.

Haulers and transfer stations must offer residential recycling at no separate charge.

Recycling containers must be provided in all publicly owned spaces where trash cans are located.

Generators of 52 tons/year (1 ton per

SWAC is composed of the towns of Benson, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Middletown Springs, Pawlet, Rutland Town, Shrewsbury, Sudbury, Tinmouth, and West Haven and serves a population of approximately 14,000 people. These towns work cooperatively to comply with State laws and mandates managing solid and hazardous waste issues in an environmentally responsible and cost effective manner.

In 2018, SWAC successfully complied with all Year 4 of 5 Act 148 / ANR Solid Waste Implementation Plan (SWIP) requirements. SWAC received approval of a new SWIP in 2015. The SWIP meets the requirements of the State's Material Management Plan and outlines how solid and hazardous waste will be managed in the SWAC towns for a five-year period. All towns in Vermont are required to be included in a SWIP, and the requirements are extensive. The SWIP is available for review on the SWAC website.

SWAC acts as a liaison to the State of Vermont representing the SWAC town's interests on issues such as legislation and rule changes, SWIP requirements, and Product Stewardship.

SWAC is a member of the Vermont Product Stewardship Council and Product Stewardship Council. These groups have been instrumental in getting Environmental Producer Responsibility (EPR) legislation passed in Vermont. The EPR legislation requires manufacturers to be financially responsible for collection of their product(s). Current legislation includes collections for architectural paint, batteries, automobile switches, mercury thermostats, mercury lamps, compact fluorescent bulbs, and electronics waste. Efforts are underway to introduce legislation requiring manufacturers of household hazardous waste products to pay for end of life disposal of their products.

HAZARDOUS WASTE: SWAC contracted with ENPRO Services of Vermont to hold four household hazardous waste (HHW) events. The SWAC towns collected nearly 33 tons of household hazardous waste! Of the 33 tons, 23 tons were paint related materials! Also collected at the events were oxidizers, acids, alkalines, flammable liquids, ammonia, mercury devices, used oil, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, batteries, asbestos, pcb ballasts, and antifreeze.

Thank you for participating in SWAC's efforts to properly recycle and dispose of solid and hazardous waste. To keep your communities HHW and solid waste collection costs down, remember the **4 Rs – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Repurpose**. Try to use up the product you purchase for its intended use. Leftovers? Consider giving it to a neighbor friend, or charitable organization.

2019 HW Schedule: April 13, Rutland Town Transfer Station; April 27, Fair Haven Transfer Station; October 12, Rutland Town Transfer Station. All event times are 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. September 14, Pawlet at Dorset School - 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. The SWAC website provides additional information. All events are free to all SWAC residents. **ANY** SWAC resident can attend **ANY** of the events.

Between events: Residents of SWAC may purchase a non-district permit to utilize the Rutland County Solid Waste District Gleason Road transfer station and hazardous waste depot. This permit allows access to the Gleason Road facility and provides drop off of household hazardous waste at no charge, trash disposal at current rates, and access to recycling drop-offs. Permit purchase is available at the scalehouse or hazardous waste depot at the transfer station or at the RCSWD offices, located at 1 Smith Road, Rutland, Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Permits are not available for sale on weekends at either location. Telephone 802-775-7209 for additional information and current rates.

FY2018 RUTLAND CONSERVATION DISTRICT (RNRCD) REPORT

A sample of the activities the District was involved in during 2017/2018:

Education:

Vermont Envirothon - The District promotes this program through visits to area high school science departments to encourage participation. Teams of students are challenged to answer questions about conservation issues, and scores are calculated to determine the winning team. The District sponsored three teams from two high schools in the 2018 statewide competition.

Conservation Field Day/Science at the Hatchery – The District organizes this event at the Dwight D. Eisenhower National Fish Hatchery in Chittenden for local elementary schools. Topics that students learn about include: stream ecology, forests and tree identification, fish shocking and identification, soils and the different fish species raised at the hatchery and their life cycles.

Real Estate Professionals Continuing Education – The District coordinated this course approved by the VT Real Estate Commission. Attendees received credits learning about Septic Systems and Vermont's Shoreland Protection Act.

Organization:

RNRCD Annual Meeting - The Annual Meeting was held on May 14, 2018 in Clarendon. Kathy Beland, Consulting Forester and Kathleen Wanner, Executive Director of Vermont Tree Farm Program and Vermont Woodlands Association, provided a presentation regarding the Woods, Wildlife and Warblers program. This presentation featured the benefits to wildlife of a timber harvest. Russell Reay and Peg Andrews received awards for their years of dedication to the RNRCD Board.

Local Work Group - District Supervisors participate in Local Work Group meetings to assist USDA in setting local priorities for Cost Share Programs administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Programs:

Land Treatment Planning - The District works with a Land Treatment Planner providing technical assistance to farmers for the development of Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plans.

Portable Skidder Bridges - Two portable skidder bridges are available for rent to loggers and foresters. These bridges reduce stream disturbance, minimizing the potential for erosion and sedimentation.

- Green stormwater practices at Rutland Town School. The Town's Highway Crew installed two rain gardens, rock swales and an infiltration trench.
- Green stormwater practices at Rotary Park in Rutland City, Rutland High School and Stafford Technical Center and publicly owned property on Easterly Avenue in the City of Rutland.
- Stormwater Master Plans in the Town of Wallingford and for the Moon Brook in the City of Rutland.
- A project to remove a berm and acquire easements in the Cold River Watershed in the Town of Clarendon, which will serve to restore floodplain function.
- Several workshops for farmers to expand awareness in programs designed to improve water quality and provide information regarding Required Agricultural Practices (RAP's).
- Broader services to landowners and the public to ensure participation in the development of the tactical basin plan for the Otter Creek.
- A stream equilibrium restoration and erosion reduction project in a historically altered reach of the Homer Stone Brook, a tributary to the Otter Creek in Wallingford.
- Water Quality Monitoring during the Summer of 2018 at eleven sites. Nine sites in the City of Rutland, one site in the Town of Pittsford and one site in the Town Chittenden. The District is interested in expanding this program for 2019 and is looking for additional volunteers to collect water samples.

**ANNUAL REPORT – RUTLAND TOWN
2017-2018**

***Mission Statement:** To advocate for the right of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families to be regarded as valued citizens with the same entitlements as non-disabled individuals, including the right to lifelong opportunities for personal growth and full participation in the community.*

PROGRAMS

- Representative Payee Program: In 2017-2018, ARC served 51 clients as a representative payee. This program provides financial management services to individuals with developmental disabilities who receive social security but are unable to manage their own finances. We currently have a waiting list for this program.
- Social Events: Six events were held this year, including our 60th anniversary celebration. The average total attendance for these events is 487 individuals per year. These events provide a safe space for individuals with developmental disabilities to build circles of support as well as physical exercise and recreation.
- Self-Advocates/Aktion Club: ARC facilitated twelve meetings of the self advocates in 2017-2018, and held five abilities awareness trainings. The self advocates set goals for themselves, learn how to advocate and communicate their needs and wants, and become leaders and teachers in the community. The Aktion Club, a community service club sponsored by the Kiwanis, held twelve meetings, several game nights, tended a garden and donated the produce to the Community Cupboard, visited nursing homes, donated back to school supplies to a local school, participated in Relay For Life, and will be adopting a soldier's family for Christmas.
- Rutland Family Support Network: We continue to maintain this listserve, which provides families and individuals with news, information, and answers questions pertaining to developmental disabilities.

STAFF

- Our executive director of twenty years, Lisa Lynch retired in June. Heather Kent has taken her place, and the position has now been made full time. We continue to have two other part-time staff members, a dedicated group of volunteers, our volunteer Board, and of course the community members.

GOALS

- We are moving to a larger space to be more accessible to the population we serve. Our current space is much too narrow to allow an individual using a wheelchair or other mobility assistance equipment to move safely and freely in our office. The new space will be on the fourth floor of the service building.
- Currently we are working on two new programs for next year. The first is for the purchase of a Sound Beam 6, technology that allows movements of the body to be translated into sound waves and thus, music. This will allow some members of our population with limited dexterity to create music for the first time in their lives. The second program's purpose is to expose our members to more of the great outdoors, which is essential to health, by visiting state parks. For some, this will be their first time away from the town that they live in. Stay tuned!

We offer our heartfelt thanks for your continued support! As always, we receive no State or Federal funding to accomplish our programming; we rely on the support of towns in Rutland County, grants, and fundraisers throughout the year. We recently celebrated our 60th anniversary, which was attended by nearly one hundred people from our services area, including local politicians and two former executive directors. Our dedication to our mission statement will continue as strongly as it has in the last sixty years; on average over one thousand individuals in Rutland County take advantage of our services each year. Our funding request for this year is \$800. We look forward to continuing to serve you, and please visit us at arcrutlandarea.org, or like us on facebook.

Since 1979, The Vermont Center for Independent Living (VCIL) has been teaching people with disabilities and the Deaf how to gain more control over their lives and how to access tools and services to live more independently. VCIL employees (85% of whom have a disability) conduct public education, outreach, individual advocacy and systems change advocacy to help promote the full inclusion of people with disabilities into community life.

Preliminary numbers for our FY'18 (10/2017-9/2018) show VCIL responded to over **3,700** requests from individuals, agencies and community groups for information, referral and assistance and program services for individuals living with a disability. VCIL Peer Advocate Counselors (PACs) provided one-on-one peer counseling to **315** individuals to help increase their independent living skills and **11** peers were served by the AgrAbility program. VCIL's Home Access Program (HAP) assisted **149** households with information on technical assistance and/or alternative funding for modifications; **83** of these received financial assistance to make their bathrooms and/or entrances accessible. Our Sue Williams Freedom Fund (SWFF) provided **87** individuals with information on assistive technology; **45** of these individuals received funding to obtain adaptive equipment. **532** individuals had meals delivered through our Meals on Wheels (MOW) program for individuals with disabilities under the age of 60. We are also home to the Vermont Telecommunications Equipment Distribution Program (VTEDP) which served **41** people and provided **33** peers with adaptive telecommunications enabling low-income Deaf, Deaf-blind, Hard of Hearing and individuals with disabilities to communicate by telephone.

VCIL's central office is located in downtown Montpelier and we have five branch offices in Bennington, Chittenden, Lamoille, Rutland and Windham Counties. Our Peer Advocate Counselors and services are available to people with disabilities throughout Vermont. Our Windham County office also houses the Vermont Interpreter Referral Service (VIRS) (previously under the VT Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing) and provides statewide interpreter referral services for sign language, spoken English and CART services for assignments in medical, legal, mental health, employment, educational, civil and recreational settings.

During FY '18, **13** residents of **Rutland Town** received services from the following programs:

- Home Access Program (HAP)
(\$8,934.00 spent on home modifications)
- Meals on Wheels (MOW)
(over \$2,700.00 spent on meals for residents)
- Peer Advocate Counseling Program (PAC)
- Information Referral and Assistance (I,R&A)

Dear Mr. Terenzini & Select Board members:

This is formal notice that Rutland Free Library is requesting a 2.25 percent increase in funding from our supporting towns for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2019. For Rutland Town, this amounts to a \$2,312 increase, from \$92,467 to \$94,779.

As promised last year, we were able to reopen three evenings each week, after favorable votes from our supporting towns. We continued to cut costs – most notably by renegotiating health insurance benefits in our new contract with staff, which had been our largest cost outside of our control. Our budget looks sustainable for the foreseeable future despite it being a bad year for our endowments. This year, we are planning on adding a 15-hour-per-week teen services librarian. The bulk of the money for the position will come from savings set aside from the Nella Grimm Fox endowment that can only be spent on materials and programs, with a small match in revenue from taxes to help cover the salary, which cannot be paid from the endowment. This position has been a long-term goal of the Library's and we are very pleased to be in position to offer it, while keeping our budget increases essentially flat after inflation.

We hope the Rutland Town Select Board will see fit to put our request for \$94,779 on the March 2019 Town Meeting ballot. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you need further clarification or if I can be of assistance in any way.

Report to the Citizens of Rutland Town

This report describes the services that the Southwestern Vermont Council on Aging (SVCOA) provided to elders in Rutland Town in 2018:

Senior Meals:

The Council helped provide 3,568 meals that were delivered to the homes of 27 elders in your community. This service is often called “Meals on Wheels.” In addition, 28 Rutland Town elders came together at a luncheon site in your area to enjoy a nutritious meal and the company of others; 726 meals were provided.

Case Management Assistance:

SVCOA case management staff helped 29 elders in your community. Case managers meet with an elder privately in the elder’s home or at another agreed upon location and assess the elder’s situation. They will work with the elder to identify needs and talk about possible services available to address those needs. If the elder desires, the case manager will link the client to appropriate services, coordinate and monitor services as necessary, and provide information and assistance to caregivers. Case managers also help elders connect with in-home assistance programs, including a program called Choices for Care. This program is especially helpful to frail elders facing long term care placement who still wish to remain at home.

Other Services and Support:

1) “Senior HelpLine” assistance at 1-800-642-5119. Our Senior HelpLine staff provide telephone support to elders and others who need information on available programs and community resources; 2) Medicare and health benefit counseling information and assistance through our State Health Insurance Program; 3) Legal service assistance through the Vermont Senior Citizens Law Project; 4) Information about elder issues and opportunities via various agency articles and publications; 5) Nutrition education and counseling services provided by SVCOA’s Registered Dietician; 6) Senior Companion support for frail, homebound elders; 7) Outreach services to elders dealing with mental health issues through our Elder Care Clinician. This service is provided in cooperation with Rutland County Mental Health; 8) Transportation assistance; 9) Caregiver support, information and respite to family members and others who are providing much needed help to elders in need of assistance; 10) Money Management programs that offer either a volunteer bill payer or representative payee services to elders and younger disabled individuals.



To the Honorable Citizens of Rutland Town:

We are pleased to present our 35th annual report to the Citizens we serve. Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. has continually provided emergency and non-emergency ambulance service for thirty-five years. From 1983 to the end of this fiscal year, Regional has responded to 212,369 ambulance calls. This past year, ending June 30, 2018, the service responded to a total of 9,299 ambulance calls in our 12 communities and an additional 185 "Medic One" paramedic intercept calls. We are proud of our accomplishments and look forward to serving the public.

We congratulate Chris "Jake" Jakubiak, EMT for being honored as our "Star of Life" at the American Ambulance Association's Stars of Life celebration in our nation's capital.

With the continued support of the citizens, our employees, and community governing bodies, we have been able to level fund or lower our assessment rate for the past 34 years. Since 1990 the Assessment rate has been decreased by 36%. Our current assessment rate is \$4 per capita and remains unchanged for the next fiscal year. The public support of our Membership program, direct donations, memorials and estate gifts have been vital to our continued success. Thank you.

This past year one new ambulances was put into service to replace an older ambulance with more than 100,000 miles of service. The 9 year old support vehicle was also replaced.

Our motto "Serving People First with Pride, Proficiency and Professionalism" is demonstrated by our employees commitment to continuing EMS training. Each year our employees have specialized training in Critical Care Paramedicine, ALS, BLS, Prehospital Advanced Trauma Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Neonatal Resuscitation, Emergency Vehicle Operations, Bloodborn Pathogens and a variety of continuing education programs. Our professional staff is extremely capable and dedicated.

RAS has been focusing on Critical Care Paramedic training and improving abilities for critical transfers to other hospitals.

Monthly C.P.R. classes are taught at Regional Ambulance. Last year, through the R.A.S. Training Center, 1,312 people were trained in C.P.R. Tours, lectures, demonstrations, and C.P.R. classes are available for the general public. Child Car Seat inspections are held Wednesdays at the Regional Ambulance building and 149 child car seat inspections were completed through this program.

RSVP and The Volunteer Center is an "Invitation to Serve" program for people of all ages who want to meet community needs through meaningful use of their skills, talents, interests and knowledge in volunteer service. Needs are met in critical areas such as human services, elder care, health care, education, literacy, and the arts, just to name a few. Through such efforts, RSVP/VC is meeting the needs that strained local budgets cannot afford. RSVP/VC enables people to contribute to their communities while enjoying the personally satisfying and rewarding experience that community engagement offers. Additionally, over the past 18 years RSVP has implemented several "Signature Programs" aimed at addressing pressing community needs. These programs include *RSVP TeleCare*, a telephone reassurance and safety check in program offered **FREE** to Rutland County seniors, a children's literacy and mentoring program called *RSVP Rutland County Reads*, and after school program called *RSVP After School Buddies*, an osteoporosis prevention program, *RSVP Bone Builders*, which provides **FREE** strength and balance exercise classes with RSVP/VC volunteer instructors to Rutland County residents, and *RSVP Operation Dolls & More*, in which RSVP/VC volunteers restore and refurbish donated dolls, toys books and games. Last year over 10,000 items were distributed to 2,000 children and over 50 organizations to share with clients.

Locally, RSVP/VC is the largest program of coordinated volunteer services serving the people of Rutland County with 796 volunteers. From July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018, RSVP/VC volunteers provided 177,712 hours of community service. The cost benefit to the communities of Rutland County in terms of cost of services provided equals \$4,451,686. Once again this year RSVP/VC is not asking for additional monies from the Town of Rutland. The monies we request are used to help defray the costs of providing services that impact the lives of citizens of all ages throughout Rutland County. In addition, the *RSVP Bone Builders* classes are offered throughout the region and more than 200 participants are from Rutland Town!

Currently in Rutland Town, 63 volunteers donate their services to the following non-profit organizations: RRMC, BROCC, Headstart, Community Cupboard, Rutland Town School, various nursing homes, Godnick Adult Center, College of Saint Joseph, USDA Soil Conservation Agency, One-2-One, Dismas House, various non-profit boards Northeast and Northwest Elementary Schools, Southwest Vermont Council on Aging, West Rutland School, RAVNAH, Kids on the Move, Rutland Intermediate School, VT Criminal Justice Training Center, the *RSVP Bone Builders Program*, the *RSVP TeleCare* program, *RSVP Operation Dolls & More*, *RSVP Rutland County Reads*, VT. Dept. Of Forests, Parks, & Rec., VT Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired, Tax Counseling for the Elderly, General Breed Fund, St. Jude's Research Hospital, Rutland Region Chamber of Commerce, PEG TV, Chaffee Art Center, Paramount Theater, The Boys and Girls Club, and Meals on Wheels.

The volunteer services they provide include: providing safety check in phone calls to homebound seniors through the *RSVP TeleCare* program knitting and sewing items for children and seniors, tutoring and mentoring in area schools through the *RSVP Rutland County Reads and After School Buddies* programs, mailings, entertaining in the area nursing homes and schools, teaching and performing arts and crafts, volunteering at RRMC, clerical assistance, delivering and preparing meals, pastoral care, tax preparation, Osher Lifelong Learning Institute volunteer, driving for elders and the disabled, friendly visitations, cooking assistance, community relations, fund-raising, bingo aides, recreation leaders, and an array of special projects, research, library aides, exercise leaders for the *RSVP Bone Builders* Program, and providing volunteer services to *RSVP Operation Dolls & More*.

On behalf of RSVP & The Volunteer Center, I would like to thank the residents of Rutland Town for their support. As financial constraints effect more and more non-profit organizations, the need for volunteers continues to increase. With your help, RSVP/VC will continue to respond to this need.

- 3 residents had HEAT Squad Energy Audits; 3 residents completed Energy Improvement Projects; and 3 residents received Down Payment Assistance

- **295 Low-cost, Comprehensive HEAT Squad Energy Audits** were completed on buildings; **102 Home Energy Improvement Projects** were completed and homeowners received a rebate check from Efficiency Vermont; **60 Energy Loans** were issued, a total of \$969,503.10 to help homeowners make energy improvements

Marble Valley Regional Transit District (MVRTD), known as "The Bus" is in its forty second year of providing service to the residents of the greater Rutland area. The Bus is the largest, non-urban, public transportation system in the State of Vermont and provides transportation to the general public throughout Rutland County, as well as to social and human service agencies, the resort communities and area businesses. MVRTD provides an enhanced level of self-sufficiency for the elderly, disabled and transportation disadvantaged who rely on public transportation. The Child First Advocacy Center (CFAC) serves as a central agency through which reports of suspected child abuse can be channeled for investigation and victim recovery. CFAC was established in 1995 and became a fully Accredited Member of the *National Children's Alliance (NCA)* in 2004. We share with NCA the passion to minimize the traumatic effect of child abuse upon the children and families of our community. CFAC is a non-profit organization serving Rutland County to assist family's in the discovery, intervention, treatment and prevention of child sexual abuse, severe physical abuse and children affected by violence. We provide a safe comfortable environment for the forensic quality and child appropriate interviews, training for professionals and collateral referral services for victims and their non-offending family members. Our agency serves families of all socio-economic levels and is committed to providing quality services regardless of the ability to pay.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and the Child First Advocacy Center Multidisciplinary Team, we want to thank you for your continued support and dedication.

In calendar year 2018, The Child First Advocacy Center served 195 clients and 174 family members in Rutland County. **We were able provide wrap around services and support to at least eleven Rutland Town families as they began their recovery from the effects of trauma.** In addition, we continue to provide community awareness and education at no cost, in an effort to provide adults with the ability to recognize, react and respond appropriately to child sexual abuse and increase each school districts ability to complete the legislatively mandated ACT 1 initiative also known as Child Sexual Abuse Awareness training for Educators, Community Members and Student's grades K-12.

We believe in providing the medically necessary healthcare wherever it is needed, location of residence, or complexity of health issues. Town funds and charitable contributions help us to make this possible.



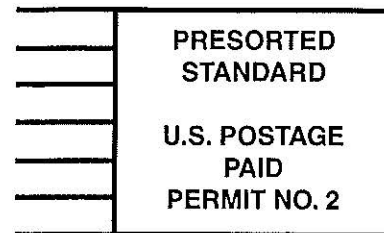
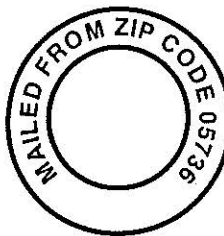
