3 Subject: Capital construction; capital appropriations; State bonding

4 Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to authorize
5 bonding, appropriate capital funds, and address miscellaneous related items.

6 An act relating to capital construction and State bonding

7 It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

8 * * * Legislative Intent * * *

9 Sec. 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

10 (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that of the \$127,378,694.00
11 authorized in this act, not more than \$70,072,688.00 shall be appropriated in
12 the first year of the biennium, and the remainder shall be appropriated in the
13 second year.

14 (b) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in the second year of the
15 biennium, any amendments to the appropriations or authorities granted in this
16 act shall take the form of the Capital Construction and State Bonding
17 Adjustment Bill. It is the intent of the General Assembly that unless otherwise
18 indicated, all appropriations in this act are subject to capital budget adjustment.

1 Sec. 2. STATE BUILDINGS

17 Sec. 20. USE OF FORMER SOUTHEAST STATE CORRECTIONAL

18 FACILITY; WINDSOR; STUDY COMMITTEE; REPORT

19 (a) Creation. There is created the Former Southeast State Correctional
20 Facility Use Study Committee to review and recommend potential uses for the
21 property located at 546 State Farm Road in Windsor.

1 (b) Membership. The Committee shall be composed of the following
2 members:

3 (1) an individual appointed by the Town of Windsor Selectboard;

4 (2) the Executive Director of the Mount Ascutney Regional Commission
5 or designee;

6 (3) the Commissioner of Buildings and General Services or designee;

7 (4) the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets or designee;

8 (5) the Executive Director of the Vermont Housing and Conservation
9 Board or designee;

10 (6) the Secretary of Commerce and Community Development or
11 designee; and

12 (7) the Secretary of Natural Resources or designee.

13 (c) Powers and duties. The Committee shall review options for the
14 potential use of the land located at 546 State Farm Road in Windsor. As part
15 of the Committee’s review, it shall consider the following reports:

16 (1) Plan to provide secure transitional housing for inmates reentering the
17 community, dated November 1, 2017, as required by 2017 Act and Resolves
18 No. 85, Sec. 335.1;

19 (2) Report on AHS Major Facilities, dated January 15, 2018, as required
20 by 2017 Acts and Resolves No. 84, Sec. 31; and

1 (3) Report on an act relating to the Southeast State Correctional Facility,
2 dated December 15, 2018, as required by 2018 Acts and Resolves No. 151.

3 (d) Assistance. The Committee shall have the administrative, technical,
4 and legal assistance of the Department of Buildings and General Services.

5 (e) Report. On or before December 15, 2021, the Committee shall submit a
6 written report to the House Committee on Corrections and Institutions and the
7 Senate Committee on Institutions with its findings and any recommendations
8 for use of the property.

9 (f) Meetings.

10 (1) The Commissioner of Buildings and General Services shall call the
11 first meeting of the Committee to occur on or before July 15, 2021.

12 (2) The Executive Director of the Mount Ascutney Regional
13 Commission shall be the chair.

14 (3) A majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.

15 (4) The Committee shall cease to exist on July 1, 2022.

16 Sec. 21. NEW HAVEN DEPOT BUILDING; RELOCATION

17 (a)(1) The General Assembly finds that the building located at 5450 Ethan
18 Allen Highway in the Town of New Haven (the New Haven Depot Building),
19 owned by the Agency of Commerce and Community Development, Division
20 of Historic Preservation pursuant to Executive Order No. 22, dated

1 November 26, 1975, must be relocated to meet the safety standards required
2 for the changing operations of rail service.

3 (2) The General Assembly also finds that the land at 5450 Ethan Allen
4 Highway in the Town of New Haven, is owned by the Agency of
5 Transportation pursuant to Executive Order No. 29-8, dated March 22, 1983.

6 (b)(1) the Secretary of the Agency of Transportation, which owns the land
7 on which the depot is located, and the Director of the Division for Historic
8 Preservation, which owns the historic building, are authorized to determine
9 how best to preserve the New Haven Depot Building by relocating it to another
10 parcel.

11 (2) The Commissioner of Buildings and General Services is authorized
12 to execute a quit claim deed to transfer any existing or future interest in the
13 New Haven Depot Building. The transfer shall be subject to a preservation
14 easement to be held by the Division for Historic Preservation.

15 (c) If the State Historic Preservation Officer and the Secretary of
16 Transportation deem a relocation of the New Haven Depot Building is not
17 physically or financially practicable, the State Historic Preservation Officer, in
18 coordination with the Commissioner of Buildings and General Services and the
19 Secretary of Transportation, is authorized to decommission the building and
20 delist it from the National Register of Historic Places.

17 Sec. 25. PROCESS FOR USE OF FEDERAL FUNDS; FY 2022 AND FY
18 2023; WATER AND SEWER INFRASTRUCTURE

19 (a) Intent. It is the intent of the General Assembly that, to the extent
20 permitted by federal law and guidance, the amounts appropriated in this act
21 should be offset by using federal funds provided to the State by the American

1 Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. 117-2 in State and Local Coronavirus Fiscal
2 Recovery Funds whenever possible for capital projects supporting water and
3 sewer infrastructure. Any appropriation so offset shall be used for future
4 capital construction projects in the fiscal year 2022 capital budget adjustment
5 process.

6 (b) Offset with federal funds. If the Commissioner of Finance and
7 Management determines that any FY 2022 appropriations for water and sewer
8 infrastructure may be offset by using federal funds provided to the State by the
9 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. 117-2 in State and Local
10 Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Funds, the Commissioner of Finance and
11 Management is authorized to substitute the federal funds for capital funds. The
12 Commissioner shall notify the Chairs of the House Committee on Corrections
13 and Institutions and the Senate Committee on Institutions of any substitution of
14 funds in accordance with this subsection. Any State capital funds offset
15 pursuant to this section shall be used for future capital construction projects in
16 the FY 2022 capital budget adjustment process.

17 (c) Report. On or before December 15, 2021, the Commissioner shall
18 review and recommend water and sewer infrastructure projects funded in FY
19 2023 of this act and submit a list of any recommended substitutions and
20 additional amounts of federal funds that may be used for FY 2023 to the Chairs
21 of the House Committee on Corrections and Institutions and the Senate

1 Committee on Institutions and to the Governor for the FY 2022–2023 capital
2 budget adjustment report.

3 (d) Reservation of funds. In accordance with this section, the
4 Commissioner of Finance and Management may reserve not more than
5 \$30,000,000.00 for substitution of federal funds provided to the State by the
6 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. 117-2 in State and Local
7 Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Funds pursuant to subsection (a) of this section,
8 and is authorized to substitute not more than \$15,000,000.00 in FY 2022. Of
9 the \$30,000,000.00, any remaining unexpended amounts not substituted in FY
10 2022 may be used in FY 2023.

11 Sec. 26. FEDERAL FUNDS; CAPITAL PROJECTS

12 (a) Intent. It is the intent of the General Assembly, to the extent permitted
13 by federal law and guidance, to use federal funds provided to the State by the
14 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. 117-2, in the Coronavirus Capital
15 Projects Fund for capital projects necessary for the Executive, Legislative, and
16 Judicial Branches as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

17 (b) Designated uses. In FY 2022, the federal funds provided to the State by
18 the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. 117-2, in the Coronavirus
19 Capital Projects Fund for necessary capital projects as a result of the COVID-
20 19 pandemic shall be designated as follows:

1 (1) The amount of \$62,000,000.00 shall be allocated to the Agency of
2 Human Services for mental health and correctional infrastructure.

3 (2) The amount of \$51,000,000.00 shall be allocated for infrastructure
4 for the Legislative and Judicial Branches.

5 (c) Recommendation.

6 (1) For the designated use described in subdivision (b)(1) of this section,
7 on or before December 15, 2021, the Commissioner shall submit
8 recommendations on the use of federal funds from the Coronavirus Capital
9 Projects Fund for FY 2023 to the Chairs of the House Committee on
10 Corrections and Institutions and the Senate Committee on Institutions and to
11 the Governor for the FY 2022–2023 capital budget adjustment report.

12 (2) For the designated use described in subdivision (b)(2) of this section,
13 on or before January 15, 2021, the Joint Legislative Management Committee
14 shall submit recommendations on the use of federal funds from the
15 Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund for infrastructure in the Legislative Branch,
16 and the Court Administrator shall submit recommendations on the use of
17 federal funds from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund for infrastructure in
18 the Judicial Branch, to the House Committee on Corrections and Institutions
19 and the Senate Committee on Institutions for allocation in the FY 2022–2023
20 Capital Budget Adjustment Act.

2 Sec. 27. SPENDING ON MENTAL HEALTH SYSTEM OF CARE;

3 LEGISLATIVE INTENT

4 It is the intent of the General Assembly that any proposal offered by the
5 Department of Mental Health to expand a State-owned or -operated facility or
6 capacity at a State-owned or -operated facility in Vermont’s mental health
7 system should always include or identify resources to support Vermont’s
8 community mental health system.

9 Sec. 28. RESIDENTIAL BEDS FOR INDIVIDUALS DISCHARGED FROM

10 INPATIENT PSYCHIATRIC CARE

11 (a) On or before August 1, 2021, the Department of Mental Health shall
12 issue a request for information from designated and specialized service
13 agencies and peer-run agencies for developing and implementing programming
14 for unlocked community residences for transitional support for individuals
15 being discharged from inpatient psychiatric care or for intervention to prevent
16 inpatient care. Responses to the request for information shall be provided to
17 the Department of Mental Health not later than December 1, 2021 and shall
18 include provisions that address the need to develop and implement community
19 residential programming for youths.

20 (b) The Department of Mental Health shall convene a steering group of
21 interested stakeholders, including individuals with lived experience, to

1 consider and provide input to the Department’s prioritization process in
2 determining the area of highest need across the mental health system of care
3 with regard to additional bed proposals described in subsection (a) of this
4 section.

5 (c) On or before December 15, 2021, the Department of Mental Health
6 shall submit a report to the House Committees on Health Care and on
7 Corrections and Institutions and to the Senate Committees on Health and
8 Welfare and on Institutions containing the following:

9 (1) a review of all responses received pursuant to the request for
10 information issued pursuant to subsection (a) of this section;

11 (2) a bed needs assessment for all levels of care in the mental health
12 system, including an update to the statewide bed needs assessment conducted
13 pursuant to 2019 Acts and Resolves No. 26, Sec. 2 with regard to inpatient
14 beds and community residences;

15 (3) a summary of the input provided by the stakeholder steering group
16 pursuant to subsection (b) of this section; and

17 (4) an analysis of opportunities under the American Rescue Plan Act of
18 2021, Pub. L. 117-2, for capital or operational bridge funding for additional

20 section or additional similar community capacities.

7 (a) Engineering planning advance. A municipality or a combination of two
8 or more municipalities desiring an advance of funds for engineering and land
9 use planning for public water supply systems, as defined in subdivision

10 4752(9) of this title, or improvements, or for clean water projects or
11 improvements, may apply to the Department for an advance under this chapter.

12 As used in this subsection, “engineering planning” may include source
13 exploration, surveys, reports, designs, plans, specifications, or other
14 engineering services necessary in preparation for construction of the types of
15 systems or facilities referred to in this section. Not more than 25 percent of

16 funds awarded to a municipality as a planning advance pursuant to this
