Subject: Please Protect Vermonters from Toxic Chemicals

Dear Governor Shumlin,

I think we can agree that toxic chemicals don't belong in our consumer products. But dangerous chemicals linked to cancer, learning disabilities, and reproductive harm are found in many products we use every day. The fact is that the health and economic costs of toxic chemicals burden every family and business in Vermont.

Our nation's chemical regulatory system, the Toxic Substances Control Act, is ineffective and outdated. It's almost impossible for parents and retailers to get trustworthy information about the chemicals lurking in so many everyday consumer products. Here in Vermont, there is strong support for better chemical regulations among parents, policy makers, and health care professionals. But we can't solve this problem alone.

We need your administration to do all it can to protect our families from toxic chemicals. We need to identify chemicals of concern, and keep the worst chemicals out of consumer products – especially those aimed at children. Getting Vermonters the information we need to make informed decisions has got to be a priority.

A recent Chicago Tribune investigation uncovered how the chemical industry regularly lied to oversight committees, teamed up with Big Tobacco and even infiltrated fire fighter organizations to keep their dangerous, toxic products on store shelves. No doubt you remember the deceitful tactics they used in Vermont when the state was working to ban one class of toxic flame retardants in 2009.

The fact of the matter is that industry has wildly misrepresented scientific data for decades to convince regulators their products are effective. In fact, these toxic flame retardants do virtually nothing to prevent fires, and actually make the smoke from fires more deadly. Further, the chemicals migrate from our furniture, electronics, and other products into our bodies. The chemicals are linked to cancer, developmental disabilities, and reproductive problems.

Vermont has taken important steps to ban a number of toxic chemicals, but new chemicals of concern come to light each year. We can't keep battling chemicals one at a time. We need a better precautionary system, so we can have confidence that the products we bring into our homes are safe for our families. I urge your administration to do all it can to protect Vermonters from toxic chemicals.

Thank you for your consideration of this critical issue.

Dear Eric,

Thank you for sharing your concern about toxic chemicals in consumer products. I appreciate your vigilance and your interest in the nature of some chemical toxicants in our environment.

Vermont has several laws that regulate chemical content of some consumer products. Some of these laws are aimed specifically at children's products:

Bisphenol A (BPA) is a synthetic chemical that has adverse health effects at low doses. Title 18, Chapter 29 of the Vermont Statutes limits the use of BPA in certain products. Effective July 12, 2012, the manufacture, sale or distribution of infant or baby formula stored in a plastic container or jar containing BPA is barred. Beginning July 1, 2014, the manufacture, sale or distribution of infant or baby formula stored in a can containing BPA is barred. Also effective July 1 of this year, the manufacture, sale or distribution of a reusable food or beverage container containing BPA is barred.

Phthalates are chemicals that are added to plastics, and are associated with adverse health effects. Title 18, Chapter 29 of the Vermont Statutes restricts phthalate concentrations in children's toys and items intended for use in the mouth. Since July 1, 2009, the manufacture, sale or distribution of any toy or a child care article (pacifier, teether, etc.) intended for use by children under 3 years of age containing di-(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate (DEHP), dibutyl phthalate (DBP) or benzyl butyl phthalate (BBP) in concentrations greater than 0.1% is barred. The manufacture, sale or distribution of any toy or item intended for use in the mouth by children under the age of 3 cannot contain diisononyl phthalate (DINP), diisodecyl phthalate (DIDP), or di-n-octyl phthalate (DnOP) at concentrations greater than 0.1%.

Flame Retardants - Exposure to some polybrominated diphenyl ether (PBDE) flame retardants is associated with health concerns. Some PBDEs are regulated in Title 9, Chapter 80 of the Vermont Statutes. Since July 1, 2010, the Vermont Statutes forbid the sale of a retail product containing octabromodiphenyl ether (octaDBE) or pentabromodiphenyl ether (pentaBDE) in concentrations greater than 0.1% by weight. The statutes also forbid the sale of mattresses, mattress pads, upholstered furniture, televisions and computers containing decabromodiphenyl ether (decaBDE) in concentrations greater than 0.1%.

Safe Cleaning Products - Most recently, Vermont passed Act 68, protecting the health of school children by requiring the use of safe cleaning products. Starting on July 1, 2012, distributors and manufacturers of cleaning products can sell to schools only

environmentally preferable cleaning products. This will improve indoor air quality and likely reduce adverse health effects such as the aggravation of asthma.

I encourage all Vermonters to make informed consumer purchases. To avoid exposure to BPA, consider alternatives to plastics and cans, such as glass. Avoid phthalate exposure by purchasing toys made from natural materials such as wood, rather than toys made from soft plastics. To reduce exposure to flame retardants, purchase garments made from natural fibers such as cotton which are not as inherently flammable as synthetic fabrics such as polyester.

While we work to protect citizens in Vermont, our Congressional delegation is working hard to address this issue at the national level. Senators Patrick Leahy and Bernie Sanders both support the federal Safe Chemicals Act (S.847). They co-sponsored S.847, which would require the chemical industry to demonstrate the health and environmental safety of chemicals used in consumer products.

While we are aware of many offensive chemicals in our environment, we strive to address those most pertinent to children's health in our statutes. As our knowledge grows about the dangers of some chemical toxicants, so do our regulations. In the meantime, I encourage you to stay informed and make choices that limit your exposure to chemicals of concern.

Thank you for your support of the Thermal Efficiency Task Force's recommendations for funding thermal energy and weatherization investments. Vermont continues to lead the nation in preparing our environment and economy for a climate change future, promoting renewable energy development, and saving Vermonters' money through energy efficiency.

Dear Gov. Shumlin,

I'm writing to ask you to veto S.82, the campaign finance bill. This bill started out last year as a real reform bill that would have reestablished commonsense limits on campaign contributions and significantly increased transparency around elections. But the bill you have before you does neither.

I know you have supported genuine campaign finance reform legislation in the past. I'm asking you to stand up for real reform once again by vetoing this flawed bill.

S.82 makes the problem of money in politics worse. Among its drawbacks, it would:

- Double the amount of money that corporations, PACs and wealthy individuals can give to statewide candidates from \$2,000 to \$4,000
- Quintuple the amount that PACs, corporations and the rich can give to political parties from \$2,000 to \$10,000
- Allow unlimited contributions from political parties to candidates
- Fail to substantially improve disclosure requirements (adding just two new reports over a two-year period and filing to collect occupation or employer info)
- Do nothing to stop corporations from giving directly to candidates, and
- Fail to require fat cat funders of Super PACs to appear in their own ads

In vetoing this bill, you can send it back to legislators with ideas to improve it. There are positive aspects of the bill that should be retained while strengthening the disclosure provisions and contribution limits.

Please demonstrate your leadership and commitment to real campaign finance reform.

Please veto this bill. Thank you.

While the new law does update limits set in 1981, I signed S.82 because it adds transparency to Vermont elections and ensures that we have campaign finance limits on the books. S.82 will allow the Secretary of State to require online campaign filings, requires Super PACs to disclose media buys, and increases the number of reporting filings. In addition, it increases public financing, which is one of the best resources for candidates.

EPA Adds Sites to National Priorities List to Reduce Risk to Public Health and Environment

WASHINGTON – The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is adding five and proposing to add eight hazardous waste sites to the Superfund program's National Priorities List (NPL). These are sites with known or threatened hazardous waste releases that could pose risks to public health and the environment.

"Cleaning up hazardous waste sites is vitally important to the health of America's communities," said Mathy Stanislaus, assistant administrator for EPA's Office of Land and Emergency Management. "Our goal is to give communities the best opportunity for productive use of a site after it is cleaned up."

A site's addition to the NPL helps address potential adverse human health impacts. Academic research shows that investment in Superfund cleanups reduces the incidence of congenital abnormalities in infants by as much as 25 percent for those living within approximately a mile and a quarter of a site. Cleanups involving lead-contaminated soil have contributed to documented reduced blood-lead levels in children. If left unaddressed, elevated blood-lead levels may result in irreversible neurological deficits, such as lowered intelligence and attention-related behavioral problems.

"Adding a site to the NPL generates new jobs and creates stronger local economies that will strengthen communities for years to come," continued Assistant Administrator Stanislaus. "A study by researchers at Duke University and the University of Pittsburgh found that once a site has all cleanup remedies in place and is deleted from the NPL, nearby property values increased 18.6-24.5 percent as compared to their pre-NPL proposal values. Moreover, cleanups increase

local communities' and state governments' tax revenue, and help to create jobs during and after cleanup. For example, at 454 of the 850 sites supporting use or reuse activities, EPA found, at the end of fiscal year 2015, that approximately 3,900 businesses had ongoing operations that were generating annual sales of more than \$29 billion and employing more than 108,000 people."

Currently, more than 850 Superfund sites nationwide have some type of actual or planned reuse underway. For example, in the town of Corinna, Maine, the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, local officials and stakeholders worked together to integrate a reuse plan for the Eastland Woolen Mill Superfund site. The 22-acre site is a former textile mill that operated from 1909 to 1996. Disposal practices resulted in extensive contamination of soil, groundwater and numerous private drinking water wells. With EPA support, this collaboration resulted in the Corinna Village Center Reuse Plan that focuses on mixed-use redevelopment of downtown Corinna and includes commercial, residential and recreational areas.

EPA responds to requests from states, tribes and communities to propose a site for NPL addition when non-NPL response options have not proved viable. Prior to adding a site to the NPL, the agency works closely with states and tribes and seeks public comment. For each of the 13 sites announced today, EPA has either received letters of state officials' concurrence supporting the NPL listing or, after working closely with the state, received no objection to adding the site to the NPL. Community partnerships are also critical to Superfund site cleanups. EPA's goal is to work with community partners at every site by establishing an effective process with the necessary tools and information needed to fully explore future uses before the cleanup remedy's selection. This approach gives the Agency the best chance of ensuring remedies are consistent with a site's likely future use.

Under Superfund law, only sites EPA adds to the NPL are eligible to receive federal funding for long-term, permanent cleanup. The list serves as the basis for prioritizing both enforcement actions against potentially responsible parties and long-term EPA Superfund cleanup funding. The Superfund program operates on the principle that polluters should pay for the cleanups rather than passing the costs on to taxpayers. EPA searches for parties legally responsible for contaminating a site, and holds those parties accountable for cleanup costs.

This year marks the 35th anniversary of the enactment of the Comprehensive Environmental, Response, Compensation and Liability Act, the law creating the Superfund program. The Superfund law gives EPA the authority to clean up hazardous substance releases and directs EPA to update the NPL. EPA and its partners continue to discover new sites qualifying for the NPL. These sites are the result of past industrial practices as well as other activities.

The sites in today's rules potentially affect drinking water, groundwater, soil, wetlands, and fishing for human consumption. Contaminants found at the sites include arsenic, mercury, uranium, cadmium, copper, manganese, zinc, aluminum, chromium, lead, trichloroethane (TCA) and trichloroethylene (TCE).

The following five sites have been added to the NPL:

- * Illinois - Old American Zinc Plant (former zinc smelter) in Fairmont City.
- * Iowa - PCE Former Dry Cleaner (former dry cleaner) in Atlantic.
- * Nebraska - Iowa-Nebraska Light & Power Co (former gas plant manufacturer) in Norfolk.
- * New Jersey - Former Kil-Tone Company (former pesticides manufacturer) in Vineland.
- * New Mexico - Lea and West Second Street (ground water plume) in Roswell.

The following eight sites have been proposed for addition to the NPL:

- * California - Argonaut Mine (former hard rock mining area) in Jackson.
- * Colorado - Bonita Peak Mining District (former hard rock mining area) in San Juan County.
- * Indiana - Riverside Ground Water Contamination (ground water plume) in Indianapolis.
- * New York - Wappinger Creek (site of various former industrial operations) in Dutchess County.
- * Ohio - Valley Pike VOCs (former tire and heavy duty truck molding manufacturer) in Riverside.
- * Puerto Rico - Dorado Ground Water Contamination (ground water contamination) in Dorado.

* Texas - Eldorado Chemical Co., Inc (former cleaning products manufacturer) in Live Oak.

* West Virginia - North 25th Street Glass and Zinc (former glass and zinc manufacturer) in Clarksburg.




The 2nd Draft RAPs conflict with the legislative intent of Act 64 by exempting a category of farmers from the RAPs.

The 2nd Draft RAPs section 3.1, which defines the applicability of the Required Agricultural Practices, violates the plain language of Act 64 because it fails to include all farms under the purview of the RAPs. Under the Act, “Required Agricultural Practices (RAPs) shall be management standards to be followed by *all persons engaged in farming* in this State.” 6 V.S.A. § 4810(b) (emphasis added). The Act further mandates that “the Secretary shall amend by rule the required agricultural practices in order to improve water quality in the State [and] assure practices on *all farms* eliminate adverse impacts to water quality.” 6 V.S.A. § 4810a(a) (emphasis added). Under Act 64, “farming” means cultivating the land for food or fiber, raising animals or bees, producing maple syrup, operating greenhouses, and managing agricultural or fuel products from the farm. 6 V.S.A. §4802(2) (incorporating farming definition from 10 V.S.A. § 6001(22)). The *only* size limitation in the statutory definition of farming relates to horses (four or more equines).

The Act does not authorize AAFM to exempt categories of farms from the RAPs, whether for concerns about agency resources or for other reasons. AAFM may distinguish between farms that are subject to the small farm certification and those that are only subject to the RAPs (which are all remaining farms). 6 V.S.A. § 4810(a)(1). This would not bring every backyard chicken coop under the realm of the RAPs because a parcel of land is not a “farm” unless it is “devoted primarily to farming.” 2nd Draft RAPs at 2 § 2.12; *see also* 10 V.S.A § 6001(22) (designating multiple activities that qualify as farming), and would lawfully address AAFM’s concerns about having sufficient resources to administer the RAPs.

AAFM has committed to regulating all farming operations under the RAPs within the Vermont Lake Champlain Phosphorus TMDL Phase I Implementation Plan (Phase I Plan) and in the Revised Secretary’s Decision from Conservation Law Foundation’s petition to require mandatory pollution controls in Missisquoi Bay basin. “The Phase I Plan commits to ... increasing the base regulatory standards in the RAPs (formerly called Accepted Agricultural Practices (AAPs prior to Act 64 of 2015), which are applicable to all farming operations regardless of size or type.”²

Further, as some farmers in the State have pointed out, leaving regulation of smaller farms to municipal bodies is an invitation for inconsistent regulation and unfairness across the State, where some small farms may be subject to meaningful water quality requirements and others remain exempt. This would also be an abdication of authority by AAFM, the agency charged with implementing the RAPs under Act 64, and could impose substantial burdens on municipal governments that may lack the resources and expertise to develop agricultural regulatory systems where AAFM has failed to.

We are extremely concerned that despite the continued decline of Lake Champlain, the 2nd Draft RAPs limit AAFM’s authority to regulate farms. Currently, the “Accepted Agricultural

phosphorus levels over time” should be changed to “immediately implement practices to reduce phosphorus.” To allow farmers to continue to apply manure despite soil analyses demonstrating 20 ppm phosphorus levels will directly lead to increased phosphorus loading into Vermont’s waterways. In addition, the wording “eliminating or reducing” is in conflict. AAFM should require farmers to eliminate manure application once soils are saturated with phosphorus, as indicated by a 20 ppm soil test.

- Section 6.03(f) should require a standard form for record keeping on all farms. These records should be provided to the Secretary on an annual basis – not just “upon request” – so that records are incorporated into the public domain. For Medium and Large Farm Operations, AAFM should establish and implement an IT system designed to track the transport and application of manure and other agricultural wastes, similar to the electronic manifest system developed for hazardous waste. Once developed, users of the system would be able to create manifests electronically and transmit them through the system.
- Under 6.04(a), AAFM should establish specific standards for each of the mentioned conservation practices, as mandated by Act 64. See 6 V.S.A. § 4810a(10) (stating that AAFM shall “[e]stablish standards for soil conservation practices”). The wording “considered and implemented as practicable” should be changed to “implemented as practicable.” That is, the sentence should read: Conservation practices, including reduced tillage, conservation tillage, avoiding mechanical activities on saturated soils, addition of organic matter using manure, green manures and compost, sod and legume rotations, and the use of cover crops shall be implemented as practicable). The inclusion of the word “considered” unnecessarily weakens AAFM’s position; qualifying implementation with “as practicable” ensures AAFM’s ability to require actual action where practicable, as opposed to mere consideration.
- Under 6.04(c), the word “minimize” should be changed to “prevent” and the wording “reduce or eliminate” should be changed to “eliminate.” Gully erosion is a severe form of soil erosion caused by water moving in rills, which concentrate to form larger and more persistent erosion channels.⁴ Gully erosion is, by definition, problematic for healthy soils and waterways – regardless of whether discharges to waters are apparent. Grassed waterways should be strongly encouraged to mitigate gully erosion.
- Under 6.04(d), the first sentence should be revised to read: “annual croplands shall be required to be planted to cover crops.” Extreme weather conditions should be the only reason for allowing an exemption. Qualifying the cover crop requirement by including the phrase, “as soil, weather conditions, and generally accepted agronomic practices allow” puts too much discretion in the hands of the regulated community to determine whether conditions may or may not allow for cover cropping. In

erosion (or soil loss at T) is equivalent to 1.3 large dump trucks per acre per year.⁹ Agricultural regulations should not defend such obvious and significant phosphorus discharges into Lake Champlain.

Buffers Zones are Inappropriately Defined

Under Vermont statute, a buffer is defined as an “undisturbed area consisting of trees, shrubs, ground cover plants, duff layer, and generally uneven ground surface...” 10 V.S.A. § 1422(10). Undisturbed, vegetated buffers are critical for providing wildlife habitat, infiltrating pollutants, mitigating flood and erosion hazards, and serving as water temperature controls. The 2nd Draft RAPs’ list of authorized activities in buffer zones, including grazing, fertilizer application, and harvesting completely warps the definition and purpose of a buffer. See 2nd Draft RAPs at 17 § 6.07(d), (e), and (g). The result is that agricultural buffers will serve as phosphorus sources rather than sinks and lead to water quality degradation.

In addition, adjacent surface waters, including tributaries and intermittent streams should be buffered from croplands and other agricultural land uses by a minimum of 50 feet and from ditches by 20 feet to reflect best available science. The Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation river corridor procedures must inform land use guidance, similar to all other land use sectors in Vermont. The guidelines provided in Act 64 are *minimum* distances with the further requirement that buffers must “adequately address water quality needs” on a site-specific basis. 6 V.S.A. § 4810a(a)(6)(B). We are not aware of any data or studies showing that the proposed buffers in the 2nd draft RAPs are sufficient to protect water quality and reduce sediment loss. Moreover, stream buffers should be comprised of woody vegetation with deep roots, whenever possible, and then grasses or other perennial vegetation demonstrated to aid sediment filtering and erosion reduction.

AAFMs Should Take Action Now to Address Tile Drains

The State lacks much-needed information on tile drains specific to Vermont. We do not know the extent of existing tile drainage systems, but estimates range upwards of 50 percent of agricultural fields in some watersheds. In addition, tile drains are being installed at an extremely high rate in the Lake Champlain Basin, particularly Franklin County, yet there are not practices in place to ensure that the systems do not result in the discharge of more phosphorus into the lake. Existing research demonstrates there is significant cause for concern.^{10,11}

Until research is completed that demonstrates tile drains can be utilized in Vermont without causing unacceptable contributions of phosphorus pollution, continuing to allow





Any profits gleaned at this point by Vermonters should come with a sense of responsibility for the destruction wreaked upon the coal-mining communities and the lasting impacts to the waters of the world, our fisheries, and the women and the children of the planet, literally.

Research suggests [ExxonMobil](#) spent \$27m and [Shell](#) \$22m to obstruct climate legislation in 2015, with the American Petroleum Institute and two smaller trade associations spending a further \$74m[1] on behalf of the entire industry.

The report from London based non-profit InfluenceMap forensically analysed the amounts being spent by a representative sample of the most powerful entities in the global oil and gas industry, looking at a range of activities influencing policy makers and manipulating the public discourse on climate change, including spending on PR, social media and advertising.

Bill McKibben, Founder and Senior Advisor 350.org: *"It's remarkably useful to see exactly how much Exxon and its brethren are still spending to bend the climate debate. There's a shamelessness here that hopefully will be harder to maintain in the full light of day."*

The American Petroleum Institute is one of the most well funded and consistently climate-obstructive lobbying forces in the United States, with a total budget in excess of \$200m. The study estimates, through a forensic analysis of its IRS filings and careful study of its lobbying, PR, media and advertising activities, that \$65m of this is geared towards opposing ambitious climate policy. Its CEO Jack Gerard received annual compensation of just over \$14m in 2013[2], probably one of the world's highest paid lobbyists. In the run up to COP21 last year, he dismissed the Paris process as a "narrow political ideology"[3].

Peter Shumlin, Governor of the US State of Vermont: *"We now know that Exxon knew about climate change impacts for decades, and kept the public in the dark while they lobbied to prevent meaningful action. This report shows that while the world came together in Paris to embrace climate action in 2015, Exxon was doubling down with Big Tobacco tactics and obstruction. We cannot change this corporation by engaging with it, we must instead bring change from the outside by using economic pressure and divesting from Exxon."*

A recent news release by Walden Asset Management[4] noted that so far in 2016 alone, fifteen shareholder resolutions have been filed by US investors with fossil fuel companies concerning engagement with policy, likely largely motivated by climate policy lobbying. Zevin Asset Management was among the investors filing

these resolutions.

Sonia Kowal, President, Director of Socially Responsible Investing, Zevin Asset Management: *"As long-term investors in public equities, we are supporting and pressing for greater disclosure of how companies may be influencing critical areas of public policy and their use of corporate resources for this purpose both directly and through their trade associations. We are concerned that these influencing activities may not be aligned with the long term health of our portfolio as a whole."*




Lauren, James, and Johanna:



Dear VPIC Chair Tom Golodka,

We are writing to express our sincere hope for a fair and objective analysis of divestment fund cost and excess market access by VPIC, a position stated by Governor Sison, the Vermont House of Representatives expressed in H.R. 13, and by a majority of Vermont Senators. We appreciate Treasurer Pierce's efforts to examine and move this process forward. We hope the analysis undertaken by the Divestment Subcommittee will be an open-minded and fact-based process to develop recommendations that best Vermont might direct its investments in cost and responsibility in a way that meets the fiduciary responsibility of VPIC and protects its pension holders from the anticipated carbon liability.

We are concerned that as Chair of the VPIC subcommittee charged with this task, you appear to be predisposed against divestment, given your recent statements in the media. For example your statements in VermontWatchdog.org and VTDigger.org,¹ including:

- "Divestment, although it may sound good to certain people, is very difficult to do, or it will add layers-of cost that I don't know how prepared we are for something like that."
- "...we saw it at that point as an expensive way to approach something that would have minimal impact."
- "The difficult part would be screening that no hedge investment manager buys any of these in the future, whether it's equities or bonds, and making restrictions on our managers to do so. We've had managers tell us they wouldn't do business with the state if we put those types of restraints on them, so we'd be limited in regard to what investment managers we'd be able to work with. We may need to guard of some of the ones we have."
- "I'm very concerned about what cost it mean for the structure of VPIC."

We ask that given your apparent strong concerns about divestment, you consider resigning yourself as Chair of the Divestment Subcommittee and allow a more impartial-minded Chair to lead this process. That said, if your thinking has evolved since those statements were made, please let us know how you propose to proceed so the Subcommittee doesn't simply ask the same questions VPIC asked last year to the same people, presumably getting the same answer.





As the destructive coal mining process known as mountaintop removal ebbs in Appalachia, it is leaving behind what amounts to its own grim field of tombstones: A grossly disfigured landscape pocked with decapitated mountains standing flat as mesas and inhospitable to forest restoration.

The blight is more than vertical, for millions of tons of slag waste have been bulldozed down into the surrounding countryside for more than 40 years. The rubble has clogged countless streams and waterways and devastated the Appalachian environment with pollutants, rerouting rain torrents through homes and hamlets below.

The destruction, shocking to anyone flying across the scarred mountain remains, has now been measured in all three dimensions in a survey by researchers at Duke University. It presents a timely reminder of what has been lost to King Coal's furious bulldozing swaths across the mountains of West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia. Drastic changes to the landscape have left central Appalachian regions in the study's focus area 40 percent flatter after the bulldozers moved on, reducing elevations at the top while raising them at ground level by up to 10 feet because of the layers of accumulated slag.

"The physical effects of mountaintop mining are much more similar to volcanic eruptions where the entire landscape is fractured, deepened and decoupled from prior landscape evolution trajectories, effectively resetting the clock on landscape and ecosystem co-evolution," the report declares after sampling one West Virginia waste field laden with enough rubble to bury Manhattan Island.

The report holds little hope of returning to the verdant Appalachian past, where underground mining at least left the lofty horizon and snug hamlets undisturbed. As the industry decapitated mountains to get at the lucrative coal seams below the surface, it reassured residents that there would be adequate restoration. The resulting tabletops of hedges and grass are derided by residents in nearby hollows. "Lipstick on a corpse," says Ken Hechler, a tireless environmentalist and public servant in West Virginia.

While coal-fired power plants have been closing with the rise of cheap natural gas, the marketplace could easily shift back, and watchful environmentalists report that companies continue to apply for permits for mountaintop operations. At the same time, the Interior Department has been working on a stronger Stream Protection Rule, which pro-coal House Republicans are resisting. It aims to better protect thousands of miles of streams from abuse by requiring companies to operate responsibly, monitor streams and restore them to health.

The sorry history of Appalachia shows how difficult this will be. Over the years, initial court victories for the environment were repeatedly frustrated by evasive government delays and policy rulings favoring the industry's destructive practices. The hollows of Appalachia still ring with the rulings of Chief Judge Charles Haden II of United States District Court for his determined stand against King Coal 17 years ago in a Charleston, W.Va., courthouse:

"If there is any life form that cannot acclimate to life deep in a rubble pile, it is eliminated," he said after personally visiting mountaintop removal's destructive power in the land. "No effect on related environmental values is more adverse than obliteration."

MONTPELIER – Gov. Peter Shumlin issued the following statement on the bankruptcy of Peabody Energy, America’s largest private coal company. The Governor has called for Vermont to divest from coal and Exxon Mobil assets. The House has passed a resolution supporting the Governor’s position and 17 Senators have signed a letter to the Vermont Pension Investment Committee (VPIC) in support of that resolution. A VPIC subcommittee considering divestment is meeting today.

“On the same day that VPIC is meeting to consider divestment, there is breaking news that should make their decision much easier. Today, America’s largest private coal company has filed for bankruptcy, making clear what we already know to be true: Coal is a terrible financial investment. Today’s news is just the latest shoe to drop. The Dow Jones U.S. Coal Index eight years ago was valued near 750. Today it is valued around 34. And earlier this year, America’s second largest coal company went bankrupt.

“Coal will continue to lose value as more businesses, governments, and others recognize the terrible impacts it has on our economy, environment, and humanity. There is absolutely no reason Vermont should be in the business of owning coal stocks. I hope VPIC will make the responsible decision and move forward with divestment, and I look forward to hearing their recommendations to the Legislature on May 3.”

The American Petroleum Institute is one of the most well funded and consistently climate-obstructive lobbying forces in the United States, with a total budget in excess of \$200m. The study estimates, through a forensic analysis of its IRS filings and careful study of its lobbying, PR, media and advertising activities, that \$65m of this is geared towards opposing ambitious climate policy. Its CEO Jack Gerard received annual compensation of just over \$14m in 2013[2], probably one of the world's highest paid lobbyists. In the run up to COP21 last year, he dismissed the Paris-process as a "narrow political ideology"[3].

Peter Shumlin, Governor of the US State of Vermont: *"We now know that Exxon knew about climate change impacts for decades, and kept the public in the dark while they lobbied to prevent meaningful action. This report shows that while the world came together in Paris to embrace climate action in 2015, Exxon was doubling down with Big Tobacco tactics and obstruction. We cannot change this corporation by engaging with it, we must instead bring change from the outside by using economic pressure and divesting from Exxon."*

A recent news release by Walden Asset Management^[4] noted that so far in 2016 alone, fifteen shareholder resolutions have been filed by US investors with fossil fuel companies concerning engagement with policy, likely largely motivated by climate policy lobbying. Zevin Asset Management was among the investors filing these resolutions.

Sonia Kowal, President, Director of Socially Responsible Investing, Zevin Asset Management: *"As long-term investors in public equities, we are supporting and pressing for greater disclosure of how companies may be influencing critical areas of public policy and their use of corporate resources for this purpose both directly and through their trade associations. We are concerned that these influencing activities may not be aligned with the long term health of our portfolio as a whole."*

[1] The report found obstructive spending for three trade associations: the API (\$65m) the WSPA (\$6m) and the APPEA (\$3m). A portion of this trade association funding (\$9m) was attributed to Shell and ExxonMobil, which is included in their totals also.



EPA Adds Sites to National Priorities List to Reduce Risk to Public Health and Environment

WASHINGTON – The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is adding five and proposing to add eight hazardous waste sites to the Superfund program's National Priorities List (NPL). These are sites with known or threatened hazardous waste releases that could pose risks to public health and the environment.

"Cleaning up hazardous waste sites is vitally important to the health of America's communities," said Mathy Stanislaus, assistant administrator for EPA's Office of Land and Emergency Management. "Our goal is to give communities the best opportunity for productive use of a site after it is cleaned up."

A site's addition to the NPL helps address potential adverse human health impacts. Academic research shows that investment in Superfund cleanups reduces the incidence of congenital abnormalities in infants by as much as 25 percent for those living within approximately a mile and a quarter of a site. Cleanups involving lead-contaminated soil have contributed to documented reduced blood-lead levels in children. If left unaddressed, elevated blood-lead levels may result in irreversible neurological deficits, such as lowered intelligence and attention-related behavioral problems.

"Adding a site to the NPL generates new jobs and creates stronger local economies that will strengthen communities for years to come," continued Assistant Administrator Stanislaus. "A study by researchers at Duke University and the University of Pittsburgh found that once a site has all cleanup remedies in place and is deleted from the NPL, nearby property values increased 18.6-24.5 percent as compared to their pre-NPL proposal values. Moreover, cleanups increase

local communities' and state governments' tax revenue, and help to create jobs during and after cleanup. For example, at 454 of the 850 sites supporting use or reuse activities, EPA found, at the end of fiscal year 2015, that approximately 3,900 businesses had ongoing operations that were generating annual sales of more than \$29 billion and employing more than 108,000 people."

Currently, more than 850 Superfund sites nationwide have some type of actual or planned reuse underway. For example, in the town of Corinna, Maine, the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, local officials and stakeholders worked together to integrate a reuse plan for the Eastland Woolen Mill Superfund site. The 22-acre site is a former textile mill that operated from 1909 to 1996. Disposal practices resulted in extensive contamination of soil, groundwater and numerous private drinking water wells. With EPA support, this collaboration resulted in the Corinna Village Center Reuse Plan that focuses on mixed-use redevelopment of downtown Corinna and includes commercial, residential and recreational areas.

EPA responds to requests from states, tribes and communities to propose a site for NPL addition when non-NPL response options have not proved viable. Prior to adding a site to the NPL, the agency works closely with states and tribes and seeks public comment. For each of the 13 sites announced today, EPA has either received letters of state officials' concurrence supporting the NPL listing or, after working closely with the state, received no objection to adding the site to the NPL. Community partnerships are also critical to Superfund site cleanups. EPA's goal is to work with community partners at every site by establishing an effective process with the necessary tools and information needed to fully explore future uses before the cleanup remedy's selection. This approach gives the Agency the best chance of ensuring remedies are consistent with a site's likely future use.

Under Superfund law, only sites EPA adds to the NPL are eligible to receive federal funding for long-term, permanent cleanup. The list serves as the basis for prioritizing both enforcement actions against potentially responsible parties and long-term EPA Superfund cleanup funding. The Superfund program operates on the principle that polluters should pay for the cleanups rather than passing the costs on to taxpayers. EPA searches for parties legally responsible for contaminating a site, and holds those parties accountable for cleanup costs.

This year marks the 35th anniversary of the enactment of the Comprehensive Environmental, Response, Compensation and Liability Act, the law creating the Superfund program. The Superfund law gives EPA the authority to clean up hazardous substance releases and directs EPA to update the NPL. EPA and its partners continue to discover new sites qualifying for the NPL. These sites are the result of past industrial practices as well as other activities.

The sites in today's rules potentially affect drinking water, groundwater, soil, wetlands, and fishing for human consumption. Contaminants found at the sites include arsenic, mercury, uranium, cadmium, copper, manganese, zinc, aluminum, chromium, lead, trichloroethane (TCA) and trichloroethylene (TCE).

The following five sites have been added to the NPL:

- * Illinois - Old American Zinc Plant (former zinc smelter) in Fairmont City.
- * Iowa - PCE Former Dry Cleaner (former dry cleaner) in Atlantic.
- * Nebraska - Iowa-Nebraska Light & Power Co (former gas plant manufacturer) in Norfolk.
- * New Jersey - Former Kil-Tone Company (former pesticides manufacturer) in Vineland.
- * New Mexico - Lea and West Second Street (ground water plume) in Roswell.

The following eight sites have been proposed for addition to the NPL:

- * California - Argonaut Mine (former hard rock mining area) in Jackson.
- * Colorado - Bonita Peak Mining District (former hard rock mining area) in San Juan County.
- * Indiana - Riverside Ground Water Contamination (ground water plume) in Indianapolis.
- * New York - Wappinger Creek (site of various former industrial operations) in Dutchess County.
- * Ohio - Valley Pike VOCs (former tire and heavy duty truck molding manufacturer) in Riverside.
- * Puerto Rico - Dorado Ground Water Contamination (ground water contamination) in Dorado.

* Texas - Eldorado Chemical Co., Inc (former cleaning products manufacturer) in Live Oak.

* West Virginia - North 25th Street Glass and Zinc (former glass and zinc manufacturer) in Clarksburg.



Dear VPIC Chair Tom Górnka,

We are writing to express our sincere hope for a fair and objective analysis of divestment from coal and liquefied natural gas by VPIC, a position shared by Governor Shaunin, the Vermont House of Representatives (as expressed in H.R. 53, and by a majority of Vermont Senators. We appreciate Treasurer Bennett's efforts to expedite and move this process forward. We hope the analysis undertaken by the Investment Subcommittee will be an open-minded and fact-based process to develop recommendations for how Vermont might direct its investments in coal and ExxonMobil in a way that meets the fiduciary responsibility of VPIC, and protects its pension holders from the anticipated carbon future.

We are concerned that as Chair of the VPIC subcommittee charged with this task, you appear to be predisposed against divestment, given your recent statements in the media. For example your statements in VermontWatchdog.org and VTigger.org, including:

- "Divestment, although it may sound good to certain people, is very difficult to do, as it will add layers of cost that I don't know how prepared we are for something like that."
- "...we are ill at that point as an expensive way to approach something that would have no real impact."
- "The difficult part would be screening that as future investment manager buys any of these in the future, whether it's equities or bonds, and making restrictions on our managers to do so. We've had managers tell us they wouldn't do business with the state if we put these types of restrictions on them, so we'd be limited in regards to what investment managers we'd be able to work with. We may need to get rid of some of the ones we have."
- "I'm very concerned about what does it mean for the structure of VPIC."

We ask that given your apparent strong concerns about divestment, you consider resigning yourself as Chair of the Divestment Subcommittee and allow a more open-minded Chair to lead this process. That said, if your thinking has evolved since those statements were made, please let us know how you propose to proceed so the Subcommittee doesn't simply ask the same questions VPIC asked last year, to the same people, presumably getting the same answer.

Can coal companies afford to clean up coal country?

A worsening financial crisis for the nation's biggest coal companies is sparking concerns that U.S. taxpayers could be stuck with hundreds of millions, if not billions, of dollars in cleanup costs across a landscape of shuttered mines stretching from Appalachia to the northern Plains.

Worries about huge liabilities associated with hundreds of polluted mine sites have mounted as Peabody Energy, the world's largest publicly traded coal company, was forced to appeal to creditors for an extra 30 days to pay its debts. Two of the four other biggest U.S. coal companies have declared bankruptcy in the past six months.

Under a 1977 federal law, coal companies are required to clean up mining sites when they're shut down. But the industry's plummeting fortunes have raised questions about whether companies can fulfill their obligations to rehabilitate vast strip mines in Western states — many of which are on federally owned property — as well as mountaintop-removal mining sites in the East.

A number of smaller companies have defaulted or skimmed on cleanup obligations, leaving behind abandoned strip mines and denuded mountains. Some are simply eyesores, unhealed scars on the landscape that can be seen for miles. Others are perpetual sources of water pollution, slowly leaking acidic and otherwise toxic wastes into streams and groundwater supplies.

Now coal giants are facing outcomes similar to those experienced by some of the smaller companies. Several are struggling to make payments on debts for ill-timed multibillion-dollar acquisitions of their rivals in recent years. On top of that, they have been financially squeezed by competition from cheap natural gas and declining U.S. and Chinese demand for coal.

With some of the country's largest coal companies in bankruptcy, about 120,000 retired miners and their families in West Virginia could lose their pension and health care accounts. For many families in this region, this means losing their only regular source of income. (Jorge Ribas/The Washington Post)

The biggest coal companies typically pay third parties to ensure that mine sites are cleaned up in the event of financial hardship. But in recent years, many coal companies have relied on a cheaper technique called "self-bonding," pledging only their own names and financial wherewithal to guarantee their cleanup obligations.

With mounting losses and debt loads, the companies do not have enough money to pay for all their obligations, and self-bonding is “not worth [the] paper [it’s] written on,” Steve Jakubowski, a bankruptcy lawyer with the firm Robbins, Salomon & Patt, said in an email. In a bankruptcy, where Alpha Natural Resources is now, a judge can decide which creditors are paid and how much — and state and federal governments could be left holding the bag for reclamation costs.

“There is a lot of liability out there and a lot of uncertainty,” said Shannon Anderson, a lawyer with the Power River Basin Resource Council, a Wyoming nonprofit group that supports tougher rules for cleaning up mine sites.

Peabody alone has cleanup obligations of nearly \$1.4 billion guaranteed by self-bonding, according to statements filed by the company last year with the Securities and Exchange Commission. Arch Coal and Alpha — the nation’s second- and fourth-largest coal companies — have self-guaranteed liabilities exceeding \$485 million and \$640 million, respectively, in reclamation costs.

The coal giants are currently in no condition to spend those amounts. Arch and Alpha filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection last year. Peabody stock prices have fallen by more than 97 percent over the past year, and the coal behemoth’s market value at Thursday’s closing price was less than \$44.3 million. Barclays Capital said the company’s debt-to-capital ratio was a towering 88 percent.

Bankruptcy restructuring could provide coal companies with a way of escaping obligations to restore land.

It wouldn’t be the first time the federal government covered the costs of corporations’ environmental pollution. Something similar happened during the 2010 General Motors bailout, when the federal government injected money into an independent trust that took on the cleanup of about 60 contaminated sites.

Obama administration officials have voiced concern recently about the reliability of self-bonding agreements for some of the biggest coal operations in the Powder River Basin, an area that straddles the Wyoming and Montana border and contains some of the biggest coal mines in the world. The Interior Department sent a letter last month to Wyoming regulators warning that self-bonding agreements for two of Alpha Coal’s mines had fallen “below the amount necessary to assure that the operator will faithfully comply with all rules and regulations” if the company goes out of business.

In Illinois, environmental groups and industry experts are closely watching three Peabody mines with cleanup obligations of \$92 million covered by self-bonding. Howard A. Learner, executive director of the Environmental Law and Policy Center, urged state officials in a blog post to force the troubled company to buy surety bonds to “make sure that our taxpayers aren’t holding the financial bag.” Selling surety bonds is similar to paying insurance premiums to cover the cleanup costs. But it might be too late for Peabody to find anyone interested in taking that risk.

“If state officials don’t step up now, their next step might be standing in line in the federal bankruptcy court to protect Illinois taxpayers,” Learner said.

Jakubowski, the bankruptcy expert, said the coal companies will have a hard time wriggling out of cleanup costs linked to mines that continue to operate, and Anthony Young, an analyst at the Macquarie Group, a global investment banking firm, said he expects that as much as 90 percent of Peabody’s mines, mostly in Wyoming’s Powder River Basin, will continue to operate.

But cleanup costs tied to mines that have shut down or will shut down in bankruptcy — most likely those such as Alpha’s in the Appalachians and Midwest — could end up being billed to taxpayers.

How the big coal companies got to this point is a lesson in hubris and overreach. Alpha bought rival Massey Energy for \$7 billion. Arch Coal — whose top executives received \$8 million in bonuses the day before filing for bankruptcy, according to a report by Energy and Environment News — bought International Coal for \$3.4 billion. Peabody paid \$5.1 billion for Macarthur Coal. And Walter Energy bought Western Coal for \$3.3 billion.

In 2011, when the merger wave picked up speed, natural gas prices were at a healthy \$4 a thousand cubic feet, there was an international commodity boom and China's economy was speeding ahead. Now commodity prices have slumped, China has slowed and natural gas prices hover around \$2 a thousand cubic feet.

"I understand what management was thinking at time," Young said. "Obviously, they didn't stress-test their balance sheets. It has cost people their companies and many people their jobs."

Pavel Molchanov, an energy analyst at the advisory firm Raymond James, said the entire industry is in long-term decline because of efforts to reduce coal use and slow climate change.

"It really is striking that virtually every large U.S. coal producer is bankrupt or on the cusp of bankruptcy," Molchanov said.

The financial crisis highlights what environmental groups say are deep inadequacies in cleanup requirements for coal companies. Often, activists say, mining companies are simply given a pass after meeting the most rudimentary requirements to cover up open pits with dirt and rock. Some environmental groups are pressing for legislation requiring "contemporaneous reclamation" — forcing mining companies to clean up after each phase of mining rather than waiting for the entire project to be completed.

A report last fall by the Natural Resources Defense Council said barely 10 percent of the 450 square miles of land torn up by mining in Montana, North Dakota and Wyoming met reclamation requirements for final bonding release.

"States are not holding the line on what is required," said Sharon Buccino, director of the NRDC's Land and Wildlife Program. "You're left with a trashed landscape and contaminated water."

Meanwhile, because of the financial crisis, taxpayers and coal communities face the real possibility that even minimum cleanup requirements will not be met, which Buccino said is "exactly why self-bonding should be limited."

"We should not have to sacrifice the health of the land and its residents to the financial health of coal companies," she said.

Rockefeller Family Fund Divests from ExxonMobil, Fossil Fuel

The Rockefeller Family Fund has issued a statement announcing its intent to divest from fossil fuels. The process will be completed as quickly as practically possible.

The statement singled out ExxonMobil, as it has been accused of covering up the role of fossil fuels in climate change and interfering in government efforts to take action on global warming, fearing that it would limit the company's profits.

The fund was founded by relatives of John D. Rockefeller, the co-founder of Standard Oil, and the statement states: "While the global community works to eliminate the use of fossil fuels, it makes little sense—financially or ethically—to continue holding investments in these companies. There is no sane rationale for companies to continue to explore for new sources of hydrocarbons. The science and intent enunciated by the Paris agreement cannot be more clear: far from finding additional sources of fossil fuels, we must keep most of the already discovered reserves in the ground if there is any hope for human and natural ecosystems to survive and thrive in the decades ahead.

"We would be remiss if we failed to focus on what we believe to be the morally reprehensible conduct on the part of ExxonMobil. Evidence appears to suggest that the company worked since the 1980s to confuse the public about climate change's march, while simultaneously spending millions to fortify its own infrastructure against climate change's destructive consequences and track new exploration opportunities as the Arctic's ice receded.

"Appropriate authorities will determine if the company violated any laws, but as a matter of good governance, we cannot be associated with a company exhibiting such apparent contempt for the public interest.

"To operationalize this decision, the Board has instructed its advisors, effective immediately, to eliminate holdings of ExxonMobil, and all coal, and tar sands-based companies outside the portions of the portfolio managed by third parties, and to keep exposures for these three categories of investment below 1 percent across the entire portfolio. The Family Fund's Finance Committee will soon be entering the second phase of its divestment work, which will entail seeking suitable alternatives to certain commingled funds now held. The field of Socially Responsible Investing is dynamic and growing and we are confident that a variety of options will soon emerge for mid-sized endowments such as ours.

“Needless to say, the Rockefeller family has had a long and profitable history investing in the oil industry, including ExxonMobil. These are not decisions, therefore, that have been taken lightly or without much consideration of their import. But history moves on, as it must. Indeed, it is past time for all people of good will to do everything in their collective power to make our new path one that recognizes the deep interdependence between humanity’s future and the health of our natural systems.”

ExxonMobil Denies Wrongdoing

ExxonMobil has denied any wrongdoing and has defended its record on climate change. The company states that it has reported information about the business risks posed by climate change for many years in its reports.

The company confirmed has received a subpoena from the New York Attorney General’s Office for “documents relating to climate change.” The U.S. Department of Justice has requested that the FBI determine whether an investigation is warranted, but no official investigation has been ordered to date.

Wall Street's Retreat From King Coal

The grave environmental damage from coal-fired power plants has done nothing to deter the Senate majority leader, [Mitch McConnell](#), from decrying a “war on coal” and orchestrating his own war against the Obama administration’s [climate change](#) agenda. But he and other coal-state Republicans would be foolish to ignore the growing consensus on Wall Street that King Coal, for all its legendary political power, has turned into a decidedly bad investment.

[JPMorgan Chase announced this month](#) that it would no longer finance new coal-fired power plants in the United States or other advanced nations, joining Bank of America, Citigroup and Morgan Stanley in retreating from a fuel that provides about one-third of the nation’s electricity and accounts for about one-quarter of the carbon emissions that feed global warming.

Cleaner and cheaper natural gas is fast becoming the preferred investment, a blunt marketplace reality that is sure to weaken coal’s grip on the planet as much as moral and environmental concerns. Last week’s [announcement](#) by Peabody Energy, the world’s largest private-sector coal company, that it may have to seek bankruptcy protection, just as three other major coal producers have done recently, provided a dramatic confirmation of this trend.

Main Street also seems to be getting the message. Two weeks ago, Gov. Kate Brown of Oregon signed [ambitious legislation](#) — agreed to by environmentalists, consumer groups and power producers — that requires the state’s two largest utilities to stop importing out-of-state coal-generated power by 2030 and to use renewable energy to meet half of the demand of their customers by 2040. Oregon’s only in-state coal-fired plant will close by 2020.

Even so, Mr. McConnell persists in his campaign to block the administration’s clean power rule, the centerpiece of Mr. Obama’s plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by steering power producers away from dirty coal-fired plants to cleaner sources of energy. Ever ready with new and more mischievous strategies, Mr. McConnell has encouraged court challenges to the rule and has gone so far as to tell Republican-led states to ignore it, further deepening his party’s sorry retreat into science denial.

Though reeling now, the coal industry insists it will rebound by selling more to markets like China. But this is little comfort to workers who can read the markets better than Mr. McConnell can. Rather than encouraging obstruction, the senator, who received \$273,850 in [campaign contributions](#) from the coal industry for his 2014

re-election, should be taking the lead in crafting government programs to help the industry, miners and communities as they face a hard period of inevitable transition.

Even as the administration cracks down on coal — in recent weeks it has also suspended new coal leasing on federal lands — it has called for job training and other assistance to ease the pain. These are the types of creative adjustments that Mr. McConnell and his colleagues should be tackling, instead of clinging to King Coal's fading past.

Subject: An Assessment of the Economic Value of Clean Water in Lake Champlain | University of Vermont

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The regional economy, quality of life and tourism rely on clean water in Lake Champlain and its surrounding basin. This project explored elements of this relationship between water quality and property valuation, tourism expenditures and regional economic activity at various scales.

At the parcel scale, both single family residential and seasonal home purchasers associated higher water quality with increased selling price. A one meter increase in water clarity is equated with a nearly 3% average increase in single family home value, and a 37% average increase in seasonal home value. Proximity to the Lake also contributes significantly to property valuation. Single family and seasonal residences within 100 m of Lake Champlain are expected to sell for nearly 30% and 49% more than similar residences that are located outside this area. Scenario analysis of changes in total phosphorous in the Lake from both climate change and meeting legal maximum daily load targets found that increased loading associated with climate change is estimated to result in a \$7,000 average price decrease for single family dwellings, while reduced loading from TMDL implementation would result in a \$15,200 average price increase for single family dwellings.

At the scale of lake-side towns, water clarity during the peak summer months of July and August indicate a significant impact on lodging expenditures, an indicator of tourism spending more broadly. A linear regression model estimated a \$2,303 increase per average lodging unit per meter of water clarity increase. Extrapolating to the five-town scale concludes that a one-meter improvement in water clarity is expected to lead to a 10% increase (\$110,544) in room expenditures for the month of August alone.

At the regional scale an input-output model was constructed for a six-county lakeshore economy in Vermont and New York. County-level employment, income, industry and household characteristics were used to assess the economic flows among sectors. The input-output model suggests that for each dollar of labor income required within lake-related tourist sectors an additional \$0.57 in labor income through indirect industry inputs and induced impacts from additional spending of households will be generated. Similarly, each dollar of value-added (taxes, property income, profits) income generated in tourism-related sectors generates another \$0.62. In terms of employment, every new job related to the lake tourism economy creates an additional 0.4 jobs to support indirect and induced activities. The \$300 million estimated annual tourist expenditures in Vermont's four main lakeside counties generate an additional \$72.75 million in spending and nearly 1,070 jobs. Extrapolating from the town-scale model, a one-meter decrease in water clarity during the months

of July and August would lead to the loss of 195 full-time equivalent jobs, a \$12.6 million reduction in tourism expenditures and a total economic reduction of nearly \$16.8 million.

This analysis represents a snapshot in time. The example of Georgia, VT underscores the importance of understanding how changes over time (i.e. downward trending water quality) might affect real estate transactions, vacation rentals and tourism expenditures as losses in any of these sectors are further magnified when considering their effect on employment and indirect expenditures. Moving forward, scenarios ranging from individual events (e.g. fishing tournaments) to long-term environmental and economic conditions could be further analysed. Building on this framework could allow for rapid assessment of land use plans, zoning regulations, and environmental restoration, while additional scenario analysis could inform regional, integrated economic development and watershed management planning.

As Coal Prospects Decline, a Colorado Town Reconsiders Marijuana

HOTCHKISS, Colo. — This mountain town of coal miners and organic farmers wasted no time in saying no to marijuana. After Colorado’s 2012 vote legalizing marijuana, local leaders concerned about crime and the character of their tranquil downtown twice voted to ban the recreational and medical pot shops springing up in other towns.

But then coal crumbled. One mine here in the North Fork Valley has shut down amid a wave of coal bankruptcies and slowdowns, and another has announced that it will go dark. The closings added to a landscape of layoffs and economic woes concussing mining-dependent towns from West Virginia to Wyoming. And as Hotchkiss searches for a new economic lifeline, some people are asking: What about marijuana?

“If we could get it legalized right now, we could create some jobs, and we need the tax revenue,” said Thomas Wills, a town trustee who runs a used-book store and supports allowing some marijuana stores. “Downtown’s not going to be all flashing green crosses and dancing marijuana leaves. You can make it as unobtrusive as you want.”

Next month, Hotchkiss will vote on whether to undo its ban and welcome marijuana shops and the traffic and taxes that could come with them. With cannabis sales soaring to nearly \$1 billion across Colorado, and big states such as California poised to embrace legalization, wary towns like Hotchkiss are looking at the economics of marijuana and starting to reconsider.

“It’s an evolving discussion in a lot of communities,” said Kevin Bommer, deputy director of the Colorado Municipal League, which tracks local debates on the issue. Six Colorado towns are voting in April on whether to scrap their prohibitions on marijuana stores, and in January, another narrowly voted to lift a moratorium and approve wholesale marijuana growers.

Though 23 states and the District of Columbia now allow some forms of recreational or medical marijuana, legalization is still a checkerboard, with marijuana retailers and cultivations clustered in big cities such as Seattle or Washington and scattered randomly through rural areas.

As scores of cities and counties banned marijuana sales, they cited worries about public safety, property values, youth use and the image problems that might come with becoming their county's go-to source for legal marijuana. Others passed moratoriums to wait and see how legalization unfolded in neighboring towns that plunged in.

"There were a lot of questions and unknowns," said Mayor Joel Benson of Buena Vista, a town in Colorado's central mountains that allows medical marijuana and is weighing whether to allow recreational sales. "It was really just to give people time to wrestle with the ins and outs."

Places like Pierce County, south of Seattle, discovered that simply banning dispensaries did not keep out marijuana. In February 2015, the police shut down an illegal grow house next to a day care center in Gig Harbor. The County Council passed a series of what it called tight regulations, and in December repealed its ban on marijuana sales and production in unincorporated corners of the county.

Here in Hotchkiss, the push to allow marijuana has touched off conversations about the soul of the town. It is tucked into a sunny mountain valley draped with peach orchards and vineyards. But the coal mines up the valley were an economic mainstay for generations, and people say that tourism and boutique agriculture cannot replace good-paying mining jobs. Unemployment here in Delta County is 5.3 percent higher than the statewide average of 3.2 percent.

"People have been tightening the belt or just plain moving away," said Robbie Winne, who runs the Rose, a secondhand clothing shop along Hotchkiss's main street. She said she supported the marijuana plan as a way to entice more visitors, or at least capture some traffic as people passed through on their way to ski towns.

Ms. Winne said that although pot was no panacea, at least it could perk up business and tax revenue. Colorado collected about \$135 million in taxes and fees from marijuana sales last year, and small governments have taken in millions from local sales taxes. In the tiny town of DeBeque, near the Utah border, officials told Colorado Public Radio that they were considering using the tax money from marijuana to start a scholarship fund or repair streets, curbs and gutters.

Wendell Koontz, a coal mine geologist and the mayor of Hotchkiss, said the price was not worth it. He said he worried about whether the three-person marshal's office and small town staff could deal with the complications of new marijuana businesses, and about the reputation of a place that proclaims itself the "Friendliest Town Around."

"There's a concern that kind of atmosphere could be lost," he said. "And once it's gone, it's gone."

Others say it is time for a bold move. Mary Hockenbery, a New Mexico transplant who runs an eclectic art gallery in an old church, has been a leading voice behind the initiative. Coal is not coming back, she said, and though she and others have tried to spruce up the main street with cosmetic measures like new flower boxes, the town needs more.

"We're dying," she said. "This town needs an infusion of cash. Anything will help."

As Coal's Future Grows Murkier, Banks Pull Financing

On Wednesday the world's largest private-sector coal company, [Peabody Energy](#), said that it might have to file for bankruptcy protection, following a path already taken by three of the nation's other large coal companies.

Peabody has been trying to sell three of its mines in Colorado and New Mexico to raise cash. But the sale to Bowie Resource Partners appears to have stalled amid the difficult financing environment. Bowie did not comment. A Peabody spokesman said the company "stands ready to complete the sale of assets to Bowie."

Coal, like railroads, steel and other engines of the nation's industrial expansion in the 19th and early 20th centuries, helped drive Wall Street's profits for generations. More than a century later, the coal industry is in a free fall and the banks are pulling away.

"Given the state of the coal industry today, I think Mr. Morgan himself might make the same decision," said Jean Strouse, a biographer of the banker.

Some banks say they are trying to do their part to curtail climate change by moving away from coal projects and financing ventures that produce less carbon. But bankers also say there is a more basic reason for the shift: Lending to coal companies is too risky and could ultimately prove unprofitable.

Coal companies are being squeezed by competition from less expensive energy sources like natural gas and by stiffer regulations — pressures that show no signs of letting up.

As a result, even the most secure loans — like those made to companies emerging from bankruptcy, known as debtor-in-possession loans — are increasingly off limits for many banks, according to bankers and industry lawyers.

And it is not just big banks. Even many more daring investors like hedge funds and [private equity](#) firms, which are usually eager to pounce on industries in distress, are shying away from coal because of deep uncertainty about its future.

It is a starkly different scene in the oil industry, where investors are raising hundreds of millions of dollars to snap up the debt and equity of troubled companies that are struggling with an oversupply of oil. Despite the immediate stress, many investors expect the oil glut will burn off by next year and prices will rebound.

But in the coal country of Appalachia, it is unclear whether many unprofitable mines can ever make money again.

“There is certainly no \$40 billion titan looking to make a big play in coal right now,” said Marshall Huebner, co-leader of the insolvency and restructuring practice at Davis Polk & Wardwell who has represented several coal companies in recent bankruptcies.

Despite the challenges, the coal industry still powers roughly a third of the nation’s electricity. Industry officials say the business will eventually bounce back, once supplies burn off and demand for coal rebounds in places like China.

“Coal is part of our future, and I think the banks are taking a shortsighted view,” said Mike Duncan, president of the American Coalition for Clean Coal Electricity, an industry group. “They are ignoring a huge market and buying into rhetoric that just doesn’t work.”

Environmental groups, meanwhile, are hoping the banks’ reluctance will hasten the collapse of coal. Groups like the Rainforest Action Network have been pressuring banks for months to reduce coal lending.

“With much of the world committed to stabilizing the climate, we need the banks to follow quickly with measures to end coal financing altogether,” said Ben Collins, a senior campaigner at Rainforest Action Network.

But the banks’ retreat could inflict collateral damage on an industry that employs tens of thousands of workers and needs financing not only to keep operating, but also to clean up coal mines after they close. If coal companies are unable to pay for the mine reclamation, taxpayers could be on the hook for the cleanup costs.

As big American lenders pull back, a few foreign banks, like Deutsche Bank, have been willing to step in, industry officials say.

In its latest annual corporate responsibility report, Deutsche Bank said it was phasing out financing for projects that employ so-called mountaintop removal mining, which environmentalists say is particularly harmful. But the bank’s policy statement did not commit to the type of broad reduction in coal exposure that many American lenders have made in recent months.

In a statement, a bank spokeswoman said that Deutsche Bank is one of the “most prominent banks when it comes to clean energy financing.” She added that the bank “has very strict guidelines governing any financing decisions. We conduct a thorough and detailed analysis on a case-by-case approach, drawing on a deep understanding of wider socioeconomic and environmental trends.”

Even most American banks are not cutting off funding to the industry overnight, saying that for the moment coal remains a major source of energy, particularly outside the United States.

JPMorgan, for instance, is halting financing of new coal-fired plants in wealthy nations like the United States, but will continue to lend to such plants in the developing world, where in some places the coal market is still thriving. To receive financing, however, these plants need to use certain environmentally sound technologies, according the bank’s new policy.

Changes to the coal lending policy at Bank of America have created tension between senior leadership and rank-and-file bankers.

Senior leaders wanted the bank's energy lending strategy to reflect "a transition from a high-carbon to a low-carbon economy," said James Mahoney, who oversees public policy issues at the bank and worked on the new coal policy. It is part of Bank of America's current effort at "responsible growth" — which entails not taking undue risks like lending to a troubled industry, Mr. Mahoney said.

But the shift has been uncomfortable for some of the bankers serving the coal industry.

"It put them in a difficult position to say to the companies they have worked with for years, 'We are pulling back,'" Mr. Mahoney said. "It runs counter to everything we do as a client-focused company."

Speaking at an environmental conference at the United Nations in January, Bank of America's chief executive, Brian T. Moynihan, acknowledged the internal tensions around coal but said that the bank was trying to pull back gradually from the sector.

"When you have real clients involved, these decisions get difficult," Mr. Moynihan said. "But I think the view of the people working on it is: We have to help people make the transition."

That transition seemed to accelerate last week with the warning from Peabody that it would miss \$71 million in interest payments.

One of Peabody's best hopes for avoiding bankruptcy, analysts said, was the potential sale of three mines to Bowie Natural Resources.

Bowie is a rare breed of coal company. It has been expanding its operations, focusing largely on Utah, a state that still relies primarily on coal to generate electricity. Still, Bowie in recent weeks has apparently had trouble raising the full \$650 million in debt to acquire the mines.

In many debt deals, banks would cover the shortfall. But Deutsche Bank and Citigroup agreed only to make their best effort to raise the debt for Bowie. The banks did not commit any of their own money, as a traditional underwriter might do.

Those best efforts might not be enough.

Our Water System: What a Waste

Austin, Tex. — AMERICA has a water problem. To put it simply, the national network for providing safe, clean water is falling apart.

This state of affairs, which is the focus of a summit meeting on Tuesday at the White House, threatens more than our drinking water supplies. Water is used in every sector of industry, grows our food, affects our health and props up our energy system.

The price of this neglect will be high. In Flint, Mich., the mayor has estimated that it will cost as much as \$1.5 billion to fix or replace lead pipes. Over all, repairing our water and wastewater systems could cost \$1.3 trillion or more, according to the American Society of Civil Engineers. We need to do this to improve water quality, protect natural ecosystems and ensure a reliable supply for our cities, agriculture and industry.

The problem is a result of many factors, including old, leaky pipes; archaic pricing; and a remarkable lack of data about how much water we use.

In cities across the country, billions of gallons of water disappear every day through leaky pipes. Houston alone lost 22 billion gallons in 2012. As the water expert David Sedlak at the University of California, Berkeley, has noted, the water system is facing a double whammy: It has reached the end of its service life just as climate change and population growth have increased its burdens. No wonder the civil engineers society gave the nation's drinking water systems a grade of D in 2013.

Wastewater treatment systems are also in serious need of upgrading. Flooding strains treatment plants and sewer systems in many older cities, causing them to discharge untreated sewage whenever rainfall or snowmelt overwhelm them. After Hurricane Sandy, treatment plants in the New York area backed up, with sewage

flowing the wrong direction from drainage pipes. The New York Times noted that in one neighborhood “a plume of feces and wastewater burst through the street like a geyser.”

Droughts also jeopardize water supplies, causing cities in the West to reach farther or dig deeper to get their water. Outside Las Vegas, Lake Mead, fed by the Colorado River, was recently measured at 39 percent of capacity.

These problems are compounded by an antiquated system of regulations, dysfunctional water markets, policies that encourage overpumping, and contracts that discourage conservation by requiring customers to pay for water they don't use. These approaches depress investment and inhibit innovation.

To fix our water systems, we need prices that lead to more rational water use and invite needed investment, data to track water resources and usage, and much more research and development.

Take prices, for example. Water prices should rise or fall according to supply and demand. The idea that the price should be the same in the dry season (when supplies are low and demand for irrigation is high) as the wet season (when supplies are high and demand is low) is nonsense.

Water utilities should take a page out of the energy sector's playbook. Electric utilities had been plagued for decades by many of the same difficulties. But now they are moving toward time-of-use pricing, with prices rising when demand is up, and inverted block pricing, where prices increase with consumption. Allowing these price shifts would change user behavior. Higher prices would encourage conservation and new technologies.

Regulations can ensure that the first few gallons per person per day are cheap or free, with escalating costs beyond that. Water for necessities such as drinking, cooking and hygiene should be affordable. Beyond that, water for lawns, filling swimming pools, washing cars and other uses should be more expensive.

We also have to fix our data gaps. We are operating blind. Compared to sectors like energy, where robust statistics on prices, production and consumption are generated weekly, key information on water use and supply is missing or published only every few years.

We should increase the federal budgets for water monitoring. Establishing a Water Information Administration, just as the Department of Energy has an Energy Information Administration, to collect, curate and maintain up-to-date, publicly available water data would inform policy makers and the markets.

Congress should also significantly increase support for water research and development, making sure to include the private sector as a partner.

We need breakthroughs in water treatment technology that would enable larger-scale recycling and reuse of treated water, desalination, and aquifer storage and recovery. These improvements range from the mundane — better pumps and home appliances — to advanced nanomaterials for energy-efficient water treatment.

The water industry's risk-averse culture has resisted innovation. Higher prices and government-backed research and development could help prompt a wave of innovation and investment. This is what happened with hydraulic fracturing and horizontal drilling, two technologies advanced through government research that kicked off the shale boom.

The water problem is daunting. But putting a sensible price on water to invite investment and encourage conservation, increasing the availability of information and doubling down on innovation can go a long way toward solving it.

The majority of the open questions, in my experience, involve state policy/regs when we discuss human waste, post-consumer food waste, and Ag viability. Governors also call for full federal funding of programs to support state investments in modern and safe drinking water upgrades

*Governors to EPA Administrator McCarthy:
"PFOA contamination is not a state problem or a regional problem – it's a national problem that requires federal guidelines and a consistent, science-based approach."*

Today, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo of New York, Governor Peter Shumlin of Vermont, and Governor Maggie Hassan of New Hampshire officially requested that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency conduct a review of the best available science regarding perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA), in order to assess and ensure the safety of drinking water exposed to the contaminant. Additionally, the Governors called for full federal funding of the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and the Clean Water Revolving Fund, which are critical tools for supporting state efforts to upgrade drinking water infrastructure.

These requests, which were made in a letter to EPA Administrator Gina McCarthy, can be viewed [here](#). The text of that letter is also available below:

Dear Administrator McCarthy,

We write as Governors whose states are all in the midst of addressing local drinking water contamination involving the federally unregulated chemical perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA). We are deeply concerned for the health and well-being of our communities grappling with this contaminant. In New York and New Hampshire, tests have indicated the presence of this chemical in public drinking water systems, and in New York and Vermont the chemical has been detected in several private wells. It is clear that PFOA contamination is not a state problem or a regional problem – it's a national problem that requires federal guidelines and a consistent, science-based approach.

The EPA's PFOA health advisory was recently lowered in one village in New York by the EPA's Regional Office, though the higher advisory remains in the rest of the country. We urge the EPA, under your leadership, to expeditiously review the best available science on this contaminant, and provide uniform guidance to states that our health and environmental officials can use in assessing the safety of our drinking water. In addition, we seek your help and support for additional drinking water testing and analysis in

communities exposed to PFOA.

We also are all strong supporters of full federal funding for water infrastructure. The Drinking Water State Revolving Fund is a critical tool for states to invest in modern and safe drinking water upgrades. Unfortunately, over the last six years funding for this program, and its companion Clean Water Revolving Fund, have been flat or declining. This comes even as the American Society of Civil Engineers points out massive gaps between our water infrastructure needs and our investment. We should invest more in both the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and the Clean Water Revolving Fund, and we look forward to working with you to make that happen.

We respectfully request your personal attention to the challenges created by PFOA contamination in our states. Consistency, accuracy, and uniformity are paramount. We look forward to your response and assistance as we work to identify the polluters responsible for this contamination, and hold them accountable for their actions. It is unacceptable to us that any community should have to be concerned about the safety of their drinking water. Families in our states are worried about potentially tragic short and long-term health impacts, not to mention the potential loss in property values for homes in affected areas. It has been our priority to ensure that residents are being provided clean and safe water immediately, and that our infrastructure be modernized to eliminate these concerns in the future.

How the Coal Industry Flattened the Mountains of Appalachia

As the destructive coal mining process known as mountaintop removal ebbs in Appalachia, it is leaving behind what amounts to its own grim field of tombstones: A grossly disfigured landscape pocked with decapitated mountains standing flat as mesas and inhospitable to forest restoration.

The blight is more than vertical, for millions of tons of slag waste have been bulldozed down into the surrounding countryside for more than 40 years. The rubble has clogged countless streams and waterways and devastated the Appalachian environment with pollutants, rerouting rain torrents through homes and hamlets below.

The destruction, shocking to anyone flying across the scarred mountain remains, has now been measured in all three dimensions in a survey by researchers at Duke University. It presents a timely reminder of what has been lost to King Coal's furious bulldozing swaths across the mountains of West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia. Drastic changes to the landscape have left central Appalachian regions in the study's focus area 40 percent flatter after the bulldozers moved on, reducing elevations at the top while raising them at ground level by up to 10 feet because of the layers of accumulated slag.

"The physical effects of mountaintop mining are much more similar to volcanic eruptions where the entire landscape is fractured, deepened and decoupled from prior landscape evolution trajectories, effectively resetting the clock on landscape and ecosystem co-evolution," the report declares after sampling one West Virginia waste field laden with enough rubble to bury Manhattan Island.

The report holds little hope of returning to the verdant Appalachian past, where underground mining at least left the lofty horizon and snug hamlets undisturbed. As the industry decapitated mountains to get at the lucrative coal seams below the surface, it reassured residents that there would be adequate restoration. The resulting tabletops of hedges and grass are derided by residents in nearby hollows. "Lipstick on a corpse," says Ken Hechler, a tireless environmentalist and public servant in West Virginia.

While coal-fired power plants have been closing with the rise of cheap natural gas, the marketplace could easily shift back, and watchful environmentalists report that companies continue to apply for permits for mountaintop operations. At the same time, the Interior Department has been working on a stronger Stream Protection Rule, which pro-coal House Republicans are resisting. It aims to better protect thousands of miles of streams from abuse by requiring companies to operate responsibly, monitor streams and restore them to health.

The sorry history of Appalachia shows how difficult this will be. Over the years, initial court victories for the environment were repeatedly frustrated by evasive government delays and policy rulings favoring the industry's destructive practices. The hollows of Appalachia still ring with the rulings of Chief Judge Charles Haden II of United States District Court for his determined stand against King Coal 17 years ago in a Charleston, W.Va., courthouse:

"If there is any life form that cannot acclimate to life deep in a rubble pile, it is eliminated," he said after personally visiting mountaintop removal's destructive power in the land. "No effect on related environmental values is more adverse than obliteration."

The below link identifies every WWTF in the Basin, and includes performance history, upgrades needed for future compliance, and amount of sludge (fuel, in my world) generated. Of the 59 WWTF in Vermont discharging into Lake Champlain, 27 have new allocations as a result of the draft TMDLs. 18 of these require major upgrades to meet the new allocations. (See link below.) That is of economic development consequence, as well, not merely environmental nor legal.

I assume you have already noticed that the MSQ1 site, above Swanton Dam, had higher percentages of intersex fish and similar levels of vitellogenin compared to the MSQ2 site below the dam.

TFM is applied at the Swanton Dam, and the dam is impassible to fish, so the MSQ1 fish would have had no exposure to TFM.

Here is the slide directly from Cary Giguere's presentation. From the audio recording of his testimony it seems clear that Cary knew where the TFM application point was located.



Gov. Shumlin Highlights Damage to Lakes, Fish, and Forests Resulting from Coal

MONTPELIER – Continuing his push for Vermont to divest from coal stocks, Gov. Peter Shumlin today highlighted the negative effects the burning of coal has on Vermont's lakes and waterways, fish species, and forests and how it threatens important economic industries like tourism, outdoor recreation, and iconic maple sugaring.

The coal power industry is a major source of mercury emissions and mercury accumulation in the environment, impacting lakes, forests, and the species that inhabit both. Mercury and other harmful compounds resulting from the burning of coal are brought to Vermont by the way of precipitation, or what is know as acid rain, with devastating effects for the state's environment.

Vermont lakes are hit hardest, with up to 16 percent showing acid stress. In severe cases, acid compounds coming to Vermont through precipitation can lead to dead water bodies where native species cannot survive.

High levels of mercury also pose a concern for fish in Vermont's lakes and those who consume them. While mercury levels in Lake Champlain sport fish have declined since the 1990's, elevated levels of mercury mean Vermonters must follow Department of Health guidelines to ensure safe fish consumption. For pregnant

women, these guidelines generally restrict consumption to between one and five meals per month of most sportfish.

Too much mercury in a diet, especially for pregnant women, can result in organ and central nervous system damage and impaired neurological development for children.

“Despite this pollution coming from out of state, it is Vermonters who pay the price, both with tax dollars required for clean-up efforts and in economic losses to businesses dependent on our state's natural resources,” said James Elhers, Executive Director of Lake Champlain International.

Much of the dirty air that contributes to acid rain travels across many states and ends up in Vermont forests, threatening their long-term sustainability. Years of acid deposition have leached vital nutrients from forest soils and impacted many of Vermont tree species, including:

- Red spruce was one of the first trees to draw attention to this problem through work by UVM professor Hub Vogelmann more than 3 decades ago. His research team's work on Camels Hump led the nation in recognizing connections between red spruce decline and pollution from coal fired power plants.
- More recently Vermont learned that paper birch trees didn't recover from damages of the 1998 ice storm where acid deposition has depleted necessary soil nutrients.
- Forests where acid rain has affected soils have slower tree growth, poorer recovery from tree damages from pests or abnormal weather, and perhaps the most troubling, fewer seedlings surviving into future sugar maple forests.

“The health and productivity of our forests depend on reducing air pollution and maintaining a climate that supports tree species we rely on for wildlife habitat, maple syrup, recreation, tourism, wood products and clean water,” Commissioner of the Department of Forest, Parks, and Recreation Mike Snyder said.

Aside from the direct effects on lakes, fish, and forests, the burning of coal is the biggest contributor to climate change in America and poses significant risks for Vermont. One readily apparent effect of climate change is the recent increase in frequency of devastating storms and flood events which threaten Vermont watersheds and livelihoods. Warmer temperatures brought on by climate change may also reduce the range of cold water fish species such as our native brook trout and make environmental conditions more favorable for invasive, non-native species.

TOP CHESAPEAKE BAY LEGISLATION IN 2016 WOULD MAKE CHICKEN COMPANIES RESPONSIBLE FOR MANURE

Advocates say burden of excess manure disposal should not be on small farmers, taxpayers

(Annapolis, MD) A broad coalition of environmental groups is banding together during the 2016 Maryland General Assembly to support legislation requiring poultry companies to take responsibility for the manure their chickens produce. Excess manure can saturate farm fields and pollutes local creeks, rivers and the Chesapeake Bay if not handled properly. The legislation will seek to protect Maryland farmers and taxpayers from costs that should be borne by the large poultry companies.

“A responsible dog owner picks up after his or her dogs. Poultry companies must be responsible for cleaning up after their chickens,” said Alison Prost, Maryland Executive Director, Chesapeake Bay Foundation. “The big companies own the birds, and control almost all aspects of the chicken production process, but they bear no responsibility for any manure left behind. Ensuring the excess manure is managed properly will help improve the quality of the Bay and the eastern shore rivers.”

Legislation set to be introduced in the coming days will require poultry companies to remove and properly dispose of all poultry litter for which a chicken grower does not have state-approved plans.

“For far too long, massive corporations like Perdue have raked in profits by forcing farmers, residents and the Chesapeake Bay to bear the burden of pollution from millions of pounds of excess chicken waste each year. The Poultry Litter Management Act would help shift responsibility for the number one source of water pollution in Maryland back where it belongs — onto the big chicken companies,” said Michele Merkel, Co-director, Food &

Water Justice. “Food & Water Watch is proud to stand with the bill’s sponsors and a growing coalition of organizations and residents in support of the Poultry Litter Management Act.”

“Making chicken companies responsible for their waste is a top priority for environmental groups this year,” said Karla Raettig, Executive Director, Maryland League of Conservation Voters and co-chair of the Maryland Clean Agriculture Coalition. “Family farmers who grow chickens for these companies don’t have the money to cart the excess manure away. Neither do Maryland taxpayers.”

A recent U.S. Geological Service Water report found the rivers of the Eastern Shore have concentrations of phosphorus that are among the “highest in the nation” due to agricultural operations. The Maryland Department of Agriculture has estimated about 228,000 tons of excess manure are currently applied to crop fields in Maryland; this is likely to increase with the recent expansion of chicken houses. Manure makes good fertilizer, but too much manure applied over decades has left many Eastern Shore fields saturated with phosphorus. The phosphorus ends up in local creeks and rivers, causing dead zones of low oxygen, fish kills, restrictions on shell-fish harvesting, and swimming advisories.

The legislation would be the second step of a critical two-step plan to reduce phosphorus pollution from agriculture in Maryland. In 2015, the Hogan Administration enacted regulations forbidding farmers from over-applying poultry manure on fields. The 2016 legislation would place the cost of properly using, or disposing of that excess manure in the hands of the big companies, not small farmers or the public. Growers currently shoulder much of the responsibility, with considerable direct and indirect subsidies from taxpayers.

Public dollars subsidize farmers who plant winter crops that soak up excess nutrients from soybean and corn fields. The cost to taxpayers is about \$20 million a year. In addition, taxpayers contribute to a program that transports some excess manure to safe areas. Those transportation costs are expected to rise significantly as farmers need to find a place for excess litter.

Agriculture is the single, largest source of pollution to the Chesapeake Bay and Maryland waterways. About 44 percent of the nitrogen and 57 percent of the phosphorus polluting the Bay comes from farms, and much of that comes from animal manure. But dollar for dollar, reducing pollution to the Chesapeake Bay from farms is far cheaper than reducing it from any other source: sewage plants, stormwater systems and septic systems.

The issue is urgent. The amount of excess chicken manure in Maryland could soon be even greater. Large industrial farms are expanding – including 200 new poultry houses now permitted for construction on the Delmarva Peninsula. This includes about 70 in Somerset County, with Wicomico and Worcester counties also experiencing considerable new growth. This construction would mean an additional 10 million chickens and about 20 million more pounds of manure per year.

Big chicken companies have the necessary resources and the responsibility to help Maryland’s manure overload problem. If poultry companies become responsible for their waste, that would ensure Maryland taxpayers, and farmers, no longer bear the sole burden of reducing pollution.

The next time you flush in the nation's capital, you might consider this: You — or, more precisely, whatever you have flushed — will help generate clean energy.

D.C. Water, which also treats sewage from much of the Maryland and Northern Virginia suburbs, recently became the first utility in North America to use a Norwegian thermal hydrolysis system to convert the sludge left over from treated sewage into electricity.

Yes, to put it bluntly, the city's sewage treatment plant is turning poop into power.

"It's a huge deal on so many fronts," D.C. Water General Manager George S. Hawkins said after Wednesday's official unveiling of the system. "It's a public utility leading the world in innovation and technology. We have private and public water companies coming from all over the world to see this."

Other utilities have generated electricity from sludge, and some — as D.C. Water plans to do soon — sell a byproduct of such systems as a compost-like soil mixture to fertilize landscaping and even vegetable gardens.

But the Blue Plains Advanced Wastewater Treatment Plant, officials say, is the first in North America to do so using "pressure cooker" technology that can fit such a system in the relatively tight confines of an urban treatment plant. D.C. Water officials say it's the largest of its kind in the world.

Hawkins said the system, which began producing electricity in September, will provide one-third of the 157-acre plant's power, saving about \$10 million annually. Vast amounts of water

and sewage need a lot of power to move through pipes and pumps, making D.C. Water the city's biggest consumer of electricity.

The utility expects to save an additional \$2 million or so annually on treatment chemicals and \$11 million annually in trucking expenses. Previously, the plant produced 1,200 tons of "Class B" biosolids daily, the industry term for the dark gunk left over from treated sewage. That wet, smelly residue had to be carried away in 60 truckloads every day, traveling about 75 miles to farms in Virginia. The new system produces about half as much of a cleaner "Class A" biosolid, which requires half the number of truck runs and smells more like damp mulch.

The Class A compost-like substance could show up in the next year or so on the shelves of Home Depot as a soil nutrient for home gardens, officials said.

D.C. Water officials say the \$470 million system, which took four years to build, will end up paying for itself and shrink the plant's overall carbon footprint by one-third.

At the dedication ceremony, officials from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Energy Department touted the system as an example of how localities can invest in infrastructure while conserving energy and cleaning the environment. Officials noted that water and sewer utilities account for 4 percent of the country's overall energy usage, making them the largest energy consumers in most communities.

"This is on the cusp of science, my friends," D.C. Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D) told the crowd of about 100 local officials and utility workers. "This is the kind of magic that results when science is put to its 21st-century use."

D.C. Mayor Muriel E. Bowser (D) said the system dovetails with the city's sustainability efforts.

"We can't afford to have waste be just waste," Bowser said. "Every dollar spent to convert that waste into energy will help us to reach our goals."

Here's how it works: When you flush or send soapsuds down the drain, the contents travel through miles of pipe and ultimately reach Blue Plains, off Interstate 295 in Southwest Washington. There, what looks like brown, murky water flows through screens that remove debris and then sits to allow solids to settle. Then, enormous centrifuges spin off the water and concentrate the remaining solids. (Don't think too long about that part.)

The liquid is sent off to be treated and then returned to the Potomac River, and the concentrated sludge is pumped into large steel Cambi reactors, named for the Norwegian manufacturer. The reactors function like pressure cookers, using 338-degree steam and pressure to cook the sludge. Then it gets pumped to another tank at a much lower pressure, which causes the cell walls of the unhealthful pathogens and other microbes to burst.

"We're not just burning up the bacteria," Hawkins explained. "We destroy it."

The sludge is then sent into one of four "digesters" — concrete cylinder tanks as tall as eight-story buildings — that each hold 3.8 million gallons. There, it spends about three weeks as microbial bugs nibble at it. The bugs convert the organic matter into methane gas, which is

cleaned and sent to a nearby building, where turbines burn the methane gas and produce electricity. The entire system covers about five acres.

The key, Hawkins said, is the Cambi pressure cookers that burn off much of the sludge, leaving less of it to be treated. That allowed D.C. Water to have only four enormous cylinder-like digester buildings instead of eight, which it didn't have room for.

Hawkins lauded the crowd of local leaders for their support, saying that they and D.C. Water customers had made the project possible.

"One could say it's a project generated by you, too," Hawkins said, as the crowd of toilet-flushers chuckled. "I'll let you think about that one a minute."

Our infrastructure, built to sustain the small towns and factories of a century ago, is aging and, in places, vulnerable. New building and economic growth will depend on adequate water and sewer capacity, which is limited in many areas.

Challenges for the Vermont Economy

- Aging infrastructure, in particular wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, are making it increasingly difficult to build or expand.

With increasingly strict federal water quality standards for Lake Champlain and other watersheds, some future business growth will be contingent on adequate wastewater and storm water treatment.

Align Funding and Permitting to Implement Small Scale Water and Wastewater Solutions.

Align funding, permitting and education to replicate the successes of other rural states in implementing small-scale water, storm water and wastewater solutions necessary for economic development. A number of states have invested in

education and outreach, planning for permanent management of on-site systems, and used federal funds creatively to enable smaller, decentralized wastewater treatment options that are necessary for maintaining community vitality. New advances in green storm water infrastructure design and construction provide opportunities to at once beautify communities, save costs and protect the environment. Vermont can do the same. Tackling these issues is not easy, but is critical to Vermont's future. Overcoming these challenges will require additional resources and discussion to develop detailed recommendations.

Drinking Water Challenges

- As with so many issues, Vermont's low population density makes it difficult to support the costs of maintaining public drinking water systems.
- Continuing and escalating maintenance costs make the long-term viability of drinking water supplies problematic.
- The construction of new drinking water systems in areas that are currently underserved is also challenged by low population densities and the higher construction costs associated with new projects.
- There are parts of the state where small communities do not have a publicly supplied water system and each resident and business relies on a private, often less reliable water supply. In some cases, the lack of a public drinking water system inhibits new residential or business activity.

Many communities around the state do not have the necessary wastewater or stormwater infrastructure to support development and redevelopment projects. The infrastructure is either aging or nonexistent. More than 200 historic village centers have no public wastewater treatment facilities. Without this critical infrastructure, development is difficult and costly. Such limitations can lead to locating new business activity outside of villages and town centers, consuming more land, harming natural resources, and eroding the character and centrality of villages and town centers.

Community surveys and stakeholder groups that were convened in 2012 and 2013 named "funding for water and wastewater infrastructure" as the top priority to strengthen Vermont communities and the state's economy. Indeed, without addressing the many issues surrounding water quality, runoff and availability, construction and growth in Vermont will be limited and our natural resources

—so key to our brand and the industries such as tourism which rely on clean water and lakes—will be negatively affected.

Small villages seeking to build assets such as community centers, restaurants, and senior housing are often stymied by lack of adequate infrastructure, and development shifts elsewhere. New wastewater rules make redevelopment of these centers difficult, and there is growing concern that buildings in need of redevelopment may become vacant and blighted, lowering community property values. Communities are increasingly being required to take action to address polluted stormwater runoff but lack the resources to plan, design or finance the necessary improvements.

In addition, new regulations establishing Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) to prevent phosphorous and other pollutants in Lake Champlain and Long Island Sound will mean Vermont will need to significantly improve its wastewater runoff. For Lake Champlain alone, the Agency of Natural Resources has estimated mitigation costs at \$30,000 per acre for stormwater management, \$3,000 per 1,000 feet to improve roadside ditches and \$50,000 per mile for levee removal. Runoff from dairy farms and other agriculture also play a significant role.

Inadequate, aging and failing wastewater and stormwater infrastructure is the principal barrier to reaching a host of state and local goals, from building more housing for all income levels, to revitalizing communities, to protecting the environment. For Vermont communities to thrive and grow, this issue must be addressed.

Indirect Discharge Permit Renewal for Agri-Mark/Cabot Creamery

Dear Secretary Markowitz:

It is our professional opinion that neither the previously authorized Indirect Discharge Permits (IDP) nor the currently proposed Renewal IDP have been nor are sufficient to safeguard the Public Trust in our State's waters based on the limited but disturbing data offered in the past and the limited oversight scheduled going forward.

Specifically, of highest concern, is that of the only streams monitored of the potentially 305 impacted, 100 percent of them (or both)—Cold Brook and Flagg Brook—showed increases in nutrient loading at the downstream monitoring locations. It is likely well known to you that the Vermont Water Quality Standards contain the following General Antidegradation Policy in §1-03(B): “All waters shall be managed in accordance with these rules to protect, maintain, and improve water quality.” At a minimum, from the limited monitoring conducted, it is apparent that these two brooks are not being managed so as to improve water quality in direct contradiction to Vermont Water Quality Standards. This alone is basis for not re-issuing the permit utilizing the protocols of the past.

Furthermore, there is not sufficient biological data to be able to objectively determine the cumulative impacts to the aquatic ecosystems of these streams—the macroinvertebrate and fisheries populations—and obviously no other streams within the discharge area given the absence of Department oversight since this practice was first permitted several decades ago.

According to the permit itself, stated on page 2, “Dairy processing wastewater is used as a soil amendment for agricultural purposes to approved disposal fields due to its high nitrogen, phosphorus, and organic content.” The issues surrounding the Agriculture Industry's use of soil amendments and their role in the eutrophication and steady decline of Lake Champlain water quality are now well known due to the lawsuit that required the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to revoke the previous State TMDL and itself author the new TMDL for the Lake Champlain Basin, in which many of these receiving fields and waters are located. This new TMDL will require agricultural load reductions of 30 to 80 percent throughout the Basin. It would appear, through the Draft IDP, that

it is the State's and the permittee's intent to shift the entire burden for identifying load reductions to Cabot's own member farms if they are to continue to receive this "high nitrogen, phosphorus, and organic content" industry waste. If that is not the case, it would stand to reason, that any IDP renewal would require at a minimum a 30 percent reduction in loading from the applicant. Regardless, there is no "reasonable assurance" being offered to our fellow Vermonters that the Agency has a plan for reducing these loads.

Additionally, given the one- to perhaps two-day storage capacity of the permittee to maintain waste onsite during extended periods of inclement weather, the permit is technically unenforceable. It is our expectation that there are numerous instances during a five-year period when fields are not capable of infiltrating land-applied wastes without incurring surface runoff. If there is data to the contrary, we would appreciate it being shared.

In light of all of the aforementioned, if you are still so inclined to continue to the permit the arcane practice of land-applied industrial waste, we request that you amend the proposed Renewal IDP to reflect VTWQS in the following manner until such time that it can be empirically demonstrated that the waters of the State are not being degraded by this practice but are in fact improved:

- The permit be limited to a one-year period
- Increase in-stream monitoring locations to 10 percent of those impacted or 31 total identified in concert with public stakeholders
- Mandatory bi-weekly chemical monitoring and monthly biological monitoring of the Winooski River year-round
- Mandatory bi-weekly chemical monitoring and monthly biological of the 31 identified and agreed upon impacted streams year-round
- Mandate a minimum of two week's onsite storage capacity to ensure no application occurs during extended periods of wet weather/frozen soil.
- Require reporting of how waste is handled during days when more than one inch of rain is received in less than one hour or when more than two inches of rain is received during a 24-hour period in any town of fields receiving waste
- Mandatory soil testing of all receiving fields in April and November to ensure fields' present and continued viability for receiving liquid soil amendments
- Remove the provision for year-round spreading and, instead, prohibit application when frost is present at any depth prior to application that day.
- Permit shall reflect individual sample values for chemical analysis, rather than the current mean concentration protocol.
- An annual report either conducted by the Agency or an independent water quality specialist submitted two months prior to the permit expiration such that future determinations can be made without extension of any practices continuing shown to be not improving Vermont waters or, at a minimum, not degrading them, especially when conducted in concert with other Agency of Agriculture-approved land applications of nutrients, milkhouse wastewater, or surplus milk.

Thank you for your work "to preserve, enhance, restore, and conserve Vermont's natural resources, and protect human health for the benefit of this and future generations." The people of the State of Vermont and our children are counting on you to safeguard all of our interest in safe, clean, healthy waters and soils.






