Should Burke Continue with Curbside Rubbish and Recycling Pickup?

Background:

In 1996 the Town of Burke residents voted to form our own Waste Management District. This included providing curbside rubbish pickup and building a drop-off recycling center. In 2015 the state required anyone providing curbside rubbish pickup to also provide curbside recycling pickup, so curbside recycling pickup service was also provided.

Challenges:

We have experienced some challenges with curbside rubbish and recycling pickup. The rubbish truck is aging and has broken down a couple of times, unable to make its rounds for curbside pickup. This obviously creates an inconvenience as we have no back-up for curbside pick-up, garnering many complaints from residents. We have placed dumpsters at the recycling center for residents to bring their trash in to and deposit. There is an expectation that these bags still be stickered with the "B" or in a Burke bag. Many of the bags have not been stickered and that is a lot of lost revenue, in addition to the significant added expense of the dumpsters.

The \$3 per bag is not covering the expenses to the Town.

The rubbish truck is going to need to be replaced. This is a large investment. Approximately \$260,000.00 for the truck. We currently have \$186,941.43 in the rubbish truck reserve fund.

In addition to the per bag expense the curbside rubbish and recycling program 2021 expense is \$229,683.00. This equates to approximately \$84.00 for every \$100,000 in property value per year. For a property valued at \$250,000, you are paying \$210/year or \$17.50 per month in addition to the \$3/bag fee.

The rubbish truck requires a part time CDL driver and the rubbish/recycling attendant must be physically able to lift heavy bags, work in extreme weather conditions and there are roadway safety concerns. We have been extremely lucky to keep these positions filled with good people and we realize that they do need to be paid a competitive wage because it is a part time position.

We are asking residents if they wish to continue the town funded curbside rubbish and recycling pickup when you vote on Town Meeting Day.

If the curbside program were suspended the recycle center would remain open for residents to drop off their recycling. Residents would be responsible to hire their own curbside trash (and potentially recycling) pick up with a commercial hauler. Here are some costs that we've estimated for recycling, and trash pickup.

Commercial Haulers charge on average \$48.00 per month for weekly pickup of Garbage and Recycling.

A 2 cubic yard dumpster from Casella costs \$130 per month and is picked up every other week.

The benefit of the program is really the convenience, leading to increased recycling and keeping more materials out of the landfill, at a cost that may or may not seem reasonable.

Burke Community Forest Opportunities Frequently Asked Questions

Introduction:

The Town of Burke has the opportunity to acquire two properties, one in East Burke and the other in West Burke, both to be owned by the Town as new community forests.

The East Burke parcel, hereafter known as the **North Pasture Community Forest**, is a privately owned 103-acre forest on Victory Road with old logging roads for dispersed recreational use, a section of VAST trail corridor, and a portion of Kingdom Trail mountain biking trail connecting the East Haven trails to those at the Dashney Nordic Center and Greater Burke Mountain trails. This property is currently owned by Richard Prescott and Sally Schlueter with a conservation easement held by the Vermont Land Trust. The landowners are working with the Burke Conservation Commission to preserve the land under public ownership.

The West Burke parcel, hereafter known as **Willey Woods Community Forest**, is a 286-acre block of forest off of Newark St and Sugarhouse Road with remarkable habitat for wildlife, bordering an 829-acre deer wintering area and the headwaters of Roundy Brook. This property contains a section of VAST trail along the Route 114 corridor and is a popular destination for local hunters. The Trust for Public Land (TPL) has been working with the landowner, Meadowsend Timberlands, along with the Burke Conservation Commission to purchase the property as a public asset.



What is a community forest?

The history of Vermont's community-owned forests dates back to early periods of settlement when town charters required the designation of public lands for community support. Today, there are approximately 68,000 acres of forestland owned by 168 municipalities, all open to the public to enjoy. The values of town forests are diverse, from watershed protection, wildlife habitat, and forest products to public recreation, outdoor classrooms, and neighborhood gathering places. Town forests in Vermont contribute to the regional landscape by keeping productive forestlands

in timber management, protecting physical and biological diversity, and maintaining connectivity between larger patches of forest.

Why does Burke need a community forest?

168 Vermont towns have town forests, some in existence for more than 100 years. These areas serve as recreational, educational, water source protection, and timber management assets for their communities, as well as habitat for fish and wildlife. Burke currently owns 10 acres of forest next to the Hillside Cemetery on Burke Hollow Road. Due to the challenging terrain, public access is limited and not ideal for public trail recreation. The Burke Conservation Commission has been working to identify land conservation opportunities with better public access and natural resource values for the residents of Burke. The Burke Conservation Commission has evaluated these two proposed community forests as high priority land acquisitions, each providing a unique array of public benefits that complement both sides of Town.

What are the goals for these community forests? How will this benefit our community?



The proposed **North Pasture Community Forest** will preserve the existing Pasture and Beesaw Trails, a section of Kingdom Trails that connects a network of trails up in East Haven down to the popular trails at Burke Mountain Resort and Dashney Nordic Center. The property also contains a portion of VAST trail that flows through a 4-acre utility corridor located just south of Victory Road. There is a network of old skid trails that can be used for various recreation activities such as hiking, biking, cross country skiing, and snowshoeing. Acquisition of this woodland for a Community Forest would preserve public access on the property for recreational use including hunting and fishing, provide the Town School an opportunity to expand their outdoor education program for the children of Burke, and protect wildlife habitat and wetland areas surrounding Flower Brook. The North Pasture Community Forest will become a new publicly-owned recreational resource, supporting the recreation and tourism economy

in the area and the health benefits that come with close-to-home local trails.

The proposed **Willey Woods Community Forest** will prevent further forestland fragmentation in the Town of Burke, preserving the Town's rural character and protecting important wildlife habitat and water resources. With 36 acres of riparian areas, a mile of headwater streams and significant wetlands downstream from Roundy Brook Swamp, protection of this property will increase flood resiliency and provide habitat for brook trout. The property contains an important section of VAST trail on the Route 114 corridor, helping keep riders off the roads and in the woods. Old timber roads provide opportunities for hiking, cross country skiing, and snowshoeing. The land is currently not posted and open for hunting; acquiring the property would preserve permanent public access for all. Timber on the property was selectively cut approximately 10 years ago and is a mixture of wood types. Future timber harvests on the property could generate an occasional source of income for the Town of Burke. The proposed Community Forest can also provide opportunities for the Burke Town School to use

the property as an outdoor classroom where children can learn about the natural environment in their home town.

What is the cost for the properties and the timeline to acquire them?

The proposed **North Pasture Community Forest** is under a Purchase and Sales agreement with the current owners. The Purchase and Sales agreement has two contingencies: a fair market appraisal; and ability to raise adequate funds. The agreement was signed by the Selectboard in December 2020. In March 2022, Burke residents will have the opportunity to authorize the Selectboard to move forward with the acquisition. The goal is to raise \$121,000 via private donations and grants to fund the purchase of the forest by April 2022. **To date the Conservation Commission has raised \$45,500 —38% of our goal - from the following sources:**



- \$25,000 from the Davis Foundation Conservation Program
- \$5,000 from the Fields Pond Foundation
- \$3,500 from a Kingdom Trails mini grant
- ~\$5,000 from private donations
- \$7,000 from a Conservation Fund held by the Burke Conservation Commission

The proposed **Willey Woods Community Forest** has been removed from the market and secured under a Letter of Intent between the Trust for Public Land and the Landowner. An appraisal to determine the fair market value of the property will be completed in February 2022 prior to Town Meeting Day. The Trust for Public Land is proposing to fund the acquisition through the Water Infrastructure Sponsorship Program and with private funds.

How will acquisition of two community forests affect my property taxes?

Once municipally owned, the two properties would be taken off the grand list. The annual municipal tax loss resulting from the creation of a community forest in both East Burke and West Burke is estimated to be approximately \$3,300. This will result in an increase of \$1.37 in annual taxes for every \$100,000 of property value.

The creation of open space has been clearly documented to increase resale values of homes adjacent to the conserved land.¹ Property owners will benefit from higher property values when they sell their homes and the town will benefit from an increased tax base, over time. According to a 2001 survey by the National Association of REALTORS® by Public Opinion Strategies, 50 percent of respondents said they would pay 10 percent more for a house located near a park or open space.


How would Town ownership work? Will there be ongoing costs associated with ownership?

The Town will be responsible for managing the community forests, with assistance from the Conservation Commission and volunteers for any necessary trail maintenance. The Town will be eligible for a number of public grants to create new trails or infrastructure such as parking lots or natural resource projects such as wetland restoration.

On the proposed **North Pasture Community Forest**, educational, recreation, and public access grants will be sought for projects such as improved parking access, walking trails, boardwalks and viewing platforms. Volunteer services will be accepted from community members for projects such as assistance with building hiking trails and giving educational talks or field tours. The Burke Conservation Commission's annual funding and grants received will support

ongoing management of the forest and in the event a project is proposed where there is some cost from the Town, Burke residents would have to approve this project and will be notified well in advance. All activities and management will need to be consistent with the purposes of the Conservation Easement held by Vermont Land Trust.

For the **Willey Woods Community Forest**, the Town of Burke would acquire the property subject to a conservation easement. This easement would ensure that the property's conservation value as forestland, wildlife habitat, public access, and water quality would be protected. Specific easement terms will be determined by the town, VT Department of Environmental Conservation and easement holder over the next six months. Sustainable timber harvesting would be allowed which could improve forest health and wildlife habitat and could be an occasional source of income for the town. The project budget includes \$20,000 for a community forest management endowment, controlled by the Town, to be used for the maintenance and improvement of the property for public use. This management endowment will be secured through public and private fundraising by TPL.



Who makes decisions on the management of the properties?

The uses allowed and management conducted on the Community Forest will be determined by the community, within the broad allowances of the conservation easements. Before the town takes ownership, Interim Management Plans will be created by the Town with assistance from County Forester Matt Langlais, which would describe how the properties will be managed until full management plans are created with significant public input. The full management plans will be created by the community within a year of owning the property, with the ultimate timing depending

on requirements of the funding sources. Based on initial discussions, and requirements of the funding sources and easements, the community forests could be managed for multiple uses, including recreation, sustainable timber harvesting, watershed protection, education, limited community food production, hunting, fishing and trapping, and wildlife habitat.

The Selectboard has the ultimate authority over both properties and management decisions. The Conservation Commission will be responsible for:

- development of Community Forest policy with significant community input;
- management and oversight options/ models/ final plan; and
- seeking funding mechanisms necessary for maintenance and improvements.

What other restrictions would there be on the land?

The proposed **North Pasture Community Forest** was privately conserved in 2005 with a conservation easement held by the Vermont Land Trust. This conservation easement restricts certain uses that are inconsistent with the property's conservation values, such as development, mining, recreational ATV use, or commercial activities. The easement allows the limited establishment of fields, orchards or pastures; maple sugaring operations; timber harvests; and trail construction.

The proposed **Willey Woods Community Forest** acquisition will include a conservation easement to protect the conservation values of the property. The Conservation Easement terms will be determined through easement negotiations between the VT DEC, the Town, and the easement holder. At a minimum, the easement would require that wildlife habitat, public access, water quality, and cultural resources be protected. A Community Forest Management Plan will have to be developed that is approved by the County Forester.

What will happen if the Town does not purchase the properties?

The landowner of the North Pasture Community Forest has been trying to sell the property for the past two years. They reached out to the Burke Conservation Commission to not only sell the land but to see it become a community forest that could be used as an educational tool for Burke Town School and maintained for public use. If the town is unable to purchase the land, the property may be placed back on the market, potentially limiting public access opportunities in the future.

The landowner of the proposed **Willey Woods Community Forest** is not interested in continuing to own the land if the property is not conserved under town ownership for public use. The landowner recently surveyed the property as three developable lots, prior to the agreement with TPL. If a conservation outcome fails, the three lots will be put back on the market, subdivided, and likely developed, which would fragment the forest and jeopardize public access.

Fragmentation has been characterized as the dominant regional stressor to Vermont's forests. Erosion of the health of Vermont's forests through fragmentation has serious ecological, economic, and cultural implications for landowners and communities. Fragmentation leads to loss of biodiversity; increases the incidence of invasive plants, pests, and pathogens; and reduces water quality. Reducing forest fragmentation where possible now will create more resilient, adaptable forests for the future.

Fragmentation and conversion of forests not only decreases resiliency to floods and climate change, it also limits public access, degrades wildlife habitat, decreases human health and well-being, and forever alters the landscape.²

What is the difference between a Community Forest and a Town Forest?

Community Forest terminology has been used more recently to further describe public land that directly benefits the community and includes community involvement in the decision making process, and includes permanent protection of the property through a conservation easement.

What is the role of the Trust for Public Land?

The Trust for Public Land is a national land conservation non-profit organization with a mission of conserving land for people. TPL is leading the real estate negotiations, due diligence and the fundraising for the land acquisition of the Willey Woods Community Forest. The Burke Conservation Commission along with Matt Langlais, the Caledonia and Essex County Forester, reached out to TPL staff for assistance with this conservation opportunity. TPL has considerable expertise in real estate, law, finance, and fundraising in support of purchasing land for public ownership. TPL operates a community forest program in New England that assists towns in the creation of new municipally-owned forests. TPL has successfully created new community forests in Williston, Hinesburg, Huntington, West Fairlee, Barre Town, and West Windsor, Vermont and in Errol, Freedom, Randolph, Milan, and Meredith, NH, among other places. 2022 APPROPRIATIONS REQUESTS

Because the reports from organizations asking for appropriations cover many pages they have been condensed. There is a short description of what the organization does for the people of Burke and, if the information is available, the number of people that have received help. There will be a representative from some of the organizations at the informational meeting. Summaries are in the order of articles asking for money. Every taxpayer who is interested in how their money is spent should take the time to look at the financial statements of those asking for tax dollars. The complete reports are available and certainly would give the taxpayer an indication of the amount of money spent on different aspects of health care, recreation, education, and development in the area. These full reports are at the Town Clerk's Office and are available for your inspection Monday - Friday - 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Because the fire departments and Lyndon Rescue depend heavily on the Town for funds the full reports are printed as submitted.

ARTICLE 7. - East Burke Fire Department – Request - \$30,000.00. This request is \$10,000.00 more than last year. Please see full report elsewhere in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 8. - West Burke Fire Department – Request - \$30,000. 00. This request is \$10,000.00 more than last year. Please see full report elsewhere in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 9. - Lyndon Rescue Squad - Request - \$72,420.38. This request is a decrease of \$1,556.70 from last year. Please see full report elsewhere in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 10. – Caledonia Home Health Care – Request - \$2,250.00.

This request is the same as last year. Caledonia Home Health made 689 visits in Burke during 2021, which includes Home Care (therapy, nursing, MSW) visits 374; Maternal Child Health 20; Hospice 137; Long Term Care (case management, personal care, respite) 158.

ARTICLE 11. - Catamount Arts - Request - \$500.00.

This request is the same as last year. Catamount Arts was able to present over 50 community events, in large measure due to the generosity of the voters of Burke. Your appropriations helped to underwrite the costs of these presentations as well as help Catamount pay for such general operating expenses as heating and electricity.

ARTICLE 12. - Cobleigh Public Library – Request - \$1,200.00

This request is the same as last year. It will help continue the Library's many programs and services for all area towns. The Cobleigh Public Library in Lyndon is committed to serving individuals and families with free library services. The Library has long served the residents of all towns in the area and does not charge for library cards, use of the library services or attendance at programs.

ARTICLE 13. - Fairbanks Museum and Planetarium – Request - \$1,571.00

This request is the same as last year. The amount is based on \$1.00 per resident with all Burke residents receiving unlimited general admission to the museum for free. With community support, the Museum is fully engaged in community economic, educational, and cultural development initiatives and contributes significantly to the attraction of visitors to our region.

ARTICLE 14. – H.O.P.E. - Request - \$500.00

This request is the same as last year. H.O.P.E. is a private, non-profit agency, whose mission is to provide basic services to people in our community in a respectful and compassionate manner. They help families and individuals with life's basic needs like clothing, food, household goods and so much more. H.O.P.E. served approximately 84 residents (youth and adults) from Burke in 2021 (406 backpacks of food for children of BTS, 9 families and individuals at the emergency food shelf, 9 child clothing vouchers, 4 adult clothing voucher and 1 emergency houseware package and 22 emergency COVID-related services).

ARTICLE 15. – Kingdom Animal Shelter, St J. - Request - \$500.00

This request is the same as last year. Kingdom Animal Shelter is located in St. Johnsbury Center, but serves many surrounding communities. The all-volunteer, no-kill, non-profit 501(c)3 is asking for financial support to continue its mission of caring for stray and unwanted cats until they can be adopted by desirable homes. In addition to maintaining the shelter and providing as-needed veterinary services, they work to raise awareness of the importance of spay/neuter programs to reduce pet overpopulation. This year they took in 91 cats (5 from East & West Burke and adopted out 80 cats. Each cat costs roughly \$300-\$500 during their time at the shelter.

ARTICLE 16. - Lyndon Youth Baseball & Softball. - Request - \$750.00

This request is the same as last year. Lyndon Youth Baseball & Softball (LYBS) is run by an all-volunteer Board of Directors and 100 selfless volunteers. The program entertains over 400 area youth from ages 4 to 16 (37 from Burke in 2021), during the late spring and early summer months. The appropriation from the Town of Burke will help with maintenance and upkeep of Fisher Field. Last year's appropriations allowed new gear, safety nets and uniform replacements.

ARTICLE 17. – Northeast Kingdom Council on Aging - Request - \$1,000.00.

This request is the same as last year. To assist the Agency in providing services to senior citizens in the ensuing year. In 2021, the agency served over 4,440 residents of the NEK which include Meals-on-Wheels, supportive services to help seniors continue to live at home, health insurance counseling, transportation for medical and other appointments, legal services and help for family care givers. Delivered 234,616 meals in 2021 – an increase of 27,070 meals.

ARTICLE 18. – Northeast Kingdom Human Services, Inc. - Request \$1,650.00

This request is the same as last year. This request is to help in assisting with providing mental health and developmental services to adults and children; substance abuse services to adolescents and adults; and 24-hour crisis intervention to the general public. 69 Burke residents were served in 2021 (2,945 people).NKHS employs 26 citizens from the Town of Burke.

ARTICLE 19. - Northeast Kingdom Learning Services - Request - \$1,000.00

This request is the same as last year. For almost 50 years, NEKLS has been serving the residents of Caledonia, Orleans and Essex Counties. Adult education, job skills, transitional support, supplemental education services, early education and family services are some of the many programs that are available to the residents of the area.

ARTICLE 20. - Northeast Kingdom Youth Services - Request - \$750.00

This request is the same as last year. Northeast Kingdom Youth Services (NEKYS) is available to teens and their families twenty-four hours a day every day. NEKYS has provided crisis intervention and outreach programs to families for 47 years. Programs include shelter, Court Diversion of Caledonia and Essex Counties, a Parent Support group, Transitional Living, and Independent Living, as well as Outreach to Schools and communities. NEKYS Staff is committed to helping teens become productive members of the community.

ARTICLE 21. — NorthWoods Stewardship Center – Request \$750.00

This request is the same as last year. NorthWoods is a non-profit conservation and education organization located in East Charleston. NorthWoods education staff facilitates discounted programming with BTS throughout the year and offers camp scholarships to students.

ARTICLE 22. — Powers Park/Village Improvement. Request \$1,000.00

This request is the same as last year. Your appropriation will help to maintain and improve the Park and offer many free events.

ARTICLE 23. —Rural Community Transportation (RCT) - Request—\$1,750.00

This request is the same as last year. RCT is a non-profit corporation providing transportation to the elderly, handicapped and disabled through a volunteer service. RCT provided 38 Burke residents with 1,331 trips traveling 32,988 mile at a cost of \$22,614.97.

ARTICLE 24. — Umbrella—Request—\$1,200.00

This is the same request as last year. Umbrella, Inc. serves victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children, families seeking child care and child care providers. Umbrella served at least 27 Burke households in 2021.

Report for 2021.

Chief Wayne Greer and the Board have worked in concert to greatly improve the safety of the firefighters. Significant funds were allocated this year to buy radios, pagers, flashlights, firefighter in peril alarms, thermal imagers and essential safety equipment.

Every fire service struggles to attract new members but this year has been the exception for the EBVFB. We now have a roster of 15 motivated firefighters. When the alarm sounds, they respond to the firehouse in short order and have proven to be competent in every situation.

It has been a very challenging year. The Brigade responded to 80 calls last year: 15 structure fires (includes mutual aid), 10 vehicle crashes, 10 bike trail injuries, 4 CO alarms, 5 wires/trees down, 1 vehicle fire, 1 search and rescue, 6 good intent calls (smoke) and 18 fire alarm activations.

Firefighting is expensive business. With our good fortune of expanded ranks comes the challenge of providing safe protective gear for every member. Currently one complete set of Turnout Gear including helmet, hood, jacket, pants, boots, light, alarm, gloves, radio, breathing apparatus costs approximately \$12,000 and are all essential. Most of the turnout gear have mandatory expiration dates. Nearly all of our breathing apparatus has reached or exceeded mandatory expiration dates. We have not yet been successful in getting grant funding for air packs. This year we completed extensive repairs for engine 6 and we need to upgrade our Tanker as soon as we can afford a suitable replacement.

We are appreciative of every generous donation we have received and we look forward to your continued help. The EBVFB is a 501(c)(3) corporation and donations are tax deductible.

This year we are requesting a \$30,000 appropriation from the Town of Burke so we can continue to respond quickly and competently to calls for help 24/7.



Town of Burke:

It was 1972 when Lyndon State Rescue Squad was started, and though we became a private non-profit organization in 1996, 2022 marks the 50th anniversary of providing ambulance services!

2021 was another busy year for Lyndon Rescue. We finished the year with 1,620 responses compared to 1,455 in 2020. The number of interfacility transfers we have been able to do makes up part of that increase. Since 2018 the number of interfacility transfers has increased from 120 to over 200. This is due in large part to the commitment of our staff members to come in off duty while the scheduled duty crew remains available for 911 coverage. The increase in call volume allowed us to increase expected income in our 2022 budget and helped to offset increases in expenses.

Over the past few years one of our goals was to pay off our loans and start saving towards future purchases. At the end of 2020 we were able to pay off the loan for our cardiac monitors and now at the end of 2021 we paid off the loan for one of our ambulances. Those funds in the budget that were going towards those loans have now both been allocated towards paying off our other ambulance loans quicker. At the same time we have been able to save towards our next replacement ambulance and future equipment purchases.

Last spring we had the opportunity to start assisting the Vermont Department of Health with COVID-19 vaccinations. Thirteen of our employees completed the training and participated in vaccination clinics throughout the state. This will continue in 2022. With some modifications and smaller class sizes, we've been able to continue to offer CPR and First Aid classes for the community. We are not yet open for full in-person CPR classes at our station but we provide skills testing to individuals that complete the online part of the American Heart Association's blended learning course. Our nationally certified child passenger safety technicians continued to provide car seat installations throughout the year by appointment at our station. 2022 will be our 10th year of being a Vermont child safety seat inspection station!

The amount requested from the towns that we cover each year is obtained by calculating the difference between our predicted income and expenses. For 2022, the net amount that was split up among towns by population decreased by \$17,874.06. Using the 2020 census numbers though, the population within the 9 towns decreased by 810 people. Divided up among less people, the per capita amount for 2022 \$43.86. The amount we requested from your town last year was \$73,977.08 and our request for 2022 is \$72,420.38.

2021 Year in Review- Selectboard Letter

Despite another challenging year coming to a close, our board, employees and volunteers have risen to meet those challenges as best we could and have continued to move Burke forward.

Some long-term, major projects of note were completed this year. The Hayden Crossing Rd bridge project was completed and the road reopened to traffic. The East Darling Hill Rd road reconstruction and up-hill bike lane project was completed as well. There were some add-ons to the original project scope that increased the cost- a large culvert at the top of the hill that needed to be replaced and reconfiguration of the intersection with the Burke Hollow Rd at the bottom of the hill. Our design consultants called for a 3-way stop at this intersection to reduce speeds and increase safety. The Flashing Speed Signs were installed in East Burke Village- Kingdom Trails and Burke Mountain generously donated the funds to cover the costs- Thank you! A speed study has been requested as the first step for installing these in West Burke Village as well.

Other road projects included a large culvert replacement on the Burke Hollow Road completed by contractor Darrell Mathews Excavation. 80% of the costs were covered by an AOT Structures grant. A paving project on the Victory Rd included milling, replacing several cross culverts, narrowing the wide intersection with VT Route 114 and a base coat of pavement. The topcoat will be paved this coming summer. Ruggles Engineering was hired to evaluate the intersection(s) in Burke Hollow. Several recommendations of reducing the speed limit, better signage, cutting back vegetation & an embankment will be implemented soon and we will investigate funding for additional safety improvements and potential realignment and elevation changes.

The Town has entered into a purchase agreement for 10 acres of land off US Route 5 across from Mike's Gas for the site of a new Town Garage and we are investigating a small village waste system that could open the door for village revitalization. The West Burke Village Visioning project was completed by consultant Peter Fairweather. We've received a grant for a feasibility study to look at East Burke village challenges, including a crosswalk, sidewalk restriction at the East Burke church retaining wall and evaluating the bridge near Greer's garage.

The Town will receive approximately \$440,000 in ARPA funding over the next 2 years and we are working on what it can be used for and of that, what are the best fits for Burke. With recent changes to the funding guidance, we will re-evaluate that list.

We are replacing a 10 wheel plow truck this year and buying a new ton dump/plow truck. The old ton truck will be transitioned to the recycle program. A "walking roller" for the back of the

grader will be purchased to compact the road after grading in an effort to reduce stormwater runoff.

We've had some challenges with rubbish truck break downs and staff turnover. Burke residents will be asked to voice their opinion about continuing with curbside rubbish and recycle pick-up and should look for a separate page with details to consider.

We have increased the contract maximum for the Sherriff's Dept and have requested that both they and Vermont State Police increase speed enforcement throughout Town.

The Town has worked with Walker Rd residents to make improvements in anticipation of adopting it as a Class III Town highway. The work was completed very late in the year so a final inspection will take place in the Spring.

Town Administrator Mike Harris has informed the Board of his intention to give up the position after Town Meeting and just continue in his capacity as Zoning Administrator. The Board will re-evaluate the Administrator position/job description and decide how best to move forward.

The Selectboard would like to acknowledge and thank the employees and volunteers that keep the Town running. We live in an amazing town and appreciate you all. We invite citizens to participate in meetings, volunteer for boards and run for office. Wishing you all a safe and healthy year.



COVID - 19 is still making things somewhat difficult as we try to keep ourselves & others safe. Keeping up with the new rules & regulations hasn't been easy, which we all know.

In 2021, we registered 214 Dogs. This can be done in person, by mail, or we have a drop box by the front door for after hours. We will need current rabies information along with a check. This needs to be done by April 1st.

Due to covid-19, we require all title researchers and lawyers, who come in for research, to make appointments. They are scheduled one at a time and cleaning is done before and after each one.

Meetings are being done either by zoom or in person options. Masks are required for the in person meetings. Mike Harris, the Town Administrator, has worked hard at getting the internet connection to work properly during the meetings. The Hotspot is hooked up for the public to access the internet from their cars out back by the Community Building

We had one election last year that was set up with social distancing in mind and people were asked to wear a mask. We are very fortunate to have the Community Building that has a lot of space and doors at each end, for one way in and one way out.

We continue to do motor vehicle renewals and fishing and hunting licenses. We also notarize documents. We did 20 marriage licenses this past year.

This year's Town Informational Meeting will be held via zoom on Monday night, February 28, 2022 at 6:00 P.M. The Australian ballot voting will be held on Tuesday, March 1, 2022 from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. in the Community Building. We are suggesting that you request an early absentee ballot. You can fill it out at home. If you want to insert the ballot into the machine yourself on the day of the vote you may do so or you may return it by mail in the envelope we have provided for you. We also have a secure drop box by the front

door of the town clerk's office. Having your ballot filled out will save you waiting in line. This coming year, we will have 3 elections.

The past year has kept Gail Weed very busy with all of the properties that have been transferred. She comes in nights and weekends to keep up with the recording, which at times hasn't been easy. This year she recorded 3,200 pages, plus processed 190 property transfers to the State of VT.

Right now we have 20 years of land records available on-line. By mid-summer, we hope to have the past 40 years available.

The Burke Town School 7th & 8th graders once again produced a ton of vegetables in the Community Garden, which is located behind the Town Clerk's office, for the meal site & community to enjoy. We would like to thank them for their hard work. We look forward again to eating all of your delicious vegetables in 2022.

We will continue to provide you with all the services that we offer in person, by mail or over the phone.

Town Administrators Report 2021

First let me say that I have truly enjoyed being Town Administrator this past year. I have had the opportunity of working with a lot of great people that have a passion for the work they do.

This past year has been quite busy with several road and paving projects that were completed.

We have accomplished a lot this past year from obtaining an Arbor Day grant that allowed us to do tree plantings in West Burke Village with the help from the Conservation Commission and Burke Mountain Academy. We were able to connect with the Academy to help with the plantings because they provide free labor for community service. A big Thank you to the Burke Mountain Academy for their efforts.

We also received a grant for a feasibility study for correcting the sidewalk in front of the East Burke Church. I met with the church congregation and they agreed it was worthwhile to see what was possible with correcting the section of sidewalk. This study also includes a crosswalk for bike and pedestrian traffic across route 114 in East Burke Village which will also create additional multiuse paths.

After reviewing the way we were processing recycling, we made a few changes to the recycling system most notably switching to Zero Sort. This makes the process simple for people and requires less labor to process the materials and helps to control the operating costs of the recycling service.

My Zoning Administrator's duties were very busy this year. There have been a lot of challenging permit applications that have come through the review process. Short/Long term properties, cabins, and primitive camping requests continue to increase. Just a reminder that, **you are** required to obtain a permit if you plan on doing any type of property rentals.

Currently I am working with the Planning Board to reorganize and focus on the Town Plan – updating, as well as proposing some new updates for the Town ByLaws.

SERVICES OFFERED BY THE TOWN OF BURKE

The following is a list of services provided to the taxpayers and residents of the Town of Burke. If there is something that is not listed and you want to know about it, please contact the Town Clerk's Office.

Rubbish Removal - Curbside pickup is each Tuesday and Wednesday mornings beginning at 7:00 a.m. You are required to have an orange "B" sticker on your rubbish bags or to use a yellow 30 gallon "B" rubbish bag. These are sold in the area stores (East Burke Market, Northeast Kingdom Country Store in East Burke, Mike's Redemption, Aldrich's General Store, and The Town Clerk's Office in West Burke). The bags and the stickers are \$3.00 each. We will not pick up rubbish in barrels that are larger than thirty gallons or do not have handles.

Recycling Center - The Recycling Center is located at 214 School Street behind the Town Clerk's Office. The hours are Wednesday and Thursday from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. until 12 noon. Curbside recycling pick up is every other Thursday. You will find a schedule for curbside pick further on in this report.

The following materials are accepted:

#1, #2, and #3 thru #7 plastics, mixed paper, boxboard, corrugated cardboard, newspaper, magazines, catalogs, telephone books, aluminum cans, tin cans, tinfoil pie plates, glass of all colors and electronics. **NO BLACK PLASTICS OR PLASTIC BAGS** Look for a more detailed listing of acceptable recycle material on pages further on in this Town Report. Also check our Website at www.burkevermont.org

Fund Raisers - Returnable bottles and cans are collected and given to various groups as fundraisers. If someone needs something specific collected and saved, we try to accommodate them.

Composters — Available for sale in the Recycle Building. \$55 each

Bulky Waste Day - *New in 2021 - there is a \$35.00 Charge for Bulky Day.* Bulky days are held the third Saturday of each month from May to October, to give everyone the opportunity to get rid of big items such as beds, furniture, TV's, yard stuff. You must get an authorization slip from the Town Clerk's office. You are allowed to bring up to one pickup load of bulky items. In addition, the Town also accepts car batteries, rechargeable batteries, batteries from battery-operated tools, and florescent light bulbs. There is a \$25 charge for refrigerators and freezers. Because it costs the Town to dispose of tires, there is a handling fee. Tires 16" - \$6.00, 19.5" - \$10.00 and tractor/trailer tires are \$20.00. In order to give everyone a chance to attend, the Selectboard have decided to limit the number of certificates to two per year per household. Used Oil can be dropped off at the Recycle Center or the Town Garage when they are open. Metal can be left at the dumpster at the Town Garage when they are open.

Haz-Mat Day - The Town of Burke will hold two Household Hazardous Waste Days in 2022 at the Burke Town Garage. The dates are as follows: July 16, 2022 and October 15, 2022. We will also share 2 events with the Town of St. Johnsbury in May and October. All collection days will be advertised in the Caledonian Record, on the Burke web page and posted in 5 or 6 places around Town.

DMV Motor Vehicle Renewals — The Town Clerk's Office renews vehicle registrations for a processing fee of \$3.00. You must have your current renewal form generated from the State of VT, or we can do the renewal on line with a credit card and drivers license number or plate number.

Fish and Wildlife Licenses - You may buy your fishing and hunting licenses during regular office hours.

Notary Public — There are three Notary Publics in the Town Office who can notarize your very important documents. This service is free to the public.

DEVELOPMENT REVIEW BOARD



The Development Review Board (DRB) meets the second Wednesday of each month at 6:00 P.M. at the Community Building, 212 School Street West Burke VT. Mike Harris serves as the Zoning Administrator and we currently have 7 members - Rodney Machell (chairman) Frank Cuccia, Nikki Peters, Scott Chappell, Eleanor Kenworthy, James Bentley and Ed Guest.

In 2021, we had a total of 56 permits. The Zoning Administrator approved numerous permits. Mike has approved permits for single family homes, garages, addition, barns, several decks, and two Pavilions. The Development Review Board approved permits for an 8 unit, multi-family house, multiple short & long term rentals, signs, farm events, accessory uses, and subdivisions. There were also 2 permits denied.

STATE BUILDING PERMITS

WHEN ARE THEY REQUIRED AND HOW TO OBTAIN THEM

The owner, or a designated representative, of a building or premises shall obtain a state construction permit before beginning any new construction, addition, alteration, modification, renovation, demolition or installation of fixed building equipment within a public building as defined by state statute and the Vermont Fire and Building Safety Code

Public Building definition—In it's simplest terms, a public building can be defined as any building in the State of Vermont with the exception of single family owner occupied homes, registered home daycares, and some agricultural buildings. Some Examples of structures that are considered public buildings are:

- ◆ Apartment buildings
- ◆ One and Two family rentals
- ◆ Hotels/Motels
- ◆ Inns and B&B's
- ◆ Ski houses
- ◆ Businesses
- ◆ Restaurants / Bars
- ◆ Schools
- ◆ Town / Municipal buildings
- ◆ Store / retail buildings
- ◆ Storage buildings
- ◆ Repair garages

*For more information regarding the definition of a public building, please visit our website and refer to the Vermont Fire and Building Safety Code, or, contact your regional Division of Fire Safety office.

HOW TO OBTAIN A STATE CONSTRUCTION PERMIT

- 1) Develop a project scope and construction documents, such as plans and specifications relating to the proposed construction work or equipment installation under consideration
- 2) Fill out a State DFS Construction Permit Application form in its entirety, and submit it to the DFS regional office with the required permit fee and above mentioned plans and specifications
- 3) The project will be reviewed by division staff and work can commence on the proposed project once the applicant receives a plan review letter and permit poster back in the mail.
- 4) It is always important to consult with your local town office to ensure compliance with any required local permits.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

The Assessor for the Town of Burke, New England Municipal Consultants (NEMC), completed another year as contracted Assessor. NEMC has worked as a consultant to the Town since 2006 and as the Assessor since 2017. The Assessor's Office is staffed Monday and Wednesday from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm. Call (802) 467-3717 or email listers@burkevermont.org

The Assessor's Office is currently in the process of conducting cyclical inspections in Burke. Letters have been mailed out to certain areas of the community requesting an inspection of property. A representative from NEMC has visited numerous properties with the intention of collecting and verifying property characteristics. This is in anticipation of a 2023 Town-wide Reappraisal. We appreciate the cooperation from the community and would be happy to answer any questions that anyone might have. NEMC will continue to mail notices and collect data over the next year.

Burke's CLA for Grand List 2021 was 93.7% and the COD is 15.94% as reported by the State Division of Property Valuation & Review. The proposed CLA for Grand List 2022 is 86.41% and the COD is 16.93%. The stability of the CLA and COD are both important in minimizing changes in the educational tax and measuring fairness in assessments.

A number of reminders to all property owners and taxpayers;

1. In Vermont, the property owner is responsible for ensuring that the data concerning their property assessment is correct. You should periodically ask to see your assessment record and make sure the data is correct.
2. Homestead Declarations continue to be required every year by April 15th. We continue to see many late filers which unfortunately results in a penalty for the property owner. We would encourage everyone to file their Homestead Declaration by April 15th even if you aren't filing your taxes at that time. If you qualify for Property Tax Adjustments you must file the claim (HS-145) as well as HI-144, Household Income.
3. Anyone planning to build a new building or add to an existing one (porch, deck, etc.) is reminded they need to get a permit before starting.
4. In general, Grievance appeals must be filed in late May or early June each year. Please call our office in May to verify the appeal period.

We intend to put together a quick survey for the residents of Burke to communicate their concerns or positive feedback about Burke land use or other topics they may bring to our attention.

2021 Annual Report**

The Burke Conservation Commission meets the third wednesday each month from 6-7 pm. Our meetings are always open to the public.

Public Programs: Public programs were on hold again this year, but we plan to start them again in the spring 2022 with outdoor talks or field tours.

Future Burke Community Forest: The selectboard signed a purchase and sales agreement for a property for sale on Victory Road. The Conservation Commission has raised \$45,000 towards the purchase of this property from a combination of grants, private donations, and money from the BCC conservation fund. Our goals for creating a community forest are: town-owned, public space for recreation; conservation for healthy habitats; clean air and water; outdoor classroom education; and revenue from sustainable timber harvesting. We thank and appreciate everyone who has donated towards this project! We are still actively raising money to make this happen. There is a link on the Town's website if anyone would like to contribute (www.burkevermont.org). All donations are tax deductible and go directly into the fund for the community forest.

Willey Woods Forest: The BCC is in the early stages of working with the Trust for Public Land to conserve a property in the northern part of Sugarhouse Road. The Trust for Public Land is planning to obtain funding through WHiSPR (Watershed Infrastructure Sponsorship Program).

Greenup Day: The Commission posted signs in West Burke, Burke Hollow and East Burke to advertise for Greenup Day. A new 3rd sign was painted by Burke Town School Students this year, so there was one sign in each village. Bags were picked up at the Town Office.

Tree Planting: Mike Harris received funding (Arbor Day Grant) for the Town to plant trees in West Burke. The Commission helped plant several lilacs and two elm trees.

Kitchen Compost Containers: Available at the town recycling center for \$10.00.

BCC Members: Elise Lawson, Kevin Mack, Cathie Wheeler, Chris Manges, Joan Harlowe, and Brandon Mapes. Joan recently resigned from the Commission, and we are very grateful for her service with us. We are excited to have Brandon join us this fall, and are still looking for members if anyone would like to join.

Kingdom Trails welcomes all to view our full **2021 Community Report** reporting on Fiscal Year Nov 2019-Oct 2020 at www.kingdomtrails.org/community-report

Highlights include the **completion of the Kingdom Trails Capacity Study** addressing issues relating to crowding, congestion, safety, and general pressure being placed on our local communities. Final recommendations were deeply informed by public engagement, as the village crosswalk, safe road and trail crossings, and new Welcome Center were identified as the highest community priorities. KT is already taking action as we pursue multiple funding opportunities to implement the needed and safer infrastructure.

KT was also proud to partner with the Vermont Land Trust to **conserve 7 miles of trails and 271 acres** to ensure it will remain undeveloped and open to the public in the future. Stretching from Darling Hill Road to the East Branch of the Passumpsic River, the land has sweeping views of Burke Mountain and includes trails leading to Heaven's Bench. We are thankful to all those who contributed, including the over 740 local businesses and community members.

Keeping with our renewed commitment of consistent communication, KT debuted our **Community Chat series** with the goal of these informal monthly gatherings to hear feedback from Landowners, the community, and trail users. We wished to receive thoughts, questions, and even visions. Join us for our next chat Friday, March 4th 5-6pm at Burke Mtn. Hotel, a chance for KT to listen and learn.

In addition, through the newly created **Landowner Advisory Committee** and monthly communication, we are in more regular dialogue with our Landowners and look forward to continued collaboration with them. We've **increased community engagement** in other critical ways, through stronger and better relationships with the area Chambers of business, the select boards of our host towns, with health, rescue, and social service providers, and with our area schools. We've created opportunities to educate the community about our changing forest and natural landscape and will continue to support the work and enrichment of local organizations through our **KT Mini Grant program**.

KT enhanced our commitment to equity and inclusion by dedicating efforts toward deeper learning and challenging our assumptions and biases to make sure KT trails are welcoming and safe for all. This pledge led KT to make connections with partner organizations to learn what it takes for trails to be accessible to adaptive riders. With their guidance, KT was able to revamp trails, along with our already existing double track, to now host **53 miles of aMTB accessible trails!**

We are profoundly **grateful** to this community and humbled by your continued support. Without the vision 25+ years ago by our founders and the volunteer toil by which the original trails were hand built; without the 104 landowners who generously share their land; without our resilient and hardworking staff who make it possible for us to keep the network open, safe, and enjoyable, even under extreme conditions such as the pandemic; without our members who respectfully and loyally recreate and ride here; this incredible gift would not exist.

Our **commitment to a welcoming and respectful culture** will continue to be a focus of our work and mission in 2022. We look forward to your continued engagement, involvement, and support.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR FRIENDLY RUBBISH ATTENDANTS

Suggestions to make your curbside rubbish pickup service run more smoothly

We would like to suggest that everyone who does not already have one, get a 30 gallon container and put one sticker on the top bag-this will prevent some people from using too many stickers and help with the ones who do not use enough.

The rubbish attendants will no longer pick up rubbish from homemade rubbish barrels larger than 30 gallons or those without handles. Please be sure to use the cover of the container so that the snow and rain do not get in and freeze which adds to the weight of the containers.

*** Please make sure your rubbish containers are visible to the rubbish truck driver from both directions. Use containers no larger than 30 gallons. Please do not use 55 gallon drums to put your trash bags in. It makes it very hard to get bags out.

*** Try to be considerate about the weight of each bag. You may put more than one bag in a 30 gallon trash can and place a "B" sticker on the top bag. If bags are not placed in a 30-gallon container, each bag must display a "B" sticker visible to the driver. Bags without stickers will not be picked up. Bags that are too heavy for the workers to lift will be left to be re-bagged for the next week. You can buy "B" stickers and "B" bags for \$3.00 each at any of the stores in both East and West Burke and also at the Town Clerk's office.

*** Do not put out tires, fluorescent bulbs, electronics or metal at curbside. Tires can be disposed of at the bulky days during the summer. Electronics and fluorescent bulbs go to the recycling center. Metal can go to the dumpster at the Town Garage during open hours.

MESSAGE FROM THE RECYCLING CENTER

In September of 2021 the Town of Burke switched to “Zero Sort”. Residents no longer have to sort their recycling into separate categories. All recycling can be mixed together except for cardboard and boxboard. All items must be clean and we no longer accept soft plastic of any type and we also do not accept any black plastic. We hope this change will make recycling easier for everyone and will increase the amount of materials that are recycled. In 2021 the Recycling Center shipped 186 tons of recyclables.

Please remember that burning trash is not only harmful and illegal but it is getting more expensive. The State and Municipalities now have the power to issue tickets and fine violators up to \$500 for illegal trash burning. This includes burning trash outdoors in piles or burn barrels, or in woodstoves or enclosed incinerators

We thought everyone would like to know the figures for solid waste for Burke the past eleven years.

About 43.32 tons of compost materials were collected in Burke by a local composting business. If everyone in the town just did composting and recycling, the landfill tonnage would start to go down even with a population increase. We have several new composters available for sale at the recycling center.

Returnable deposit bottles and cans donated at the recycling center brought in \$1800 for several different non-profit organizations this year. This money helps groups like the Burke Senior Meal Site, the East Burke and West Burke Fire Departments and the East Burke and West Burke Libraries just to name a few.

We also save egg cartons for the public to pick up and use.

We also recycle used batteries, cell phones, aerosol cans, smoke alarms, mercury thermometers, used oil, propane tanks (1 pound and 20 pound) and fluorescent light bulbs.

Oil containers and hazardous product containers are not acceptable. Also no automotive, animal care, lawn and garden or medical product containers. (Bring these to Hazardous Waste Day)

All containers must be empty, clean, and **HAVE A RECYCLING SYMBOL ON IT**

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY

The Town of Burke will be having four HHW Days in 2022. The dates are as follows: July 16, 2022 and October 15, 2022 will be in West Burke at the Town Garage. We will also partner with the Town of St. Johnsbury to hold 2 HHW events in St. Johnsbury on May 21, 2022 and September 24, 2022. All of the Collection Days will be advertised in the Caledonian Record, the Burke website and posters will be placed at various locations around town.

WHAT IS HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY?

Household Hazardous Waste is any discarded household material that can be classified as toxic, corrosive, flammable, or reactive/explosive. *Paint, *Acids/bases, *Hobby Chemicals, *Pesticides, *Cleaning Products, *Batteries, *Thinners/strippers.

There may be both short-term and long-term harmful effects to humans and the environment from improper use and disposal of household hazardous waste.

To protect human health and the environment, the Town of Burke is sponsoring this one-day collection event two times per year. These two events will be held in West Burke at the Town Garage off School Street.

WHO MAY PARTICIPATE?

Only the residents of the Towns of Burke and St. Johnsbury. These special days are designed for collection of household generated materials only. Business waste will not be accepted during the hours of collection without prior arrangement. There will be a charge for accepting business waste. Please call the Town Clerk's Office at 467-3717 for more information.

We are sorry, but due to the cost of offering this event, we must limit participation to the residents from the Towns of Burke and St. Johnsbury. Please follow these instructions:

- ** Keep all products in their original containers with labels intact.
- ** Place individual containers in sturdy cardboard boxes for transportation to the collection event. You may want to use newspaper or cardboard to keep items from tipping or hitting each other during transportation. Make sure all lids are on tight.
- ** Wrap leaking containers in newspapers and place in clear plastic bags. Make sure lids are tight.
- ** Do not mix any chemicals or pesticides together. Place any chemicals that might react with each other in separate areas of the vehicle.
- ** Do not leave products in hot, unventilated vehicles for an extended period of time.
- ** Do not smoke near any chemical products. Smoking and eating are prohibited on site.
- ** Participants are discouraged from bringing small children or pets to the collection event.
- ** Please be patient. There may be a waiting line.

End of the Year – 2021 – Report

2021 was another strange and different year. The Town of Burke was quiet, with regard to lost and roaming animals but more cranked up with regard to barking dogs and dogs not having adequate shelter.

The Town has an animal control ordinance, a copy of which can be obtained from the Town Clerk's office. Obtain a copy, read it, understand what is expected of you and your animals. The State of Vermont has statutes regarding how animals are required to be housed, restrained, etc. The statutes can be read on line. Google them, read them and apply them to the care of your animals. Did you know dogs are required to have a house available to them when tied outside? Did you know that the chain they are hooked to is required to be four times the length of the dog?

It is also, again, that time of year when all dogs need to have a valid rabies vaccination and a town license. Please, get this done and make sure the Town Clerk has your updated contact information, lost dogs get home faster with this info.

Animal cruelty calls are becoming more frequent, and these calls are appreciated and looked into. On that subject, everyone needs to understand that what they believe they are seeing is not always the case. Just because you do not see food, water or shelter does not mean that it does not exist somewhere on the property. If an animal appears thin, there may be a very good reason for that. Old age, health problems, etc. and on many occasions these animals do have veterinarians looking after them. While I do investigate these situations, there is not always an actual problem. Please also understand that placing a fake cruelty call against someone that you are mad at or have a grudge against IS NOT appreciated and wastes time and money.

MOST IMPORTANT. If you feel you are in a bind, cannot keep or feed your animals, don't dump them or let them starve, call me, call the Town, there is no shame in asking for help and it is a private matter. If you need help with food, hay, whatever, call and ask, there are resources to resolve situations which are beneficial to everyone.

I hope the year 2022 brings all good things to the animal population in the Town of Burke.



The exercise class has resumed with instruction by Dolly Johnson. Several area seniors are enjoying greater flexibility and mobility due to their participation.

Health screening has resumed with various services being offered to the seniors.

The Council on Aging provides us with a monthly newsletter that we forward on to those getting meals at home and make available to those in-house. These newsletters offer recipes, exercise tips and news articles of interest to seniors.

Line dancing is alive and kicking. The dancers joined us for the Thanksgiving and Christmas meals and entertained the group with their lively performances.

We have been able to offer some musical performances. On many Wednesdays you will hear the Hoods performing a variety of songs.

Numbers are averaging around 15 in house meals per day, with Monday being the busiest day due to the return of Bingo!

We were lucky to be selected by White's Market for the round-up program. A big thank you to White's Market and the many shoppers who rounded-up for us.

There had been on-going issues with repairs and an intermittent odor that was a concern to the meal site staff and others in the building. We are looking forward to this being a safer unit providing a good cooking experience for many years to come. Thank you to those who came together to make this happen.

We are anxiously awaiting a time where we can safely gather in large numbers so we can resume the Music Jam.

We would like to update the plaques on the wall remembering those with a connection to the meal site that we have lost. If you know of someone who should be included, please contact the meal site or a Board Member.

ANNUAL REPORT

For 2021

Good bye 2021, it looked a lot like 2020. We completed another audit for our office in 2021 and it resulted in no findings or problems of any kind. The state of the Caledonia County Sheriff's Department is very good. We have kept our rates for service the same for the past few years and have a slight increase with construction and traffic. This increase is do to the fuel prices. We continue to add vehicles to our fleet, 3 new cars coming in the spring, replacing cars that have served us well. We have 6 marked cars, a 2014 van for prisoner transports, one unmarked car being used for civil process service. The radar cart is working well and in many towns. That purchase was with the use of Governors Highway Safety Grant funds. We have a large enclosed trailer that we use as an office at the fair and other security details. This trailer may be utilized as a command post at a mass casualty incident as well. We have an ATV and two golf carts. With project (ROAD), Responsible Operators Against Distractions, we want to continue to educate operators about phone use and texting while driving. We continue to do town patrols and we feel that the towns that we patrol are a safer place to live & drive in because of our presence. The patrols are community based. Which means each town is different, so the patrols may be different. We are taking a proactive response instead of a reactive response. This effort has helped with both fighting crime and communications with the towns. The Sheriff's Department has 11 Law Enforcement Officers to start the new year, with hopes to send a couple new hires to the academy in the spring. Our goal is to have 20 to 25 deputies to cover all details. We have become more active with local schools to ensure the safety of students and staff. We have been involved with drills and evacuation plans and will continue to assist as needed. We continue to look at 24 hour dispatching for the county, but are unable to do that right now. Our new location is wonderful and working as it should. We've had a lot of visitors and people stopping by with question. We are more visible and easier to reach. Plus the savings on the tax payers went from \$62,000, down to \$30,000. In 9 years, that expense will go away and the county will own the building.

If anyone has questions or concerns, please call me or stop by the office. My door is always open. I look forward to serving this county as the Sheriff. We will again do snowmobile patrols throughout the county. Doing our best to keep the trails as safe as possible, and we will again answer snowmobile related complaints. 2021 Local Health Annual Report

COVID-19

It has been almost two years since the COVID-19 pandemic began, and in response, our families, schools, businesses, first responders, and countless other groups have worked to better protect the health of our communities. Together we ensured towns had access to the vaccine, testing, and other services needed to make more informed decisions about their health. As of December 1, 2021, approximately

- 494,000 Vermonters received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine.
- 546,055 people have been tested and a total of 2,570,835 tests completed.
- Many COVID-19 resources are now provided in over 20 different languages.

Public Health Programs

In addition to COVID-19 response efforts, Local Health offices continue to provide health services and programs to Vermont communities, including but not limited to

- In collaboration with Town Health Officers and other local partners, we help Vermonters better understand the relationship between their environment and their health at a time when more of us are spending time at home with our families. Find information about environmental health and lead, asbestos, toxic chemicals, child safety, food safety, climate change, drinking water, and more at <https://www.healthvermont.gov/environment>.
- The WIC nutrition program continues to provide primarily remote access to services with phone appointments. In 2021, an average of approximately 11,300 infants, children, and pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding people were served by WIC in Vermont each month.
- As of November 23, 2021, 193,000 flu vaccine doses have been administered. Protecting people from influenza continues to be particularly important as the flu may complicate recovery from COVID-19.

Thank you to everyone involved in supporting these efforts. We look forward to what 2022 brings, to seeing you in the community, and encourage you to stay in touch with us.

We are excited to share the progress we've made towards bringing high-speed internet to the 50 member towns of NEK Broadband. Our pilot project in Concord, Waterford and Lunenburg will offer 100 Mbps symmetrical service or higher to 342 addresses in late 2021 and early 2022. We've received additional state and federal grant funding and are finalizing plans for a full-length construction season beginning the spring of 2022.

The organization has matured with the addition of three key partners. The National Rural Telecommunications Cooperative (NRTC) is experienced in design, construction management, and materials procurement. Waitsfield Champlain Valley Telecom (WCVT) will be our network operator and internet service provider. WCVT brings over a century of experience in telecommunications and provides all the modern services customers expect. Mission Broadband serves as an advisor and adjunct staff.

Who We Are:

A Communications Union District (CUD) is a municipal entity made up of multiple towns. Our district is building fiber-optic based internet access that has a capacity far beyond most current services available. Each town appoints at least one representative to our Governing Board, which has chosen to develop a publicly-owned network.

Member Towns: All but these five towns in the Northeast Kingdom (Caledonia, Essex and Orleans counties) have joined the district: Granby, Jay, Lemington, Norton, Victory. Wolcott in Lamoille county is also a member.

Project Plans: The overall project will require roughly \$140 million and take at least five years to complete. Funding will be through grants and municipal revenue bonds, as well as income from subscribers. The team is establishing technical standards as well as analysis of all locations and their current internet access. Utility pole surveys are in progress, fiber optic cable has been ordered, and we will be ready to continue construction in the spring of 2022.

Grants Received: NEK Broadband has received three different federal grants totalling \$1,045,000 for the Concord-Lunenburg-Waterford project, which began construction in November, 2021. We have been awarded almost \$7 million for designing the entire network, hiring additional staff and preparing for the 2022 construction season. Smaller grants were received from Vermont Community Foundation, Northeastern Vermont Development Association, Northern Community Investment Corporation, and Northern Enterprises.

Obligations: Community National Bank Letter of Credit (\$3.5 million); Northern Enterprises loan (\$80,000)

Kingdom East School Board Report

Kingdom East School District Community,

From pandemic exhaustion to superhero acts to immense opportunities, Kingdom East School District has had quite a year! And yet, through it all, we continue to focus on providing high-quality educational opportunities for our students, even amid the unprecedented challenges resulting from COVID. Through it all, teachers, support staff, administration, parents, and the community step up consistently to support our students and each other. The Kingdom East School District Board is thankful for the enormous efforts on everyone's part to navigate these challenging times.

Here are some highlights of the year:

- **Enrichment Opportunities**
 - Approximately 500 students participated in a 5-week summer program for recovery that involved 30+ community partners, field trips, and presenters
 - Experiential and outdoor learning in all schools
 - More than 400 students participated in fall sports, including 11 soccer teams. 70 students ran cross-country, and 80 students participated in the PreK-4 running club
 - Through the support of the Tarrant Foundation, embedded learning and personalized learning plans were put in place
 - 34% of students attended afterschool programming
 - Art, music, technology, world language, and advanced French offered across all schools
- **Improving Learning through Technology**
 - 2,210 new devices deployed through ESSER funds
 - 14 switch replacements & 99 new access points
 - Wiring improvements
 - Equitable access to technology across the district
- **Financially Prudent Decision Making**
 - Data-driven decisions
 - Redeployment of faculty and staff as COVID impacts personnel
 - Combination of Gilman and Concord 6th - 8th graders
 - Over 1.2 million in facilities grants that covered HVAC and other improvements

This report highlights our programs, schools, and the opportunities therein. There is a description of the work of Board committees and summary narratives of the budget. The KESD Annual Report also reviews the details of the Board's proposed FY23 budget of 37,984,787 -- a 6.79% increase from the FY22 budget. While the budget has increased the estimated tax rate for the district has decreased.

Every policy, decision, and strategy considers our students, employees, and community following the KESD mission statement that guides our efforts.

"In partnership with the community, staff, and students, the Kingdom East School District is committed to providing a collaborative and equitable environment of educational excellence through rigorous learning experiences that develop individual and diverse talents and abilities of all our students to prepare them for successful lives as contributing, responsible citizens."

Burke Town School staff created virtual Family Engagement opportunities in math and literacy, offering activities and games at different learning levels. A major highlight






