SELECTBOARD INFORMATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

Town of Grand Isle, Vermont

February 26, 2022

The informational meeting of 2022 which was held in -person and via zoom was called to order at 6:30 PM by Town Moderator, Ron Bushway.

Selectboard members present: Ron Bushway, AnnaMarie DeMars, Eric Godin, Jeff Parizo and Adam White.

Ron Bushway explains that the information meeting will follow Robert's Rules of Order and continues with the meeting process. Each question to be voted by the voters on Tuesday, March 1, 2022 will be reviewed. There will be a time for questions and discussion. All are asked to turn off cellphones and to be considerate of one another.

Official Warning

1. To transact any business proper to come before this meeting and to discuss any questions which shall arise concerning the issues to be voted upon by Australian Ballot on Tuesday, March 1, 2022.

Ron Bushway reads the warning below which appears on page 21 of the town report. He adds that Emily Clark has a brief presentation on the ARPA funds awarded to the Town which will be under item 5.

The legal voters of the Town of Grand Isle are hereby warned to meet at the Grand Isle Municipal Offices located at 9 Hyde Road on Tuesday, March 1, 2022. Polls are open between the hours of 7:00AM and 7:00PM to vote by Australian ballot on the following articles:

1. To elect all Town Officers as required by law.

Ron Bushway refers to page 24 of the town report for the list of candidates and turns the meeting over to Jeff Parizo. He asks those who are running for Town elected positions and who are present to stand when introduced.

- Cemetery Commissioner, 5 years – Valerie Hunter
- Library Trustee, 5 years – Kate O'Neill
- Selectboard Member, 2 years – AnnaMarie DeMars, Peter Kilburn and Couper Shaw
- Selectboard Member, 3 years – Ron Bushway and Josie Leavitt
- Town Constable, 1 year – Trever Boutin (via zoom)
- Town Lister, 3 years – Susan Lawrence (via zoom)
- Town Moderator, 1year – Ronnie Bushway

2. To elect all Unified Union School District Officers as required by law.

The same is asked for those running for Unified Union School election positions

- Unified Union School Board Member, 3 years – Michael Inners
- Unified Union School Clerk, 1 year – Melissa Boutin

- Unified Union School Moderator, 1 year – Write-in
- Unified Union School Treasurer, 1 year – Melissa Boutin

3. Will the legal voters of the Town vote to have the full details of the delinquent tax list printed in the Town Report?

Denise Douglass would like to know if the report will list names? The list will continue to be printed without names.

4. Will the legal voters of the Town vote to pay to the Treasurer, Real Property Taxes in three installments with due dates of October 31, 2022, January 31, 2023, and April 30, 2023, with an interest charge of 1% per month added if each installment is not paid by the due date; after April 30, 2023, any unpaid taxes would be charged an 8% collection fee plus the interest fees?

No questions.

5. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$1,002,026 as proposed by the Selectboard to meet the expenses of the Town General budget?

No questions. Emily Clark gives a presentation on the ARPA funds in the amount of \$638,500 that the Town has been awarded. Please see Lake Champlain Access Television (LCATV) for the full details.

6. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$20,000 to meet the expenses of the Cemetery Commission budget?

No questions.

7. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$73,000 for the Grand Isle Rescue, Inc., budget?

Ray Mitchell of Grand Isle Rescue, Inc. was present to speak on the budget request and answer any questions. He was asked to give a run down on operations which Ray Mitchell explains their current volunteer staff, calls, insurance billing and request for funding to help hire responders. Please see LCATV for more information.

8. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$10,000 to defray expenses of the Grand Isle Rescue, Inc. and Grand Isle Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. dispatching services?

No questions.

9. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$75,000 for the Grand Isle Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. budget?

Todd Boutin, Chief of G.I.V.F.D., Inc. was present to speak on the budget and answer any questions. He also was asked to give a run down on operations. Todd Boutin, like rescue, explained the need for volunteers and that all are hurting, regardless of the service.

Recruitment will be a big part of the department's focus. He also talked about the current staff, gear for responders, equipment and calls. Please see LCATV for more information.

10. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the annual sum of \$50,000 for the Highway Department Capital Equipment Reserve which is an increase of \$20,000?

Ron Bushway explains the reasons for the increased amount. Howard DeMars is aware of a new loader that was purchased and wonders if some of these capital equipment reserve funds were used towards this purchase. Ron Bushway confirms that some of the funding came from the reserves and the remainder from Highway's fund balance. No loan was obtained. No further questions.

11. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$554,000 to meet the expenses of the Highway Department budget?

Ron Bushway refers to page 34 and 35 of the town report. The budget appears to have largely increased; however, revenues and expenses are being budgeted for items that haven't been in past years. The State Aid and MOU with the fish hatchery funds were used as examples. These anticipated revenues are used to reduce expenses when formulating the municipal tax rate. No questions.

12. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$60,000 to meet the expenses of the Highway Department Road Materials budget?

Ron Bushway explained the increase when speaking to item 11. No questions.

13. Will the legal voters of the Town approve a sum of \$65,797 to meet the expenses of the Library Commission budget?

Colleen Bushway, Treasurer of the Grand Isle Free Library reports that the only increase in the budget is for the cost of living adjustment (COLA) for the Librarian which includes her wage, employer portion of FICA and retirement. No questions.

14. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$16,120 to meet the expenses of the Recreation Committee budget?

Denise Douglass comments the use of pickleball at Donaldson Park where players come from all over, yet Grand Isle residents can't use beaches that are in other towns. Just a comment. No questions.

15. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$10,000 to be raised by taxes for removing the invasive Emerald Ash Borer trees in the Town right-of-way's as needed?

Josie Leavitt questions whether trees will be removed showing evidence or in anticipation of the ash borer? Bill Baron, Town Tree Warden will be marking trees to be cut. He has expert knowledge and training with set criteria for removal. The question was raised about the cost to treat a tree vs. taking down. The cost for treating a 12" diameter tree is over \$300 and must be done annually.

16. Will the legal voters of the Town approve the sum of \$7,000 to be raised by taxes for the UVM Home Health & Hospice f/n/a VNA?

Char Kennedy supports and comments on the value the UVM Home Health & Hospice provides as a health service to this community. No questions.

17. Shall the Town authorize cannabis retailers in Town pursuant to 7 V.S.A. § 863?

Marie Prescott who is in attendance via zoom wanted to explain that she has done lots of research and share what she has learned regarding retail cannabis. By passing, this means getting sales of cannabis off the black market. Cannabis retailers will be monitored through the State of Vermont, much like the Department of Liquor Control. Licenses will be issued only to those retailers who have met all the requirements of the State ultimately providing a safer, well labeled product. Please see LCATV for more information.

A motion is made by Colleen Bushway to adjourn the meeting. David Leake seconds the motion. No further discussion. All are in favor. Motion carried. The informational meeting is adjourned at 7:29PM.

SELECTBOARD REPORT

This past year the Selectboard started to resume normal operations with in-person meetings and elected to continue to hold meetings via Zoom to allow for greater access to meetings for community members.

A large portion of time was allocated to the special audit conducted by Batchelder Associates PC for FY 2018, 2019 and 2020. The final review of these years and findings can be found on the Town website, www.grandislevt.org, under the Audit tab. While there was no financial wrongdoing discovered it was noted that the Town lacked numerous written policies. This is a matter the Selectboard has been addressing at each meeting with policies being written and ensuring proper controls are in place. The first major policy implemented after years of work was the Personnel Policy which went into effect July 1, 2022 and addressed numerous issues.

To continue the Town's focus on the environment the four street lamps that Town owns were switched out to LED lights and updated fixtures to cut down on electrical usage. This is in addition to the Town having solar panels on top of the fire station which provides the Town credits to drastically cut down on monthly electricity expenses for Town buildings.

The Selectboard spent a great deal of time dealing with a property in violation of the Town Bylaws which was classified as a salvage yard due to the large number of items on the property which is a violation of the Town Bylaws. We do encourage all to review the Bylaws on the Town website as in FY23 and FY24 it is anticipated that more properties will be addressed.

This past year the Town dealt with issues pertaining to dogs and running off lease. Unfortunately, in two circumstances multiple sheep were killed by dogs. The Selectboard and Animal Control Officer are going to actively enforce our Town Dog Ordinance (on Town website under "Forms" tab) and will start fining dog owners that are in violation as well as impounding dogs when warranted. We are here to keep our community safe and ask for all dog owners to please have control over their dogs and report any issues.


The Grand Isle Selectboard holds its meetings the first and third Mondays of the month at 6pm with a physical location at the Town Office as well as via Zoom. Please go to www.grandislevt.org to the Selectboard page to view agendas with the Zoom link, read past meeting minutes and get contact information for Selectboard members. 



Town Clerk and Treasurer Report for FY'22

The Town operates on a fiscal year starting July 1st and ending June 30th. Life seemed a bit more “normal” with less restrictions around COVID. During the summer months the population not only in town, but throughout the county, increases. Whether returning as a seasonal resident or just visiting, the office has more activity with the issuing of marriage license, transfer station stickers, and watercraft registration renewals.

In late August and early September, the first half of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds was received by the Town. The total amount awarded to Grand Isle is over \$638,000. A survey by the Planning Commission was conducted to gather input from the community for spending ideas. Infrastructure for community space ranked among the top along with water quality. As well, during this time of year, property tax bills are issued which is the Town’s main source of revenue. Collection dates remain the same with three (3) installments each being the last day of October, January and April.


This year was particularly challenging due to a special audit for prior fiscal years of 2018, 2019 and 2020 which was performed by Batchelder Associates, PC. Additionally, the annual FY’21 audit was conducted by RHR Smith & Company. A huge amount of time was consumed assisting in these audits.

The Annual Town Meeting held in March was one of two that occurred. All monetary items were approved and a total of 551 voters participated. There was another held in May as a Special Town Meeting which readopted, ratified and confirmed the actions of the March meeting. A total of 234 voters participated. Voters were able to vote early, by absentee or in person. Proper disinfecting and spacing of voting booths still took place even though it was not required.

The office is open Monday through Friday 8:30 AM – 3:30 PM as well as Saturday 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM. Appointments can also be arranged. Whether assisting residents, taxpayers, visitors or others, we are always available to help. We will do our best to answer questions or direct you to someone else who can. All land and vital records are recorded and preserved here in this office. Some of the other services provided include copying, faxing and scanning documents, land postings, obtaining licenses, notary services, registering vehicles and registering to vote. Please visit the Town’s website (www.grandislevt.org) for current events and other useful resources. We welcome your comments and suggestions on ways to make it easier to conduct town business.

Special thanks to Sue Moquin, Scott Brown, Diane Cota, Sue Lawrence, Joe Longo, Marie Prescott and Brad Sheridan for all your hard work and support. Additionally, whether serving as an appointed or elected official, employee or volunteer, every position plays a vital role in the functionality of our “Beauty Spot of Vermont” in which we live, work, entertain, pray, vacation or simply pass through.

Ilyo spent many hours mapping the plots and recording names in the old original section of the Grand Isle Cemetery, reporting damaged stones and ensuring that flags were placed on every Veteran's grave. His dedication to the town was exemplary.

Prior to Memorial Day volunteers placed nearly 250 flags on graves of Veterans buried in Grand Isle Cemetery and Hoag Cemetery. From the American Revolution to the present day, every war is represented by veterans buried in Grand Isle cemeteries. Thank you to the local VFW for providing the flags. If you know of any Veteran whose grave is not marked with a flag, please let one of the Commissioners know.

The Macomber Cemetery, a small family burying ground adjacent to the Quaker Cemetery on Adams School Road, became part of the Town Cemeteries in 1949. In the fall of 2021 restoration of the grounds began by cutting back branches which had grown over the markers. Work was completed in the summer and fall of 2022. Champlain Monuments cleaned all the stones and straightened those which were leaning and removed lichen from the boulder at the Quaker Cemetery. The Cemetery Commissioners and volunteers pulled up roots encroaching on the bases of the stones, mulched the grounds of the Macomber Cemetery and trimmed back the cedar hedge at Quaker Cemetery.

Cleaning and restoration work continued in the Grand Isle Cemetery. Another section on the west and south sides of the old section of the cemetery was done in summer 2022. The work will continue in the summer of 2023.

Sue Lawrence, Secretary/Administrator, must be notified before burials are done in the cemetery to ensure remains are interred in the correct place and that all paperwork has been completed. In fall of 2022 additional lots were surveyed and marked out on the west side of Grand Isle Cemetery. Approximately 550 double lots will allow for future expansion. Contact Sue Lawrence at GrandIsleVTCemetery@gmail.com for further information.

The Grand Isle Cemetery is the beneficiary of several trust funds. The income from those is restricted as to its use. The **Harold & Doris Hanson Fund** is interest income from the Hanson Trust at Community Bank. It is used for upkeep of the Hanson plot and the excess for upkeep on other plots. The **Herbert Russell Fund** provides \$500 annually to be used for care and upkeep of the cemetery. The **Bernice Martin Trust** consisted of 60 shares of AT&T stock with the income to be used for upkeep of the Martin plot. That stock has been diversified and is currently managed by LPL Financials. The **Cemetery Trust Fund** is the perpetual care fee from non-residents who bought plots.

Please remember that planting of shrubs or trees in the cemetery is not allowed. The Cemetery is closed to burials from December 1st to May 1st each year. Grand Isle Cemetery Facts

Grand Isle Cemetery, Rt. 2. Used privately prior to 1801, purchased by the Town in 1801, first known burial 1803. It is the only cemetery still open for burials. Approximately 7 acres, nearly 2,000 burials.

Hoag Cemetery, Allen Road - Rt. 314. It was the Minckler family cemetery prior to purchase by the Town in 1812. First known burial 1801, last 1986. Also known as the Minckler, Kent Corner, or Allen Cemetery.

Quaker Cemetery, Adams School Road. Established 1801 by the Society of Friends; first burial unknown, last burial 1936. Many unmarked graves per Friends' beliefs. A huge boulder placed in 1899 lists names of some of the Quakers buried there. Care of this cemetery was taken over by the Town in 1949.

Macomber Cemetery, Adams School Road. The Macomber family cemetery, first burial in 1844, last in 1908. Care of this cemetery was taken over by the Town in 1949.

The Development Review Board (DRB) is a quasi-judicial board consisting of five full-time members; Joe Steffen - Chair, Kristy Wheel - Vice Chair, David Capen, Panos Lekkas, Vacant and two alternate members Joe Longo and Josie Leavitt. Meetings are held on the first and third Wednesday of each month for hearings or administrative business. The DRB follows the rules and procedures set forth in the current Grand Isle Zoning Bylaws and Subdivision Regulations. The Board takes evidence and makes decisions on applications for subdivisions, conditional use, site plan review, boundary adjustments, variances and waivers from the Town's private road standards. Appeals of an act or decision of the Zoning Administrative Officer (ZAO) also come before the Board.

The DRB process involves established time frames for specific actions such as warnings, postings, hearings, decisions and appeals. If a property owner is considering a change to his/her property, the ZAO can provide assistance with the application and the process.

It was another busy year for the Highway Department. Highway maintenance included grading gravel roads, roadside mowing, reviewing curb cuts, cutting trees and brush in Right-of-ways, replacing culverts, ditching, and stone lining ditches as required by Act 64, which has been in effect since 2015. This law was implemented as part of the Clean Water Act, and pertains to our Highway infrastructure, since all water flow from ditches makes its way to the Lake.

The Highway Department makes a special effort to plow and sand roads for the school bus routes and our first responders.

Road preparation and paving was done on Quaker Road, the north end of Reynolds Road, as well as a portion of East Shore North.

We continue to apply for Grants to offset expenses to taxpayers.

The Highway Department manages the Transfer Station and we thank the Transfer Station employees Joe Longo, Don Hughes, and Ron Waller for their continued hard work and dedication.

The Highway Department sends special thanks to all the Grand Isle taxpayers for their support, as well as the Selectboard for their support on our projects and equipment needs. We thank all of the office staff; Melissa Boutin, Sue Moquin, Scott Brown, Listers, Planning Board, and members of the DRB.

We have 7,684 titles in our collection of books, movies and audiobooks. Patrons also have access to our Home Card and Interlibrary Loan services. Program Highlights:

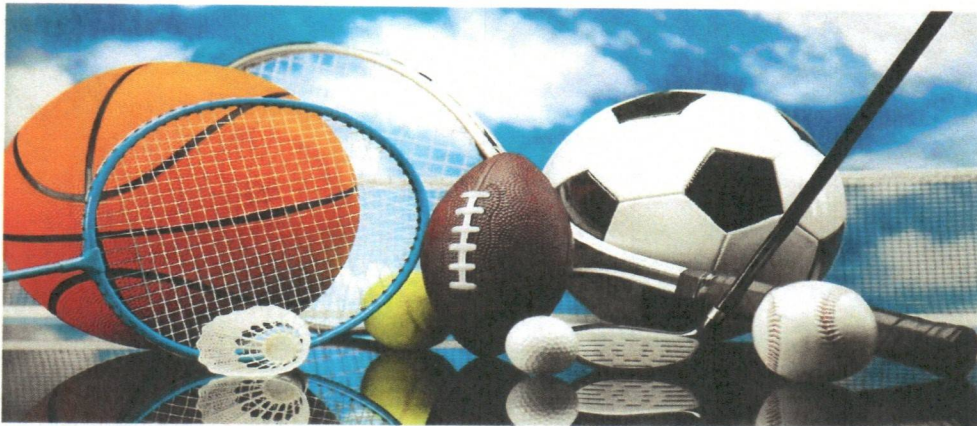
- Hosted the recreation basketball league for grades Pre-K thru 4.

DOG LICENSES

All dogs six months of age or older shall be registered on or before April 1st of each year. A current rabies vaccination certificate is required. A fee for a spayed/neutered dog is \$10 and \$15 for a non-spayed/non-neutered dog. Fees increase after April 1st.



PROPERTY TAXES

Property tax installments are due October 31, 2023, January 31, 2024, and April 30, 2024. Interest of 1% per month is imposed after each missed installment. A one-time 8% penalty plus the 1% monthly interest is imposed after April 30, 2024, for taxes remaining unpaid in a given tax year.

Northwest Vermont Solid Waste Management District
2022 Supervisors' Report

The Northwest Solid Waste District's (NWSWD) mission is to help its residents reduce waste, recycle the waste it produces and reduce the toxicity of what ends up in the landfill. The result of this work shows in the amount of waste we diverted from the landfill this year. Some of our 2022 highlights include:

- NWSWD residents used our services and facilities almost 50,000 times!
- District operations diverted 1,565 tons of waste from the landfill!
- Our outreach program engaged over 300 businesses in the Northwest Vermont region.
- We collected almost 60 tons of hazardous material from 1696 households and small businesses through our Household Hazardous Waste program.
- Our composting programs collected over 700 tons of food scraps from businesses, institutions, and residents to be turned into compost.

NWSWD will hold a Bond Vote on Tuesday, March 7, 2023. Voters will be asked to authorize the NWSWD to borrow up to \$1.5 million to finance the District's cost of renovating the NWSWD Georgia Recycling Facility. The proposed improvements include: Construction of a new building for the collection and storage of household chemicals like paint, bleach, oil, and pesticides; Redesign of our traffic flow system with better unloading areas and additional parking; A 3000 square foot addition for the storage of baled recyclables.

When our facility was built in 2007, we exclusively managed cardboard and paper, and served around 34,000 people. Today our programs serve over 54,000 residents and have expanded to include electronic waste, Household Hazardous Waste, plastic diversion, maple sap tubing, agricultural film, and many other waste streams. Our facilities can no longer safely support the volume and variety of recyclable material we are now receiving. The original site design and increased traffic have created safety concerns for staff and customers.

These improvements will increase the number of residents that we can serve, improve the safety of our employees and customers, increase the amount of waste we are able to recycle, and improve the efficiency of our operations. Please support the NWSWD's vision for a better waste system in Franklin and Grand Isle Counties and vote YES on March 7th.

ARTICLE I

Shall general obligation bonds of Northwest Vermont Solid Waste Management District in an amount not to exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000), subject to reduction by the application of, District reserve funds and federal and state grants-in-aid, be issued for the purpose of making certain public solid waste improvements, namely expansion of the Georgia Recycling Center and offices including commodity storage, waste collection, and household hazardous waste collection facilities, the aggregate estimated cost of such improvements being One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000), such debt service to be paid from NWSWD Operating Revenues? It is anticipated that revenues through District services will be sufficient to cover District obligations for repayment. If however these fees are insufficient to enable the District to make timely payments of any amount due, the District will collect any deficiency through increased rates to District provided services, assessments and surcharges in an equitable manner. As provided in the District Charter, obligations incurred under chapter 53 Title 24, VT Statutes Annotated, shall be the joint obligation of the District and Each Member Municipality.

The legal voters of the Northwest Vermont Solid Waste Management District are further notified that voter qualification, registration, and absentee voting relative to said special meeting identified in Article I shall be as provided in Chapters 43, 51 and 55 of Title 17, Vermont Statutes Annotated. I respectfully submit the following data of law enforcement services provided by the Grand Isle County Sheriff's Department in Fiscal Year 2022. Our goal is to improve the quality of life for the residents and guests of Grand Isle County by providing community service while upholding the laws of the State of Vermont and the statutory responsibilities of the Office of Sheriff. We make every effort to build upon the trust and support the residents of Grand Isle County have placed upon us by building sincere networks in our community while offering high-quality, cost-effective law enforcement services.

In Fiscal Year 2022, the Sheriff's Department responded to 1735 calls for service. These incidents are broken down into the eight (8) categories below along with the percentage of calls for service in each group by fiscal year.

The most visible role of the Grand Isle County Sheriff's Department is the patrol division. Pro-active patrol is the first step for countless investigations involving illegal activity. Deputies not answering calls for service are pro-actively enforcing motor vehicle laws to intercept criminal activity while deterring serious traffic crashes through the enforcement of laws involving impaired driving, distracted driving, speeding and passenger safety laws. Deputies are also active within the community and in the schools teaching awareness of current public safety issues within our county. In FY2022, the Sheriff's Department pro-active approach to law enforcement documented 1940 traffic stops. **Grand Isle County has not had a traffic fatality since November 2017.**

FY2022 has been a challenging year due to the shortage of law enforcement nationwide to include the GICSD. GICSD also experienced support staff turnover due to retirement and staff relocation.

We Are Here To Help

Dear Neighbors,

Since 1951, the Grand Isle Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. (GIVFD) and its members have proudly served the Town of Grand Isle and neighboring communities. In 2022 the department responded to 131 emergency calls including structure fires, motor vehicle crashes, carbon monoxide and fire alarms, hazardous material spills, medical assists including CPR in progress and marine and ice rescue calls. We currently have 16 members who serve our community 24/7, year-round in addition to our auxiliary members which host fundraising events and help the department where needed.

In June GIVFD members selected Adam White to become the departments Fire Chief. Chief White has been on the department for ten years and steps into this new role with leadership goals of increasing membership, transparency, and community engagement.

This year we are focusing on addressing our biggest challenges and concerns, namely the aging and antiquated fleet (average age of a truck is 23 years), boosting membership and community outreach. Often the fire department is only seen when an emergency arises, however this year expect to see our members out in the community working with businesses on safety plans and improvement and at community events to meet those we serve and help improve our neighbors fire safety concerns.

Departments around the state are struggling with membership and we are no different. With a population of 2,100 there are 16 people that have stepped up to volunteer and help their community with their time. Stop by the station during our training night, Wednesday, at 6:30pm or reach out to Chief White at awhite@grandislefire.org to get more information about becoming a member and come visit the station. We need people for all tasks whether interior operations, traffic control, drivers and pump operators, exterior support and more roles. We train you to what you are comfortable with.

GIR Inc. is a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation that provides Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for North Hero and Grand Isle. We operate two ambulances with state-of-the-art equipment, inspected and licensed by Vermont EMS. Training and testing for certification of providers is conducted to both national and state standards; EMS procedures are determined by Vermont State Protocols.

Grand Isle Rescue had a busy FY 21/22. We responded to 317 total calls, of which 209 were in Grand Isle, 81 in North Hero and 27 in surrounding towns. We transported 182 times to the hospital and treated 73 cases that weren't transported. We acted as mutual aid standby for 28 calls and 34 calls resulted in either no patients to be seen or we were cancelled on route.

A full rescue crew of at least two licensed members must be available 24 hours a day, 7 days and week and 365 days a year – that's 17,520 hours of commitment for members of our agency. In FY 21/22 we were able to pay Per Diem staff to assist our primarily volunteer organization for 483.25 hours and we were able to pay a nominal stipend to some of our volunteers for an additional 540.75 hours, leaving 16,496 hours to be covered unpaid by our dedicated volunteers. We'd like to continue to offer a stipend to members who wish to receive it and also work to increase our Per Diem pool moving forward.

As with all volunteer agencies, membership ebbs and flows. We are proud to say that we have 6 newly licensed active new members in FY 21/22 and have multiple volunteers currently enrolled in courses to obtain their licensure. We look forward to continuing to grow and serve our communities with your support.

A group of local residents established the Grand Isle Fire District #4 in 1967. A Charter and Bylaws were adopted on July 17, 1967. The purpose of the GIFD #4 is to supply dependable, potable water.

The GIFD #4 is a non-profit, municipal organization. Our water filtering and distribution system is an integral part of the **infrastructure** of Grand Isle. We are part of the Town of Grand Isle, yet we are independent. Currently, the GIFD #4 supplies water to 377 households in the Town. Our customer fees and rates are designed to cover all the costs associated with supplying water to our customers, in both the long and short term.

In *Fire Districts and How They Work: A Guide for Municipal Life*, by the Vermont Office of the Secretary of State, dated March, 1992, it states: ***"Fire districts are the orphans of Vermont municipal life. Towns and school districts have real identities, clear boundaries of authority, and good law to support most of what they do. Fire districts have none of these."***

Though we are considered "municipal," **we do not receive any funds from the Town of Grand Isle.** (We received a small amount in 1967, the year GIFD #4 was founded.)

By Vermont law, the Fire District is governed by a Prudential Committee. The current members are:

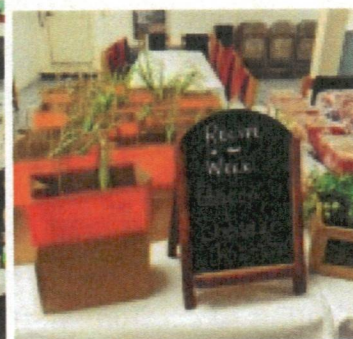
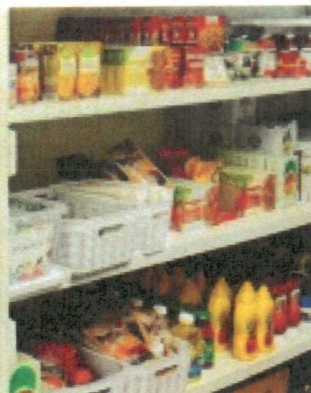
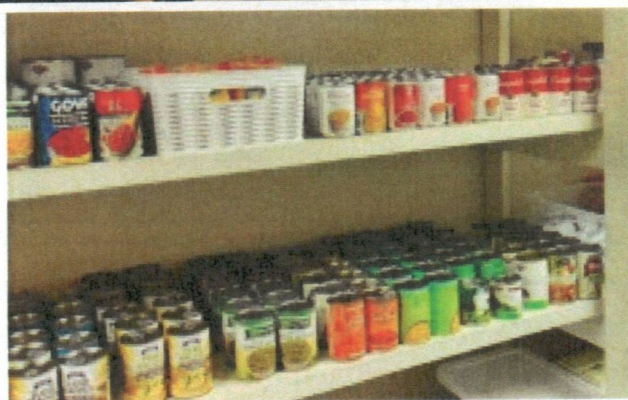
The Prudential Committee meets monthly, on the 2nd Monday of each month, at 7:00 PM, at the Water Plant at 204 West Shore Road in Grand Isle. The next Annual Meeting will be held on April 10, 2023, in conjunction with our regular meeting. Customers and guests are always welcome to attend.

H₂O Facts The GIFD #4 was one of the first to apply to the Town of Grand Isle in 2021 to receive a portion of the ARPA infrastructure funds received by the Town. As of January 2023, it looks like the Planning Commission is recommending to the Selectboard (who has yet to vote on the actual distribution of the \$638,000) **that the Fire District receives none of these funds.** This, despite the fact that "water infrastructure projects" was voted one of the top two priorities in the March 2022 Planning Commission survey.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF GRAND ISLE

July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022

The mission of C.I.D.E.R. is to develop and foster resources that enable the people of Grand Isle County to live in their community with dignity. C.I.D.E.R. accomplishes this by providing direct services and collaborating with other individuals and groups. C.I.D.E.R. feels a special responsibility to older adults and persons with disabilities. The values that guide C.I.D.E.R. are to be: Caring, Creative, Client Centered, Community Based, and Cost Effective. C.I.D.E.R. is a 501(c) (3) non-profit membership organization governed by an elected Board of Directors representing each of the five towns in Grand Isle County. Membership is not required to receive any services or participate in any activities or programs.

Access to critical services and resources remained one of the primary challenges for Grand Isle County seniors and persons with disabilities and this continues to be compounded by the Covid-19 health crisis.

Following all required and recommended Covid-19 protocols C.I.D.E.R. resumed, group shopping trips, adult day program transportation, and congregate meals. We are also now scheduling a monthly group social excursion trip.

Most individual ride requests are for medical appointments or grocery shopping. During FY'22 C.I.D.E.R. provided 2,513 trips in our staff operated vehicles driving 92,798 miles. C.I.D.E.R. volunteer drivers provided an additional 1,179 rides, driving 61,471 miles and donating 1,782 hours of their time. 225 Islanders received rides during this period.

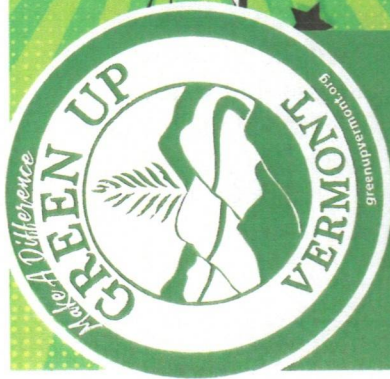
C.I.D.E.R. (senior) Neighbor Meals program located at the Congregational Church in South Hero resumed twice a month congregate meal and continued twice weekly meal delivery. During FY22 we served 250 meals to approximately 39 older adults and persons with disabilities. We also delivered 6, 538 meals to 80 individuals. C.I.D.E.R. also continued to partner with Franklin-Grand Isle Community Action to deliver a monthly bag of groceries to approximately 20 households through the "Food Shelf on Wheels".

During FY'22, 32 older adults participated in the C.I.D.E.R. "Living Strong" strength and balance training class. This program remains a hybrid of virtual and in person. 19 individuals participated in tai chi classes which continue in-person, usually outdoors. C.I.D.E.R. designed and built 16 wheelchair ramps or other similar home accessibility projects and the special needs equipment closet loaned 192 wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, shower chairs, and other items to 130 individuals and families. The C.I.D.E.R. PRESS newsletter reaches 1,450 (mostly) Grand Isle County households each month and mailed 17,814 copies in FY22.

The planned 30-unit affordable independent senior housing project "Bayview Crossing" on Carter Lane in South Hero successfully opened in October of 2022 and the C.I.D.E.R. office is now at 12 Carter Lane.

C.I.D.E.R. sincerely appreciates and depends on the large number of Grand Isle County residents who support us as volunteers, Members, and donors. We could not do what we do without you. I have greatly appreciated the warm welcome I've received since starting in May and have enjoyed getting to know the community (even if I am still finding my way around!). It was a successful year for C.I.D.E.R. as we transition to some semblance of a return to normal, and we hope FY23 is even better!

Island Arts Report

2022-2023

The Island Arts Center at the Homer Knight Barn in North Hero continues to be a popular destination for the arts in Grand Isle County offering residents and visitors alike the opportunity to enjoy concerts, theater, art exhibits, workshops, and classes. Over the summer of 2022, the restored red barn resonated with the sounds of music from renowned musicians like pianist Sohyun Ahn and Jorge Garcia Herranz, to the A Cappella groups and VT Jazz Ensemble. In addition, the venue was able to host 2 free performances thanks to an anonymous VT grant subsidy.

Now in our 38th year of bringing music and drama to the Islands, presenting performers and artists on a local stage and providing instruction in diverse activities, ranging from acting classes to making cards, we were able to also offer, thanks to generous instructors, free classes in Tai-chi, Yoga, Meditation and Folk dancing for the cultural enrichment and enjoyment of all.

Island Arts is a non-profit, all-volunteer organization whose central purpose is to celebrate the creative arts and creativity in the Lake Champlain region. Ongoing support from neighbors and friends, Grand Isle County towns, the GISU and generous grant support from the Vermont Arts Council, Vermont Humanities, and Forward Philanthropy have made our successful 2022 season possible.

At the heart of this organization is the mission to create opportunities for the young people of Grand Isle County to participate in the arts and creative educational projects. Last summer, Full Circle Theater Collaborative joined with Island Arts to present workshops for students ages 10-14 that developed acting, movement and voice techniques that culminated in the production of Into the Woods, Jr. New this year was the establishment of the Sylvia Barry Art Contest for Youth, sponsored by Mr. Allen Barry, Jr who proposed and supports this program to encourage young people to engage in artistic endeavors.

From its inception, Island Arts has had a strong scholarship program to assist families with the cost of dance and music lessons for children and teens. Our youth agenda also sponsors the Grand Isle County Music Fest each March where band and chorus members from all five towns participate under the direction and leadership of a visiting guest conductor and chorus leader. Additionally, Island Arts partnered with the Grand Isle County Farm Bureau to bring 4-H programs back to the county.

Island Arts is now planning the construction of a year-round office facility, part of the Island Arts Center. We invite you to work with us toward this goal by volunteering, sponsoring an event, or contributing to our fundraising events. Please join us!

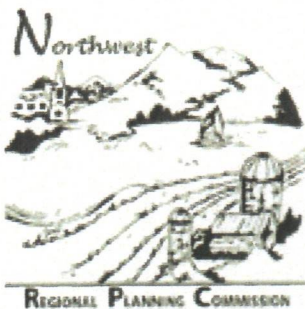
- Helping businesses navigate grants, incentives, rebates, and workforce training opportunities.

Town Report, 2022 - Grand Isle

Northwest Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) is a multi-purpose governmental organization created by the municipalities of Franklin and Grand Isle Counties. NRPC implements a variety of projects and programs tailored to local, regional and statewide needs. All municipalities in the region are entitled to equal voting representation by two locally appointed members to the Board of Commissioners.

- Provided technical assistance in local planning and zoning efforts, including grant writing for a municipal planning grant application for a town plan update.
- Provided support with a Village Center Designation application, including a draft Village Center Designation map.
- Facilitated meetings, developed agendas, secured speakers and trainings, updated bylaws and drafted minutes for the Grand Isle County Mutual Aid Association and Regional Emergency Management Committee.
- Assisted with the adoption of the Local Emergency Management Plan which will help the town be prepared for future disasters.
- Consulted with local officials, identified projects and provided technical assistance for Municipal Roads Grants-in-Aid construction projects.
- Delivered gleaned produce weekly to the Champlain Islands Food Shelf on a regular basis. Staff and volunteers delivered Everyone Eats meals to the food shelf weekly.
- Gleaned produce weekly at two farms in Grand Isle with the help of volunteers and a school group
- Healthy Roots purchased produce from 1 Grand Isle Farm to support the Migrant Household Food Boxes in partnership with NorthWest Family Foods and Bridges to Health.
- Provided business and market access assistance to two Grand Isle farms.
- Worked with local and state partners to determine eligible uses of local funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.

This year the Commission will assist our member municipalities with maximizing local, state and federal COVID recovery and infrastructure funds, Municipal Roads General Permit compliance, water quality project implementation, local energy and climate planning, emergency preparedness, brownfields redevelopment and other needed services. NRPC will help promote the Missisquoi and Lamoille Valley Rail Trails, support local farm and food businesses through its Healthy Roots Collaborative, assist the Northwest Communications Union District in expanding broadband access in the region, and coordinate Housing For All, a three-year housing development campaign. The Commission has no regulatory or taxing authority; however, each year we do request a per capita assessment in support of local and regional activities and to provide matching funds for state and federal programs.

Local Health Office Annual Report 2022

Twelve Local Health Offices around the state are your community connection with the Vermont Department of Health. Your district office is at the address and phone number above. We provide essential services and resources to towns in Franklin and Grand Isle Counties in order to protect and promote the health and well-being of people in Vermont. For example, in the past year and beyond, St. Albans Local Health Office:

Protected communities from COVID-19: Since the pandemic began three years ago our doors have remained open, and we've been able to serve communities thanks to individuals, families, schools, businesses, first responders, and countless others that worked with us to meet the needs of local towns. We provided vaccine, testing, and information, along with other key public health services.

Worked to prevent and control the spread of disease: In collaboration with community partners, since COVID-19 response efforts began, we hosted over 75 COVID-19 vaccination clinics and provided over 10,100 COVID-19 doses. Since August 2021, all local health offices have also documented and helped manage 8,125 COVID-19-related situations, including 1,271 COVID-19 outbreaks.

Ensured local preparedness for future emergencies: We worked with partners like schools, hospitals, and emergency personnel to ensure effective pandemic response and support preparedness to distribute medicine, supplies, and information during public health emergencies. This year, we responded to the emergence of human monkeypox virus by sharing information and providing vaccine to community members. As of November 15, 2022, 12 hMPXV vaccine doses have been administered.

Stayed attentive to people and communities most underserved: We provided services and resources to people who are more likely to experience adverse health outcomes due to health inequities. For example, we provided vaccine at schools without access, shelters, meal, and food distribution sites, farms, and more.

Collaborated with Town Health Officers around environmental health: To help Vermonters better understand the relationship between their environment and their health, we collaborated with towns and other local partners. Find information about environmental health including lead, cyanobacteria (blue-green algae), food safety, drinking water, climate change, healthy homes, healthy schools, and more at www.healthvermont.gov/environment.

Provided WIC services and resources to families and children: Provided WIC nutrition education and support to 1,740 individuals between July 1, 2021 and June 31, 2022, while enabling them to save on groceries so they can have more to spend on other things their family needs. WIC also empowers families with breastfeeding/chestfeeding support and provides referrals to other health and nutrition services. Learn more at www.healthvermont.gov/wic.

Supported student health and youth empowerment: According to the Vermont Youth Risk Behavior Survey, only 54% percent of students in Franklin County and 55% in Grand Isle County agree or strongly agree that they "believe they matter to people in their community." Regionally, efforts like mentoring and after-school enrichment programs help to ensure youth feel valued and included.

Promoted health in all policies: Health is not just individual behaviors and access to care, it's also housing, transportation, food access, education, natural resources, and other social determinants of health. We worked with towns, schools, worksites, healthcare providers, and other community organizations to establish plans, policies, and programming that improve health and wellness. To achieve health, we must continue to work together to improve opportunities for health across all sectors and periods of our lives.





Terms and Conditions on this page are intended to help explain, in general, the elements that make up the tax rate calculation. The final tax rate is calculated by the state. At this time the exact numbers have not been determined.

Equalized Pupils: 405.69

Not to be confused with the number of students attending or the number of students in the school district, the Equalized Pupil count is the weighted average number of pupils. This number is determined by the state. It is the number used for the Homestead Tax rate calculation.

Common Level of Appraisal (CLA): 86.98%

This is the ratio applied by the state to equalize local grand lists to reflect market conditions for property value. It is established annually by the Vermont Department of Taxes. This is necessary because we start with a statewide tax rate and that rate is modified to reflect the local housing market. A value of less than 100 indicates that on average properties are being sold for more than the local assessment. A reduction in the CLA results in an increase in the actual tax rate.

Property Dollar Equivalent Yield: \$15,479

This was previously the based education amount and the legislature set the base homestead property tax rate and the base education amount annually. This is now called the property dollar equivalent yield which is set by the legislature annually, but the base homestead property tax rate and the base tax rate on household income amounts are fixed at \$1.00 and \$2.00 respectively. For FY24 the property dollar equivalent yield is \$15,479 per equalized pupil. The property dollar equivalent yield functions in the formula the same way the based education amount did in past years. It is used to determine the equalized spending ratio for each district which is then used in the calculation of the Homestead Tax rate. The property dollar equivalent yield is *not* the amount that the district receives for each equalized pupil. The State does not pay the district a block grant for each equalized pupil.

Homestead Tax Rate: \$1.00

Homesteads are taxed at a rate that is adjusted in proportion to a district's education spending each year. The equalized rate for FY24 is assumed to be \$1.00. If the district's spending exceeds the base education amount, the equalized rate is increased in the same proportion for that district. The actual rate is determined by dividing the equalized rate by the common level of appraisal. The Homestead Tax Rate will be determined by the legislature.

Non- Residential Tax Rate: \$1.386

Nonresidential property is taxed at a fixed statewide equalized rate. This tax rate has no bearing on the education spending of the school district. The equalized rate for FY24 is estimated to be \$1.386. The actual rate is determined by dividing the equalized rate by the common level of appraisal. The Nonresidential tax rate will be determined by the legislature.

Income Sensitivity: 2.43%

For homeowners who qualify for income sensitivity, the homestead education tax is adjusted based on household income. BE SURE TO COMPLETE ALL THE FORMS NECESSARY WHEN YOU COMPLETE YOUR VERMONT INCOME TAX RETURN. As the law is currently, your property tax bill will reflect any reduction resulting from this factor.

The 2022-2023 school year is progressing well. As the response to Covid-19 has transitioned from a pandemic to an endemic the GISU has adapted. It is important to note that through the first half of the school year, all schools have experienced a small increase in lost learning time as a result of an increase in absences. The increase in absences is surprising, as last year's absences were a result of illness and quarantine whereas this year they are a result of illness only. Needless to say, we are working through the challenges.

The GISU is focused on the following five goal areas:

Academic Proficiency for All

By June 2024, 75% of students proficient in ELA and Math; 100% of students showing growth, especially students belonging to historically marginalized groups.

Effective and Responsive Systems of Supports For All Students

By June of 2025, consistent, effective, and responsive systems of support are implemented across the GISU to ensure 100% of students access equitable and inclusive core instruction and the academic and social-emotional supports needed for their success.

Robust Educator Support System

By 2025, increase teacher retention, preparation, and support to increase teacher sense of self-efficacy and ensure that our students with highest needs have the most highly qualified educators working with them.

Inclusive and Equitable Learning Environments For All

By June of 2025, GISU will demonstrate measurable growth on key indicators of equity as measured by a second administration of an equity audit and student, staff, and community perception surveys.

Strong and Efficient Technology, Finance, and Facilities Infrastructure

By 2025, implement state mandated infrastructure across tech, finance, and facilities that enables the flexibility to keep pace with technological and instructional innovations, and student needs (eg. Capital Improvement plan, SU Wide Technology Plan, Upgraded Accounting platform, etc.)

Each month the GISU and member boards receive an update regarding the progress towards achieving the goals in the Superintendent's written report. These reports are available to the public on the www.gisu.org website in the Board Agendas and Minutes section. As a GISU, we have held multiple meetings to receive community input about how to use federal grant funds. Throughout the fall, I have continued to hold community meetings every Wednesday evening. We also updated the GISU Website to a new platform, which we hope you find to be much more user friendly.

I continue to be proud of the work the teachers, support staff, administrators, students, school boards, families, and community are doing to ensure all members of the GISU Learning Community are curious, creative, courageous, and capable to pursue their aspirations in a diverse and ever changing world. I regularly share with the greater Vermont education community how the Grand Isle community has truly embraced the mantra "We Are All In This Together". 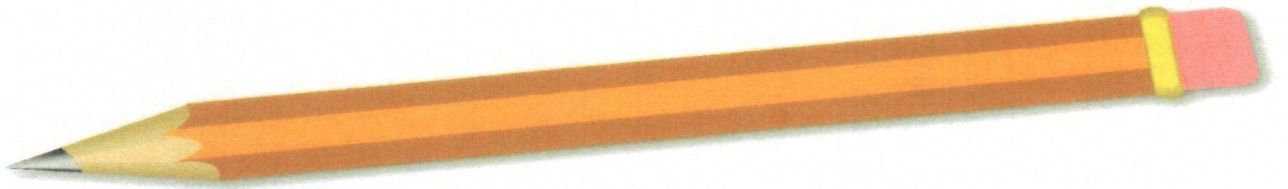
