The Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation reports funds available to support aquatic invasive species management are decreasing.

Vermont needs **mandatory boat decals** to support this important environmental issue, just like the states of Maine, Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada, California, Nebraska, Washington, Colorado, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Louisiana, and Montana.
