State Goal: **70x2025**

What is a Credential of Value (COV)?



- Certificate, degree, industry recognized credential, occupational license, or registered apprenticeship
- A means of verifying skills and competencies
- Has value in current and/or future labor market
- Stackable, transferable

Track progress toward Vermont's postsecondary attainment goal, identify where equity-related gaps exist, and share state- and national- level, data, research, and trends.

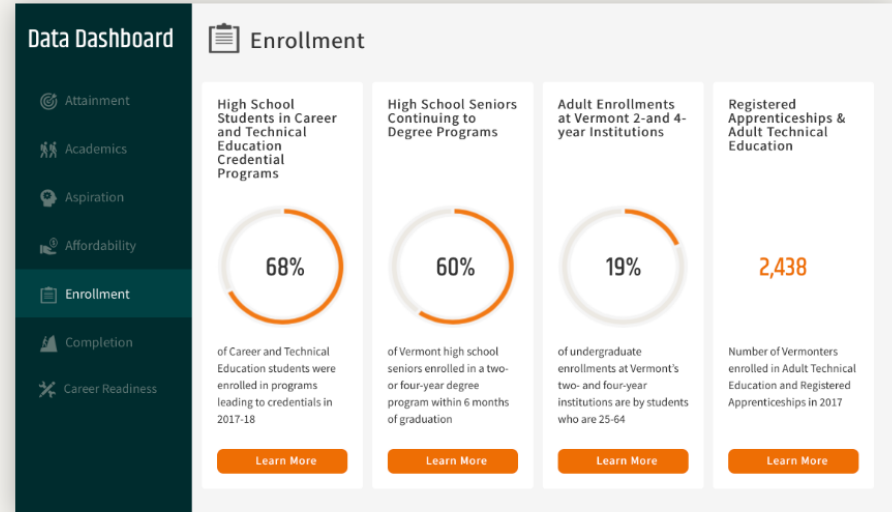

Education beyond high school has become a key determinant of economic opportunity and social mobility. Yet access and success aren't equitable.

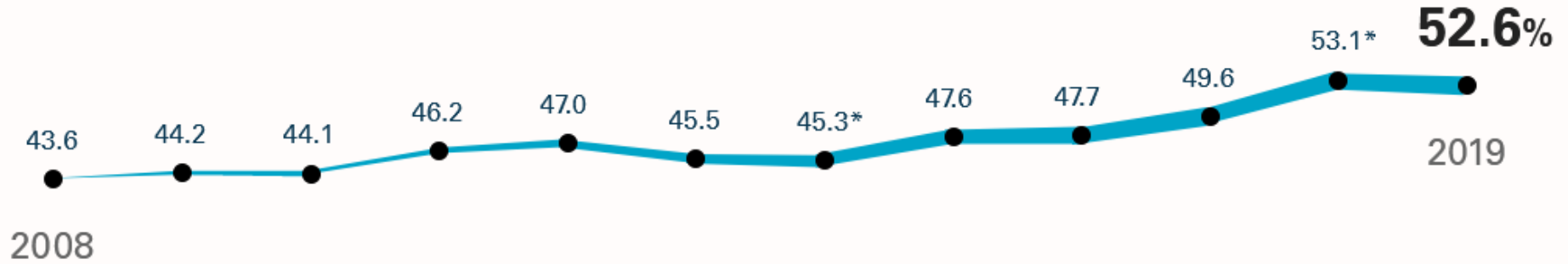

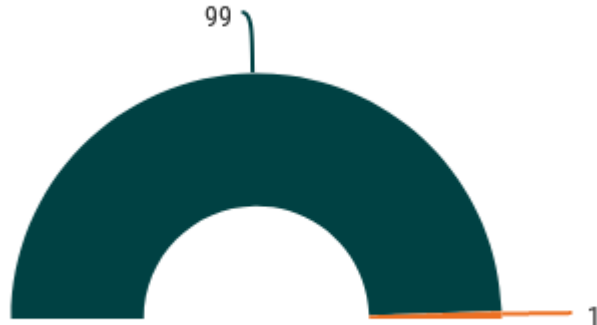

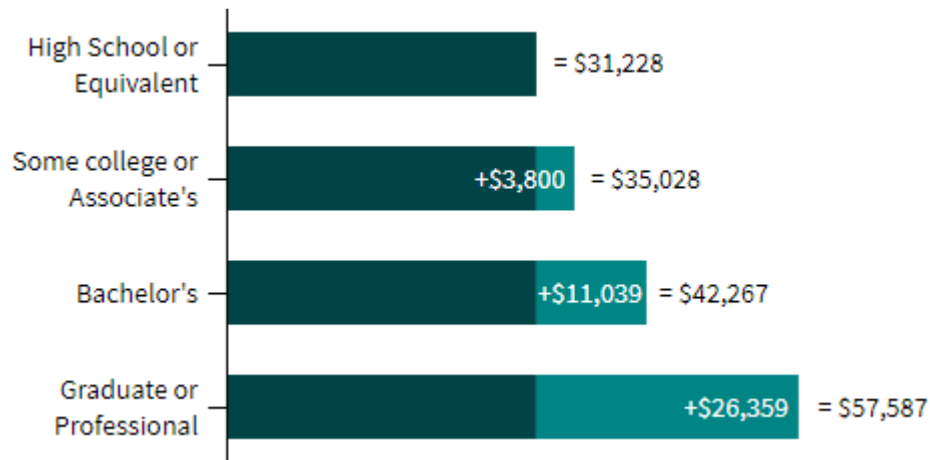

Only **34 percent** of Vermonters without a postsecondary degree believe degree and credential programs are affordable.

Before financial aid, an average Vermont family would spend **95 percent** of its household income to send one person to college.

34 percent of Vermont's indigenous population holds a bachelor's degree, compared to 37 percent of their white peers.



Only **16 percent** of Vermont's Class of 2012 first-generation boys obtained a degree within 4 years of high school graduation.



1 in 4 Vermonters do not have access to fixed, high-speed broadband internet, which disproportionately affects those in rural areas.

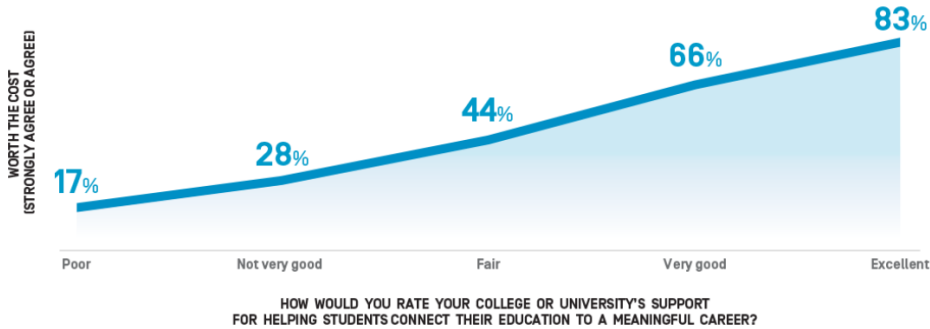

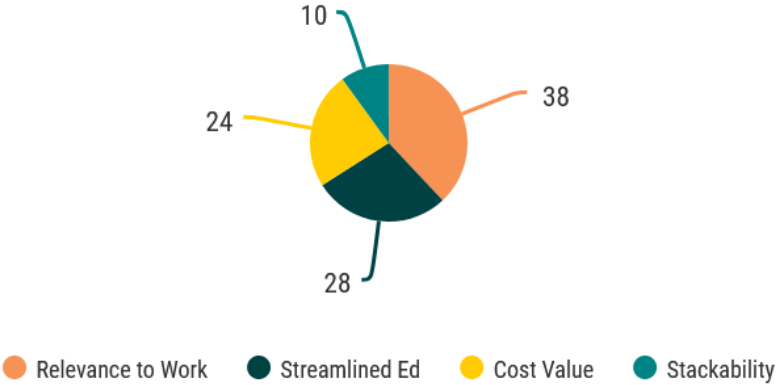

What Students Look for in Ed/Training



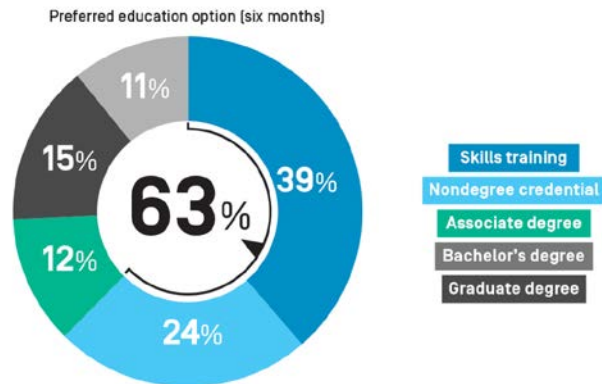
Vermonters Need Navigation Help

Policy Priorities in the Time of COVID

- **Address essential needs** such as housing, food, child care, emergency expenses, and transportation
- **Incentivize** development of short-term programs, competency-based learning, and other flexible offerings
- **Strengthen transition** from high school to ed/training
