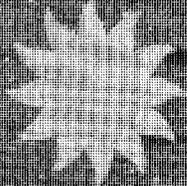

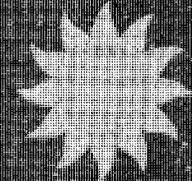

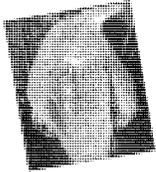


Town Selectboard



★ **Josie Henry (Chair)** – Josie was appointed to the board in 2021 and was elected for a 3-year term in 2022. Josie is a retired naval intelligence officer who owns and operates a vacation rental business on Lake Champlain. She is from a rural town in northwest Iowa and joined our community after marrying Alburgh native, Andrew Henry, in 2012. Josie enjoys the outdoors, traveling, and keeping up with the latest in news and politics.

★ **Russell Duchaine (Vice Chair)** – Russell was appointed to the board in 2020 and reelected in 2021 and 2023. He works as a locomotive engineer for the New England Central Railroad. Having graduated from Motorcycle Mechanics Institute in 2008, Russell's a true gearhead at heart with a passion for working on small engines such as ATVs, motorcycles, and snowmobiles. He is a lifelong resident of Alburgh who always enjoys a good game of pool.



★ **Donna Boumil-Sedgwick** - Donna was elected for a 2-year term in 2022. Donna grew up on her family farm in Alburgh, where she currently lives. She retired from the clerk/administrator position in the Village of Rouses Point in 2020 and is currently working at Lake Champlain Islands Economic Development Corporation. Donna has a small business selling baked goods and crafts and keeps busy helping with her grandchildren.

★ **Elliot Knight** – Elliot was elected to fill the remaining year of a 3-year term in 2022. Elliot moved to Alburgh in 2014 to take over his family's local manufacturing business, which he currently runs along with a vacation rental business he started in 2016. In his free time, Elliot loves woodworking and spending time outdoors.



★ **James Hokenberg** – Jim was appointed to fill the remainder of Shawn Creller's term in August. Jim is a selectboard veteran who has been around Alburgh with his family, all his life. He moved to Alburgh full-time after marrying his wife Jan in 1985. Together, they have two children born and raised in town. His interest has always been to help the Alburgh community, and he hopes to continue to do so. Jim's background includes working on his family farm, for VTrans, the Alburgh Highway Dept., the construction industry, and he was an audio manager for a large company in New York.

Highway Department

The Highway Department was busy in 2023 mowing roadsides and cutting brush in the summer months. They also repaved over half a dozen roads, mostly located in the village. Most recently, the town took delivery of a 2024 Peterbilt tandem plow truck. If you look for him, you will see our road foreman Rodney behind the control of it. George and Irving complete our highway department with a positive work ethic and dedication to our town.

Transfer Station

The Transfer Station has undergone a rigorous overhaul over this past year. Russell Duchaine accepted the transfer station manager position back in the spring of 2023, and with the help of our attendant Brendan and our newest employee Hunter, the transfer station is back on track. The facility looks great and is operating well—we hope to see you soon!

Letter from the Board

Dear Alburgh Residents,

This will be an exciting year for all of us, as we will be experiencing a total solar eclipse on April 8th, a once in about every 375-year celestial event for a given location! In preparation for this historical event, the board is coordinating with state and local public safety organizations on what to expect, so we can keep you all informed and potentially help local businesses and non-profits capitalize on this amazing opportunity. In addition, a handful of volunteers have incorporated under the name "Alburgh Community Festivals, Inc" to head up a festival for the town. You can expect updates on local activities and safety issues associated with the eclipse as the date closes in.

You can also expect updates from us on the town's remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, totaling just over \$415,000. The board is deliberating over how best to utilize these funds, with input from an advisory committee we appointed last year. Appropriations to date have been for town office equipment, cybersecurity upgrades, and free Alburgh Dunes State Park access for Alburgh residents. We hope to have the rest of the money obligated by the end of April and must have it obligated by year end.

On the town's finances, the auditors laid out some challenges we were facing leading up to last year's elections, which is why we placed an item on the ballot requesting the authority to appoint, rather than elect the town treasurer last year. Margret Brescia accepted the position last spring and is doing an amazing job. In addition, we had created the position of town administrator the year prior but hadn't found anyone to fill the position until last summer when Alex Goddard came on board. Alex is also doing tremendous work for the town. We thank them both for their hard work and dedication and feel confident we have a good system of checks in balances in place within the town office structure.

Unfortunately, during the treasurer transition, it was brought to light that the town had a series of penalties and fines from the IRS associated with back payroll taxes and failure to address them, dating back to 2014. Here are the details:

- The outgoing treasurer left one bill from the IRS with the selectboard in a folder with other bills. The board reached out to the IRS for details and was told the bill was one of several totaling over \$100,000 due in penalties and fines for back payroll taxes and associated fines dating back to 2014.
- The current selectboard, nor any previous boards to our knowledge, were aware of the letters coming into the town office from the IRS.
- The selectboard immediately reached out to the town attorney and hired an accounting firm to work through the books and confirm what, if any, money is owed.
- Our accountant is working through the numbers and an abatement request letter, as appropriate.
- An insurance claim has also been discussed with Vermont League of Cities and Towns, but we are unsure whether it will cover any of the debt at this time.

We will update the town as soon as we have more information and will be happy to answer questions on this situation and anything else voters would like to discuss at the upcoming town meeting. Before signing off, I would like to acknowledge Shawn Creller, who resigned from the board for health reasons last summer. Shawn is greatly missed, and our thoughts and prayers are with him and his family. I also want to thank my fellow town officials, our local volunteers, and our public safety organizations for all that they do. The town is lucky to have all of you, and I am grateful to serve alongside you!

Progress doesn't always seem like much, but even daily rituals can have a taste of triumph in them. In 2023 we had 158 dogs registered by their owners, committed 2,092 pages to the land records (mortgages, property deeds, et al), issued 21 marriage licenses, sold 59 hunting and fishing licenses, provided 58 temporary vehicle registrations, and I sent 2,690 emails. There is also a new phone and directory I am getting used to—apologies if I accidentally hung up on you while transferring!

She was once a teacher and I envied both her diligence and penmanship, and her memory lives comfortably in my mind. The inbox for "Eleanor's Stuff" has only an empty folder in it but it still stays within our sight. We also will miss Armand Premo who, as Justice of the Peace, used to keep order and kept us grinning with his stories whenever voting polls were open. Keep their commitment in mind, and all others who make the community a better place!

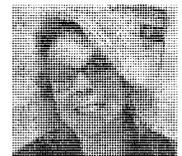

Elected Auditors Review
Fiscal Year 2022 – 2023

Elected Auditors are accountable to their town to review and evaluate whether the funds are being used effectively or not and to identify, if possible, any fraudulent or abuse of funds collected from taxpayers. The Elected Town Auditors for the Municipality of Alburgh, considered the internal control over financial reporting as the basis for the auditing procedures. The Auditors evaluation is for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements only and not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal controls.

Historically in Vermont there are 3 Elected Auditors during a fiscal year to review and audit a town's financial records. During this fiscal period 2022 – 2023 Alburgh lost one Auditor as of April 1st because the Auditor was hired part-time to become the Town Treasurer for Alburgh. Losing an Auditor so close to the end of the fiscal year was unfortunate for the two remaining Auditors but a good decision by the Select Board as the new Town Treasurer has a solid background in accounting.

Prior to the start of the July 1, 2022-2023 fiscal year the following steps were initiated by the two Auditors for review:

1. June 30, 2022, Snapshot of Bank Balance \$868,679.73
2. Items reviewed for Audit included: General Checking / Transfer Station Checking/ Cash Account and Grand List.
3. Paid invoices selected on a nth basis for review to confirm payments are being processed and posted correctly in the NEMRC accounting system.
4. In July 2022, a 3rd Auditor was appointed.

During the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 there were a number of adjustments that were required to correct information in NEMRC which included an adjustment to the Cash Fund and removing \$18,204.53 in voided checks out of NEMRC. In September it was revealed that a number of invoices were not being paid on time and late charges were being added. Recommendations were made and new procedures put into place by the Select Board and Auditors.

In October, a joint Auditor and Select Board meeting with Alton Brusio and Carol Behrman took place to review bank statements for the general fund and the transfer station and to outline end-of-month financial procedures.

At the same meeting it was noted by two Select Board members that approximately \$100,000 in spending without Select Board approval was done. The Treasurer reviewed the issue with the Select Board. In March of 2023 Auditor Margret Brescia did informal research with regards to the treasurer/bookkeeper roles and QuickBooks. At the next Select Board meeting she applied to become the Treasurer and was approved by the Select Board to start on April 1st.

Town Clerk Donna Bohannon resigns as of May 27th / Assistant Town Clerk Danielle James Choiniere applies for the Town Clerk position.

Town Administrator position offered to Alex Goddard starting July 1, 2023, with a starting probationary salary of \$60,000 annually; Town Clerk salary \$45,000 annually with full benefits.

The town received in June an IRS bill for \$27,668.22 which includes penalties and fines from a payroll submission in 2014, along with a bill from the State of Vermont for \$715.00. The bill from the State of Vermont is paid the \$27K is pending.

In June, the Select Board became aware of other IRS letters with bills relating to 941s and W-2s from 2014, 2019 and 2021. At the end of the 2023 fiscal year, with daily interest, the amount owed was \$100,321.21. As of August 3, 2023 (new fiscal year) the lien amount due with interest and penalties was \$87,310.21 per the statement received from the IRS Department of Treasury. KBS , an accounting firm based in Saint Albans Vermont, was retained by Alburgh to negotiate with the IRS

This audit review was put together primarily to provide the Alburgh Tax Base with a glimpse of financial issues that come up throughout the year and must be addressed by the Select Board. The one internal area where the Auditors would like to see improvement by the Select Board is to have more information and transparency on the town's financial spending throughout the year, not only annually at the Town Meeting. This tax year property taxes have escalated due to both the school and town budgets.

Taxpayers, to keep up to date on what is going on in Alburgh, go to the SB meeting and if you cannot attend the meetings, you can read the SB minutes on the town's website.

Managing Alburgh is not an easy job for any Select Board and each member of the board deserves a big THANK YOU for the time they spend and the work they do.

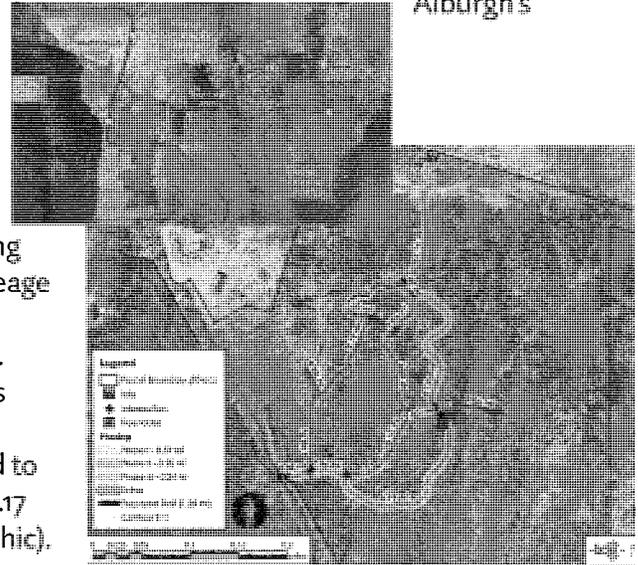

ALBURGH PLANNING COMMISSION

The Alburgh Planning Commission began updating the Town Plan which will be renewed in 2024. The Town Plan is a plan that provides a framework toward attaining community aspirations through public investments, land use regulations and other implementation programs. It can also qualify the community for state grants to fund improvements and receive specialized technical assistance. The planning commission is working with Northwest Regional Planning Commission during this process. A survey was issued via social media, town website, Alburg Educational Center, and paper copies to gather input from residents. The Town Plan can be found on the Town of website.

The Alburgh Planning Commission continued to work on plans and preparation for public recreation trails for the Industrial Park acreage which was deemed a wetland based on a wetland delineation conducted in 2020/21. The Industrial Park Corporation has been working with the Town of Alburgh Selectboard to transfer this acreage to the town where it will be utilized as additional non-motorized recreational trails (anticipated to be Feb. 2024). After submitting a pre-application for a Recreational Trails Program Grant through Department of Forests – Parks & Recreation, the Alburgh Planning Commission was invited to submit a full application for funding to complete Phase 1 (.17 mi) of the Industrial Park Trail Project (yellow trail on graphic).



The planning commission worked diligently with the State of Vermont and other agencies regarding the installation of informational signage of recreational areas such as Bicentennial Park, Rail Trail, Lakeshore Park and more.

An Economic Development Sub-Committee of the planning commission was formed and met during 2023. The purpose of this Sub-Committee is to afford businesses in Alburgh the opportunity to meet other business owners to discuss opportunities and challenges.

What's next for 2024?

Goals:

- Continue to seek funding for implementation of the phased trail project on the wetland acreage of the Industrial Park Rd. and other recreational areas
- Begin installation of informational recreation signage
- Complete the Town Plan
- Economic Development Sub-Committee Meet & Greet

The planning commission meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at the Town Office at 7pm.

Alburgh Rescue Inc. Year in Review

Alburgh Rescue, Inc. has completed its separation from the Alburgh Volunteer Fire Department. We currently have 30 members. Certifications range from Vermont Emergency First Responders through to Advanced Emergency Technician level providers. We are excited to announce that we have hired a full-time staff person who is a long-time member of both Alburgh Volunteer Fire Department and Alburgh Rescue, Inc. Charles "Chuck" Pease, AEMT started working full-time days to cover our busiest shifts. Chuck has also taken on the responsibility of administrator for ARI. His daytime availability on-site for connections in the broader community of Alburgh and the EMS community has been very beneficial. In addition to a full-time employee, we are excited to announce stipends for members who are covering shifts either between 6 am and 6 pm or 6 pm and 6 am. This was necessary to increase coverage due to an inability to provide complete services on an all-volunteer basis. This is occurring throughout the state and our little town is no exception. We are grateful to report there are still several volunteer members in the department. This remains an opportunity should you be looking for a way to give back! The stipend has made a significant improvement in moving us toward our goal of 24/7 availability of care and increased interest in joining the organization.

Our year has not been without challenges as we faced changes in leadership part way through the year. We had hoped to have stipend shifts sooner but desired to ensure that we were thorough in our processes prior to implementing these. We are pleased to report that since stipends and Chuck are in place, we have been able to respond to almost all of the calls within our service area. We continue to support the town of Isle La Motte by providing all EMS services for them as well as honoring our mutual aid agreements with our partner communities.

It was an averagely busy year with us responding to 383 calls and transporting 359 patients. We have 10 probationary members in the pipeline who are assisting with providing services in the town. We have continued our monthly hands-free CPR classes at no additional cost to the community. We have several members who are not only AEMTs but also CPR/First Aid instructors as well as state-certified Instructor coordinators. This will allow these members to provide ongoing EMS courses through the State of Vermont to allow for increased numbers of EMTs to potentially join the ranks.

Given the leadership changes, and challenges of getting credentialed with a variety of commercial and federal/state insurers, there are ongoing portions of our start-up plan that are still in process. We anticipate using the start-up funds allocated last year to continue to establish the organization through uniform purchases, equipment needs (specifically communication equipment for new members), life-saving equipment such as Zoll defibrillator maintenance and equipment, Autopulse battery replacements, and associated costs with starting a new organization (attorneys, accounting, insurance, etc.). We believe that in order to continue to provide the appropriate services to the town, we need to request \$300,000 to allow us to manage our expenses fully and ensure that 24/7 coverage can be provided in our service area. We understand the budgetary challenges of the times and do not take this request lightly.

We are excited about the prospects moving forward and continue to appreciate all the community support. We encourage you to come by the station, say hello, check out our facility and our vehicles, and meet our members.

The Alburgh Volunteer Fire Department (AVFD) is comprised of approximately 30 active members whose primary function is to preserve life and property in the Village and Town of Alburgh. The department is led and manned exclusively by volunteers. No member receives any financial compensation for the countless hours they donate annually in service to their community. These volunteers also regularly respond to mutual aid calls from neighboring departments in Grand Isle, Franklin, and Clinton Counties as well as Quebec.

The department's firefighters are trained and ready to perform extrication from motor vehicle crashes using specialized tools such as the "jaws of life", respond to carbon monoxide and smoke alarms, mitigate hazardous materials spills, and perform ice / cold-water rescue. These volunteers hold numerous certifications and routinely respond to incidents involving a wide variety of hazardous situations. Every firefighter is CPR/AED certified and several are CPR/AED instructors.

2023 has been a year of changes and challenges as well as progress. As of January 1, 2024 Alburgh Rescue has assumed responsibility for EMS responses. Alburgh Rescue is able to hire sorely needed EMS providers while keeping AVFD a volunteer organization. This decoupling of AVFD from EMS will also put us in a better position to access federal grant funds and minimize the impact that changes in regulations and necessary technology have on our town budget. We will continue to work with and support Alburgh Rescue, Inc. in any way we can to ensure their success and the safety of the community.

In 2023 a generous donation allowed us to purchase new extrication tools. While our old tools are still functional, improvements in the materials used to build vehicles had put us in a position where we were unsure if we would be able to remove victims from newer vehicles as fast as we could from older ones. These new tools will help us save precious minutes which will ultimately result in a better outcome for those who are trapped in newer vehicles as a result of a crash.

We are eagerly awaiting the delivery of the chassis for the new pumper ordered in 2022 to replace our aging 1984 pumper. As a result of the delays in ordering the truck due to COVID, we purchased the pump module for \$225,000 and will purchase the chassis for \$128,000 rather than having a loan for the entire \$603,000 cost of the engine resulting in a significant savings in interest. We are anticipating the pumper to be delivered in the spring of 2025.

The members and officers of the department would like to extend an invitation to any individuals who might be interested in joining us in serving the community. We are always looking for additional dedicated volunteers to help. One does not have to fight fires to contribute to our mission. No experience is necessary and training is provided at no cost. Please feel free to call, stop by the station or visit our website at: www.avfd-ems.com.

2024 was our 55th year of serving the community and once again we would like to thank you for your continued support of Alburgh Volunteer Fire Department.

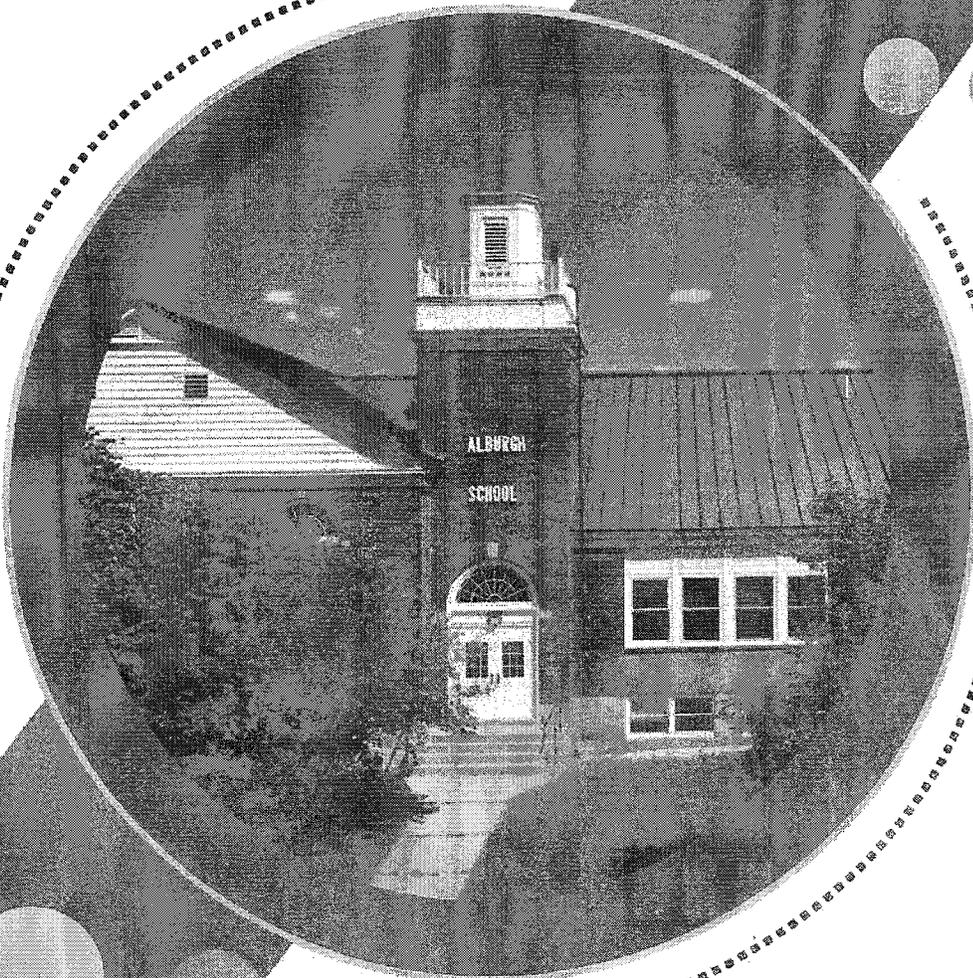

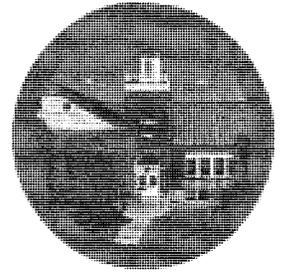

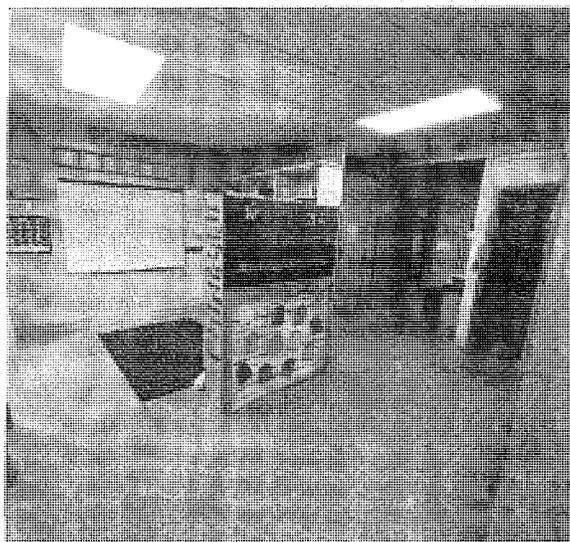

Infrastructure Enhancement and Its Impact:

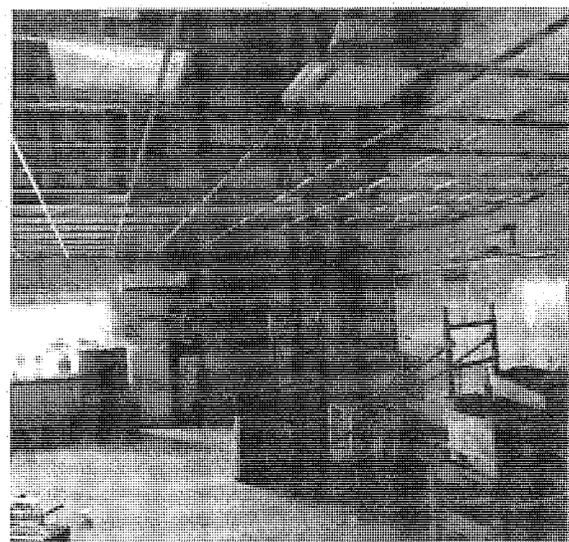

Class Sizes and School Demographics:

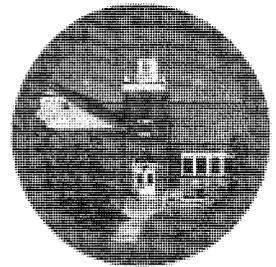

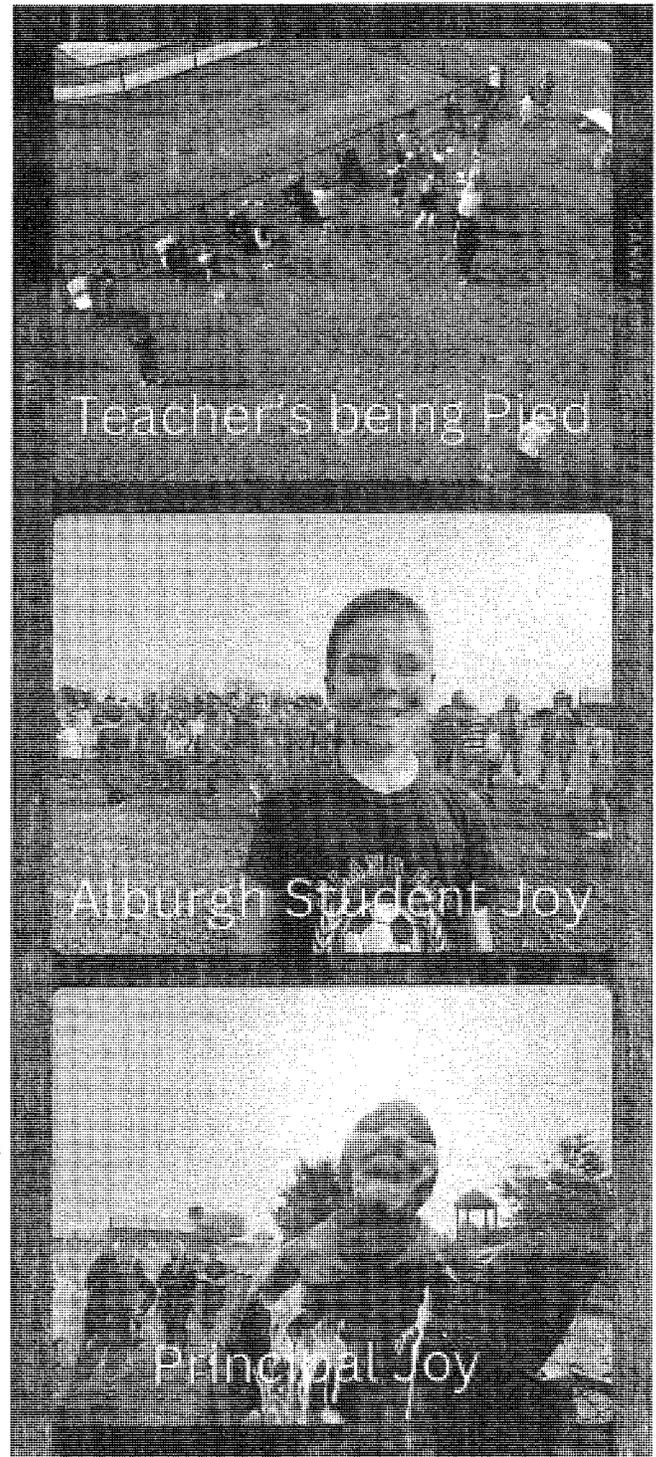

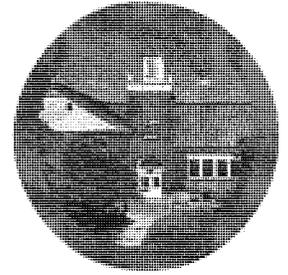
The Alburgh School has been **Awarded** by the State of Vermont for implementing Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) with fidelity.

Our PBIS team continuously analyzes data to refine our approach, ensuring its effective implementation across all grade levels.



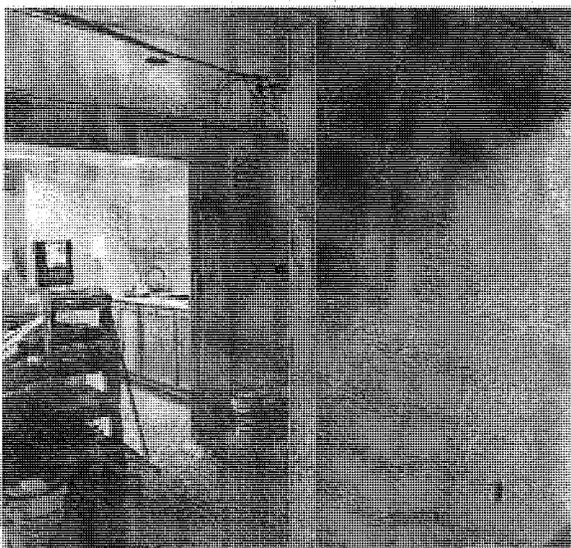

2023-2024 Superintendent Annual Report

The 2023-2024 School Year is off to a good start. This is the GISU's second year of using i-Ready to measure student achievement in Mathematics and English Language Arts in real time. Each of the school boards has had a presentation of the results at a local board meeting in the Fall. The presentations are available as recordings on the GISU Website in the minutes section. The very early trends are positive and we anticipate them to continue to improve with the implementation of our new Mathematics program Illustrative Math and the second year of implementation of our ELA program Wit and Wisdom in grades 3-8 and first year of implementation in K-2. This year the boards allowed us to pilot four early release days which have been instrumental in creating the space and time for professional development for teachers to deliver these programs.

The GISU is dealing with a deficit of approximately \$450,000 created in the FY23 School Year by the transition from a Special Education Reimbursement Model to the Special Education Census Block Grant Model. The GISU is managing to keep cash flow and the GISU Board has authorized a special assessment in FY25 to address the shortfall.

The GISU is focused on the following five goal areas:

Academic Proficiency for All

By June 2024, at least 75% of students will be proficient in ELA and Math; 100% of students will show growth, especially students belonging to historically marginalized groups.

Effective and Responsive Systems of Supports For All Students

By June of 2025, consistent, effective, and responsive systems of support are implemented across the GISU to ensure 100% of students access equitable and inclusive core instruction and the academic and social-emotional supports needed for to be curious, creative, courageous, and capable through their educational experience in GISU and beyond.

Robust Educator Support System

By 2025, increase teacher retention, preparation, and support to increase their sense of self-efficacy and ensure that our students with highest needs have the most highly qualified educators working with them.

Inclusive and Equitable Learning Environments For All

By June of 2025, GISU will ensure all educators are engaged in professional learning around issues of equity and that the GISU curriculum and calendars are designed to celebrate and honor cultures and people reflective of our local communities and a diverse and ever changing world.

Strong and Efficient Technology, Finance, and Facilities Infrastructure

By 2026, implement infrastructure and process enhancements across the operations in support of flexibility to keep pace with technological and instructional innovations in a systematic and resource sustainable way.

Each month the GISU and member boards receive an update regarding the progress towards achieving the goals in the Superintendent's written report. These reports are available to the public on the www.gisu.org website in the Board Agendas and Minutes section. Throughout the winter and spring, I will continue to hold community meetings once a month on a Wednesday evening. Community members can also reach out any time via email mclark@gisu.org or phone (802)372-6921. We hope you are finding our updated GISU Website to be much more user friendly.

While there is still much work ahead of us, I know we will do the best we can so our students have the most opportunities. The GISU learning community of teachers, support staff, administrators, students, parents, school boards, families, and community continue to do great work to ensure all members of the GISU Learning Community are curious, creative, courageous, and capable of pursuing their aspirations in a diverse and ever changing world.

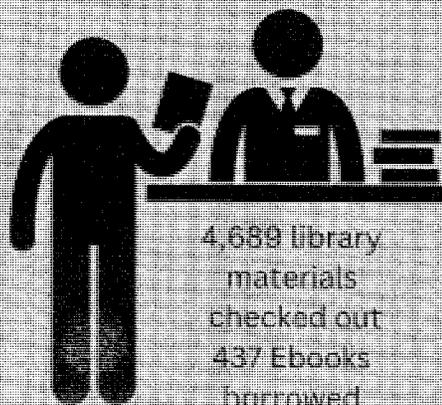

The **Alburgh Family Clubhouse (AFC) Child Care Center Project** is moving forward with strong and positive momentum. The AFC, Inc Board has secured the services of a Project Team of qualified professionals that includes Duncan Wisniewski Architecture (DWA), Capital Project Consulting, Inc (PCI), and Reeva Murphy at Heart of a Child Early Care and Learning Consultation. DWA and Heart of a Child have been with the project since the onset. Northwest Regional Planning Commission continues to actively support and advise the project as does United Way of Northwest Vermont. In 2023 and again in 2024 Lake Champlain Islands Economic Development Corporation selected AFC, Inc as its top priority project to advance economic development in the region.

Financing: AFC, Inc has secured donations and grants equaling \$1,684,344 of the estimated \$3.1 million needed to complete the project, including \$189,000 in Congressionally Directed Spending sponsored by Sen Sanders and a Community Recovery and Revitalization Program (CRRP) grant for \$500,000, just under the \$600,000 requested as 20% of the project costs. They anticipate an obligation of a \$1 million USDA RD Community Facilities Loan by February 2024. AFC has been approved for interim financing for federal reimbursable funds with North Country Credit Union, a local financial institution.

Where & When: Two and a half acres of land on Missile Base Road, valued at \$100,000, is being donated by a local benefactor and has been evaluated as a viable site for the new building. DWA has completed a design for a state-of-the-art Early Care and Education facility that will be an asset for early education, family resilience, and community vitality in Alburgh. Final transfer of the property is anticipated in January 2024. Act 250 permitting is in process. AFC and partners will be advertising a procurement for a Construction Manager in January 2024, breaking ground in late spring, and plan to open to serve children by January 2025.

A Model: AFC, Inc. will open its full-day, year-round child care center in January 2025, creating 20 new Full-time and Part-time jobs with good pay and benefits, and serving 16 infants, 10 toddlers, 18 preschoolers, and 18 afterschool children.

- Were outside with picnic option. Everyone could move freely to the music. Some events were inside in the beautiful Island Arts Center barn with intimate seating and a concert grand piano.
- Some featured cabaret-style tables for a casual, fun vibe. A Hip-Hop Dance was held in Isle La Motte, with help from Anne Jobin.
- We also co-sponsored our yearly, **free Family Evening Under the Stars** in partnership with the **Astronomical Society of Vermont** and Joe and Molly Comeau at their Orchard Hill Observatory in Alburgh.
- Island Arts offered **free classes from spring into fall**, including Tai-Chi/Qigong, Yoga, Folk Dancing. Other classes included Bird-watching, Card making, Drumming, and Meditation.

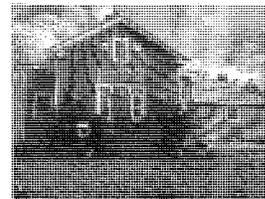

I respectfully submit the following data of law enforcement services provided by the Grand Isle County Sheriff's Department in Fiscal Year 2023. Our goal is to improve the quality of life for the residents and guests of Grand Isle County by providing community service while upholding the laws of the State of Vermont and the statutory responsibilities of the Office of Sheriff. We make every effort to build upon the trust and support the residents of Grand Isle County have placed upon us by building sincere networks in our community while offering high-quality, cost-effective law enforcement services.

In Fiscal Year 2023, the Sheriff's Department responded to 1461 calls for service. These incidents are broken down into the eight (8) categories below along with the percentage of calls for service in each group by fiscal year.

The most visible role of the Grand Isle County Sheriff's Department is the patrol division. Pro-active patrol is the first step for countless investigations involving illegal activity. Deputies not answering calls for service are pro-actively enforcing motor vehicle laws to intercept criminal activity while deterring serious traffic crashes through the enforcement of laws involving impaired driving, distracted driving, speeding and passenger safety laws. Deputies are also active within the community and in the schools teaching awareness of current public safety issues within our county. In FY2023, the Sheriff's Department pro-active approach to law enforcement documented 1330 traffic stops. **Grand Isle County has not had a traffic fatality since November 2017.**

FY2023 has been a challenging year due to the continued shortage of law enforcement nationwide to include the GICSD.

2023 Annual Report

The NWCUD dba Northwest Fiberworx was officially formed on August 3, 2020. The NWCUD is a municipal body consisting of representatives from Northwest Vermont municipalities for the purposes of building communication infrastructure.

As of January 2024, the NWCUD represents 22 Northwest municipalities: Alburgh, Bakersfield, Berkshire, Enosburgh, Fairfield, Franklin, Fairfax, Georgia, Grand Isle, Highgate, Isle la Motte, Milton, Montgomery, North Hero, Richford, Saint Albans Town, Sheldon, South Hero, Swanton, Village of Alburgh, Village of Enosburg Falls and Village of Swanton.

The mission of the NWCUD, as adopted by the Board of Representatives, is: "Leverage partnerships and procure funding to connect Northwestern Vermont via Open Access Fiber to ensure opportunity for all homes and businesses in our region."

2023 Highlights

ISP Partnership

We reached a milestone agreement with the Biddeford Internet Corporation, d/b/a Great Works Internet Vermont (GWI VT), paving the way for our communities to access a robust, reliable, and affordable fiber internet network. Under the agreement, NWCUD will construct, own, maintain, and operate an "open access" fiber optic cable network and associated equipment and facilities. GWI VT will license the network from NWCUD and deliver services.

Fiber Acquisition

We doubled our fiber optic cable supply by taking advantage of a unique opportunity from a neighboring CUD. This came at no cost to NWCUD and further prepared us for materials needed for Phase 1 of construction.

Model & Design Refinement

In preparation for Phase 1 of construction and our grant application for the VCBB Construction Grant Program, joint efforts with GWI are underway to prepare us for our next steps. A financial model/plan is currently in its final stages, and a refinement of the High-Level Design completed earlier this year is in progress. We are working quickly through these steps and anticipate construction to begin in 2024.

The NWFX model does not require any money—**\$0 (zero) dollars**—from the Member Towns and Villages (no taxpayer dollars). A CUD may not accept funds generated by taxation from a town, nor can it levy any taxes or obligate the town in any debt. The network buildout and operation will be funded via ISP lease payments, Federal and State grants, and a possible nominal “subscriber surcharge.”

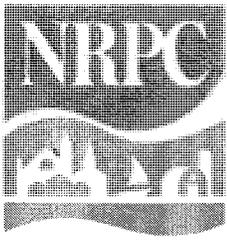

Alburgh Town Report - 2023

Northwest Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) is a multi-purpose governmental organization created by the municipalities of Franklin and Grand Isle Counties. NRPC implements a variety of projects and programs tailored to local, regional and statewide needs. All municipalities in the region are entitled to equal voting representation by two locally appointed members to the Board of Commissioners.

2023 ALBURGH TOWN PROJECTS

- Provided grant administration and project management assistance for the Alburgh Child Care Center project.
- Facilitated meetings, developed agendas, secured speakers and trainings, updated bylaws and drafted minutes for the Grand Isle County Mutual Aid Association and Regional Emergency Management Committee.
- Supported the Northwest Communications Union District, in which Alburgh is a member.
- Worked with the community and partners to determine eligible uses of local funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.
- Provided a draft Local Emergency Management Plan to the Fire Chief and EMC.
- Healthy Roots: delivered gleaned produce to Islands in the Sun and Saint Amadeus Food Shelf on a regular basis, gleaned at two farms (one which was a Healthy Roots donation plot) with the help of volunteers and a school group, provided business assistance to 1 farm. HRC hosted a group of volunteers for Ben & Jerry's Community Action Day at HRC's donation plot where tomatoes and winter squash were harvested.
- Consulted with local officials, identified projects and provided technical assistance for Municipal Roads Grants-in-Aid construction projects.
- Completed traffic counts on Truck Route and Center Bay Road.
- Assisted the Planning Commission with updating the Town Plan including data updates and developing a survey to be distributed to Town residents.
- Completed a consultation of the municipal planning program.

This year the Commission will assist our member municipalities with maximizing local, state and federal infrastructure funds, water quality project implementation, Municipal Roads General Permit compliance, local energy and climate planning, zoning bylaw modernization, emergency preparedness, brownfields redevelopment and other needed services. NRPC will help promote the Missisquoi and Lamoille Valley Rail Trails, support local farm and food businesses through its Healthy Roots Collaborative, assist the Northwest Communications Union District in expanding broadband access in the region, and coordinate Housing For All, a three-year housing development campaign. The Commission has no regulatory or taxing authority; however, each year we do request a per capita assessment in support of local and regional activities and to provide matching funds for state and federal programs.

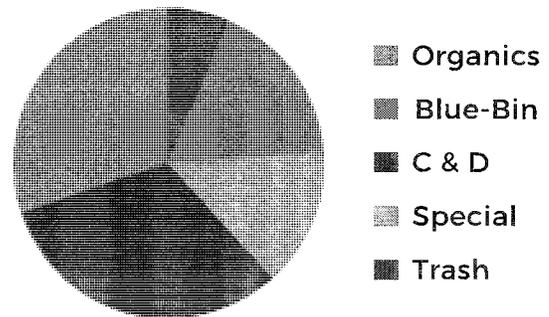

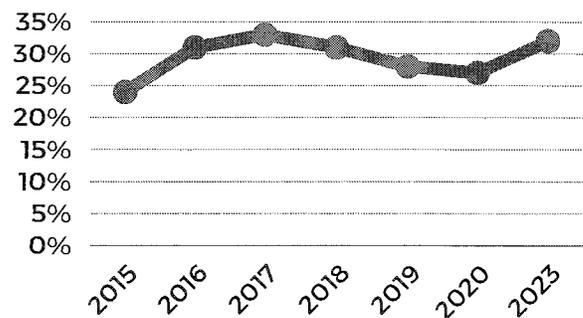
- Services used over 50,000 times

Annual Report 2023

Grand Isle County Mentoring is a school-based mentoring program, currently in its 15th year of matching community children with adults who have similar interests. Pairs meet once a week for one hour in one of our island schools at a mutually convenient time and develop a supportive relationship. During their time together, they participate in many activities on the school grounds such as games, arts and crafts, cooking and conversation. Research finds that mentoring has a powerful effect on the lives of young people and is strongly linked with improved academic, social and economic prospects. Both mentors and mentees feel more connected to their communities. In addition to the weekly meetings and annual mentor training opportunities, the program typically hosts other events such as Game Night with dinner for our mentoring pairs, a trip to ECHO Science Center in March, and a large family gathering in June to celebrate the end of the school year.

This past June, families enjoyed a slideshow, Bove's pasta dinner and a presentation of certificates for each of our mentees. We honored those mentees that were graduating from our program and the island schools. Some of those students will continue with their mentoring relationships in one of our partner community-based programs. This year kids loved going home with their coupons for free Ben and Jerry's pints and a summer day pass to Vermont State Parks.

In October, we hosted a meet and greet social hour at the North Hero House for current and potential new mentors to get to know each other and learn more about the program. We had 20 community members attend!

As of fall 2023, we have active matches in all 4 island schools with at least 8 new pairs beginning before the holidays. We invite all community members to become involved in our program by giving your time by becoming a mentor or supporting a pair by donating financially. If you have a child in your family who attends a Grand Isle County school that could benefit from a mentor, reach out to our coordinator, and see if we may have a match. Grand Isle County Mentoring employs one program coordinator who is supported by an Executive Board and a School Advisory Committee. We are partially funded through grants from both the United Way and Mentor Vermont, who ensure we operate utilizing best practices, as well as individual donations and school contributions. We are thankful to all our partnerships, mentors, school staff and community members that make this program possible.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF ALBURGH

July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023

The mission of C.I.D.E.R. is to develop and foster resources that enable the people of Grand Isle County to live in their community with dignity. C.I.D.E.R. accomplishes this by providing direct services and collaborating with other individuals and groups. C.I.D.E.R. feels a special responsibility to older adults and persons with disabilities. The values that guide C.I.D.E.R. are to be: Caring, Creative, Client Centered, Community Based, and Cost Effective. C.I.D.E.R. is a 501(c) (3) non-profit membership organization governed by an elected Board of Directors representing each of the five towns in Grand Isle County. Membership is not required to receive any services or participate in any activities or programs.

Most individual ride requests are for medical appointments or grocery shopping. During FY'23 C.I.D.E.R. provided 4,886 (a 95% increase!) trips in our staff operated vehicles driving 129,465 miles. C.I.D.E.R. volunteer drivers provided an additional 1,837 rides, driving 51,431 miles and donating 1,926 hours of their time. 274 Islanders received rides during this period.

C.I.D.E.R. (senior) Neighbor Meals program located at the Congregational Church in South Hero resumed twice a month congregate meal and continued twice weekly meal delivery. During FY23 we served 300 meals to approximately 41 older adults and persons with disabilities. We also delivered 7,336 meals to 64 individuals. C.I.D.E.R. also continued to partner with Franklin-Grand Isle Community Action to deliver a monthly bag of groceries to approximately 20 households through the "Food Shelf on Wheels". Additionally, C.I.D.E.R. has provided products monthly for the Champlain Islands Food Shelf household bags.

During FY'23, 38 older adults participated in the C.I.D.E.R. "Living Strong" strength and balance training class. This program remains a hybrid of virtual and in person. 17 individuals participated in tai chi classes which continue in-person, usually outdoors. New this year was a balance class attended by 14 participants and held once a week at Bayview Crossing. C.I.D.E.R. designed and built 22 wheelchair ramps (a record) or other similar home accessibility projects and the special needs equipment closet loaned 214 wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, shower chairs, and other items to 134 individuals and families. The C.I.D.E.R. PRESS newsletter reaches 1,450 (mostly) Grand Isle County households each month and mailed 18,636 copies in FY23.

The planned 30-unit affordable independent senior housing project "Bayview Crossing" on Carter Lane in South Hero successfully opened in October of 2023 and the C.I.D.E.R. office is now at 12 Carter Lane.

C.I.D.E.R. sincerely appreciates and depends on the large number of Grand Isle County residents who support us as volunteers, Members, and donors. We could not do what we do without you. It was a very successful first full fiscal year with C.I.D.E.R. for myself, and I've appreciated the how welcoming the community has been. It was a successful year for C.I.D.E.R. as we transition to some semblance of a return to normal, and we hope FY24 is even better!

Twelve Local Health Offices around the state are your community connection with the Vermont Department of Health. **The St Albans Local Health Office provides essential services and resources to towns in Grand Isle and Franklin counties.** Some highlights of our work in 2023 are below. Children, Youth and Families

- In 2023, our **Women, Infants & Children (WIC)** program had an average monthly participation of 1,181 participants from Grand Isle and Franklin counties.
- Our staff helped WIC families access **over \$220,000 in fruits and vegetables.**
- Our office is helping over 60 participants in our Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program **learn how to breastfeed confidently.**



Community Health and Safety

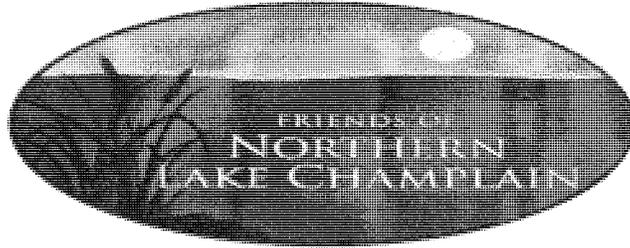
- This year, our office administered 275 vaccines. These included **vaccines for Mpox, as well as routine ones like flu, COVID, and tetanus.**
- We work closely with Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) volunteers to **provide wound care and foot checks** every Thursday at Martha's Kitchen in St. Albans.
- Our office **distributed free water test kits** to people affected by the historic summer flooding. During specific times, residents can also bring their Health Department water test kits to our office. The office will then return the kits to the State's lab.
- Our experts carefully **watch for illnesses spread by mosquitoes**, such as West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE).



Working Together

The **Abenaki Nation of Missisquoi and the St. Albans Local Health Office work together** to hold vaccination clinics. These clinics take place at the Swanton tribal offices on the last Monday of every month. During the summer of 2023, MRC volunteers started providing wound care and foot checks at these vaccination clinics.



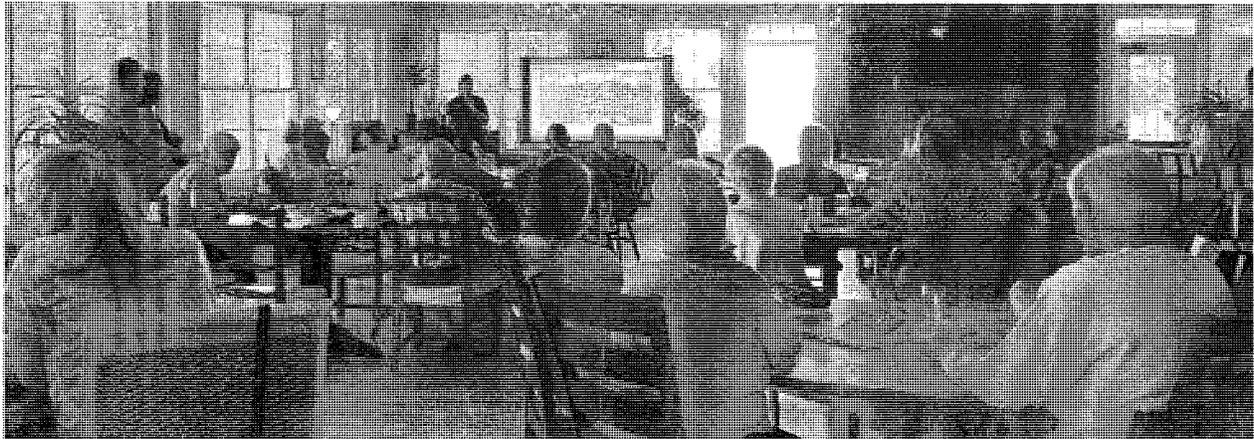


Friends of Northern Lake Champlain Annual Report 2023 www.friendsofnorthernlakechamplain.org

The Friends of Northern Lake Champlain (FNLC) is a non-profit organization that acts to clean the waters of northern Lake Champlain and its watershed by collaborating with citizens, businesses, farmers, and government in order to reduce land-use pollution.

Basin Water Quality Councils (BWQC)

FNLC has a seat and alternate on the North Direct Lake Basin Water Quality Council and will be working with the municipality to apply for Clean Water Service Provider funding on non-regulatory projects to assist the Town's implement of Stormwater Best Management Practices. Under the Watersheds United Vermont Project Identification grant, FNLC staff is seeking potential water quality improvements to be added to the ANR project tracker to be eligible for State CWIF funding. As always, we invite more project suggestions from our members and local residents.



Shoreline Socials

Last August, FNLC, with support from the Lake Champlain Basin Program invited Alburgh residents to a Shoreline Social at the Alburgh Golf Course. Representatives from Watersheds Consulting Associates, VTANR DEC Lakewise, and the Grand Isle Natural Resources Conservation District introduced shoreline residents to techniques in the ANR Bioengineering Manual to reduce erosion and shoreline damage and set up DEC Lakewise visits for interested residents.

Wind Waves and Variables Lessons

Alburgh fifth grade students attended monthly classroom presentations and went on field trips to the Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge and Isle LaMotte Goodsell Ridge Preserve. In addition to water quality improvement, a broader introduction to geology to foster an awareness of an ecosystem and how it benefits the inhabitants was presented by Kurt Valenta, Exordium.

Collaborating with Agricultural Partners

For over a decade, FNLC has been collecting water samples on the Rock River and aided in developing one of the most comprehensive datasets for an isolated watershed. In the coming year, we will report on a newly identified source of legacy phosphorus that is washing out from farm field drainage ditches.

In February, we hosted our annual producer meeting with UVM Extension and the Farmer's Watershed Alliance to bring new field techniques to local farms and to view best management practices on good conservation farms in the water basin.

Educational Fundraisers and Athletic Events

Thanks to the public for participating in FNLC's athletic and education fundraising events. We combine meeting with statewide lake leaders, legislators, state, and federal agency leaders and FNLC members in the community oriented social settings of the Bike for the Lake and the Tyler Place Family Resort Dinner Event which will be renewed next September.

TIME TO SPAY & NEUTER CATS & DOGS and LICENSE!

The VT Spay Neuter Incentive Program (VSNIP), under VT Economic Services is administered by VT Volunteer Services for Animals Humane Society (VVSA). Funded by a \$4.00 fee added to the licensing of dogs, resources are limited by the number of dogs licensed as required by law by 6 months of age. A rabies vaccination is required to license. The first vaccination can be given at 12 weeks of age. If unable to schedule an appointment with a vet office, Community Animal Aid (free to those on public assistance: 734-0259 at the E. Barre Fire Station) & Tractor Supply host monthly clinics. After vaccinating, contact your Town Clerk to license your dog. By statute, unlicensed dogs can be seized. Rabies is in Vermont and it is deadly.

Licensing identifies your dog and is proof the dog is protected in the event bitten by an animal, but would still need immediate medical attention. Vaccinations and licensing protect if they bite another animal or person, which could result in the quarantine of the animal or euthanized. If not proven by being licensed to be currently vaccinated, testing for rabies requires the brain to be examined.

For an Application for VSNIP send a Self-Addressed Stamped Envelope to: VSNIP, PO Box 104, Bridgewater, VT 05034. Note if it is for a cat, dog, or both. To print out, go to: VSNIP.Vermont.Gov. VSNIP helps income challenged Vermonters with neutering and vaccinations. If approved, you'll receive a Voucher and instructions. If not, a list of low-cost resources will be sent. Several humane societies host spay neuter clinics open to the public. Your cost for a VSNIP surgery is \$27.00, if without complications. The balance is paid by fellow Vermonters with their \$4.00 fee collected at licensing. **Veterinarians and their staff are the backbone of this important program. Thanks to their generosity and altruistic vision, Vermont no longer uses routine euthanasia as a means of population control. Sincerely thank your veterinarian for their participation in VSNIP. If not currently a participating office, please ask them to join and help make a difference in your community. They are very needed.**

Facts: Female cats as young as 4 months can become pregnant. The "mom" cat can/will become pregnant when nursing is finished. Males travel for miles to find a female in heat, often not returning. Cats and dogs (naturally) mark their territory if not neutered. Resolve Carpet Cleaner and a single moth ball in its place will help deter from repeat markings. (Do not use moth balls with young children in the house.) 70% of cats and 15% of dogs using VSNIP are reported as strays or abandoned, which is cruel and illegal. Please do promote VSNIP, helping those that cannot afford to neuter, that will otherwise reproduce over and over. Repeat litters can cause uterine infection, mammary tumors, kidney failure, etc., leading to death. "Farm" cats are especially at risk. Be wary of any seller of animals that won't allow you to see how they are kept before acquiring and want to meet in a parking lot. Animals are often used as a means of making money, and their life may be the inside a room or cage. Please be the voice for those that cannot speak. Purchasing does not 'save' one, it 'enables' those to continue to misuse animals for money. Thank you for promoting this time proven program.

Thanks to now retired Lynn Murrell, DVM, who first agreed to extend reduced rates for animals in need, and all the Veterinarians and Clinics that served for the last forty years plus. As one of twelve Regional Development Corporations in the state of Vermont, we work with a wide range of partners and organizations to create a one-stop shop for community and business needs in our region. Our current areas of focus are:

- **Fostering entrepreneurship** through networking events, online training, and resources
- **Facilitating the growth and retention of existing businesses** through business visitation, the Champlain Islands Resource Guide, regional marketing campaigns, online event calendar, and our mini-grant program
- **Encouraging outside investment in the region** through supporting municipalities in obtaining grant funding, connecting businesses to available funding, providing technical support, and familiarizing potential funders with local projects.

This past fiscal year at the LCIEDC featured the following highlights.

- Over fifty site visits of new and established businesses
- Production of a television ad campaign promoting the region and airing on WCAX, WYCI, and Mountain Channel Group
- Grant writing assistance to the towns of South Hero and North Hero resulting in \$1.8 million in funding for North Hero's Water Project and \$900k for the South Hero Wastewater Project.

- Held two legislative forums and conducted two county-wide tours of potential projects for Vermont's Federal delegation, Vermont Legislators, and state officials.
