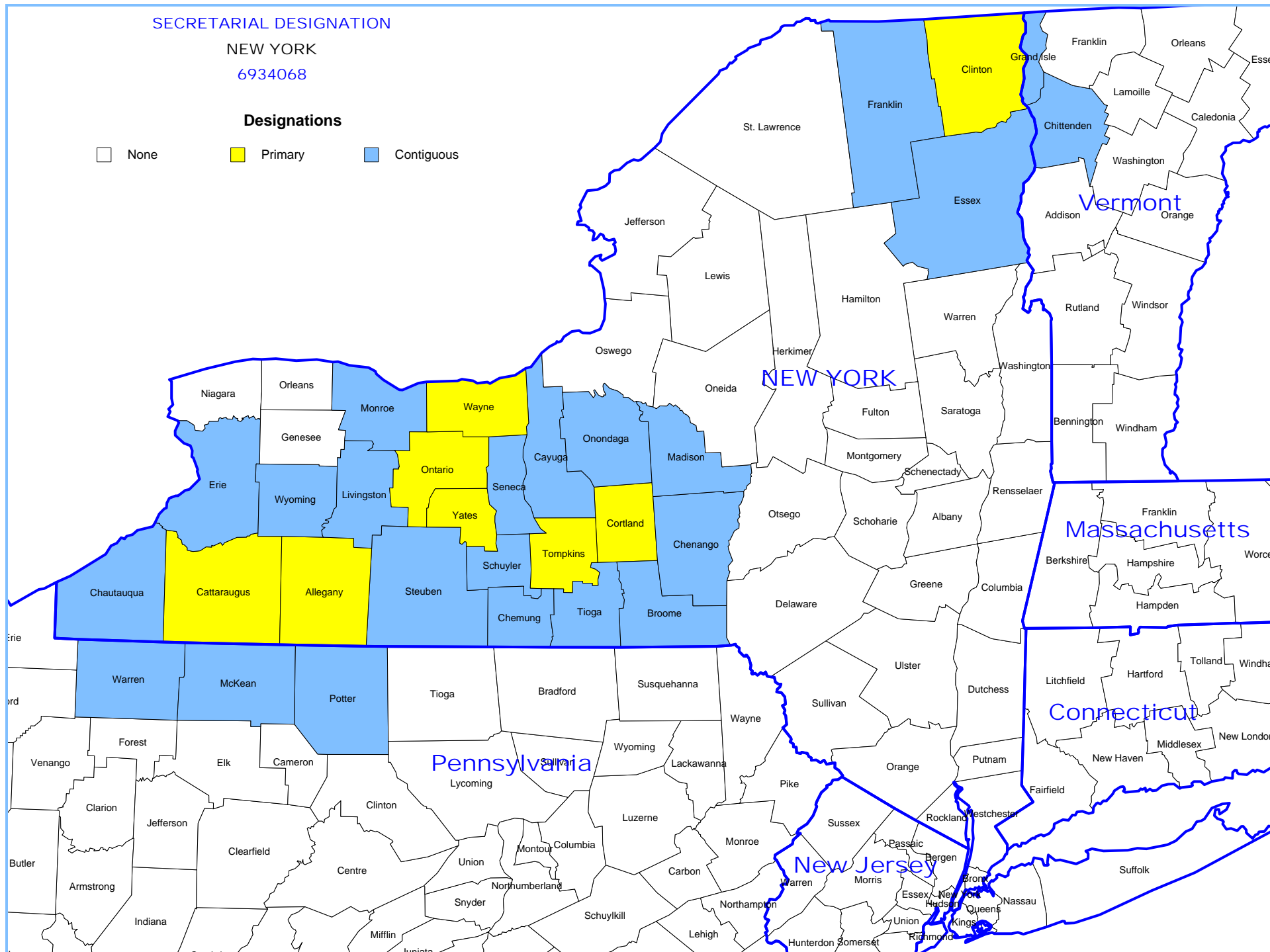

Dear Governor Cuomo:

Thank you for your letter of May 23, 2011, requesting a disaster designation for 19 New York counties due to losses caused by several weather events that began in March 2011.

The Department of Agriculture has reviewed the Loss Assessment Reports and has determined that there were sufficient production losses in eight counties to warrant a Secretarial disaster designation. Therefore, I am designating Allegany, Cattaraugus, Clinton, Cortland, Ontario, Tompkins, Wayne, and Yates Counties, New York, as primary natural disaster areas due to losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, lightning, and cooler than normal temperatures that occurred from March 1 through June 1, 2011.

In accordance with section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, additional areas of your State are named as contiguous disaster counties. Those counties are:

None of the 11 remaining counties in your request sustained a 30-percent or greater crop production loss due to this disaster. Therefore, I am unable to approve your request to designate those 11 counties as primary natural disaster areas. Those counties are:

However, Broome, Cayuga, Chemung, Chenango, Erie, Schuyler, and Seneca Counties, New York, will be eligible for Farm Service Agency (FSA) loan assistance since they are named as contiguous counties for this disaster, as indicated above.



In addition, Lewis, Niagara, Oneida, and Oswego Counties, New York, will be eligible for other FSA emergency loan assistance since they were approved by FSA Administrator on June 10, 2011, for physical losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, and lightning that occurred in April 2011. Producers have until February 10, 2012, to apply for an emergency loan. Physical losses include, but are not limited to, dead livestock and collapsed buildings.

A Secretarial disaster designation makes farm operators in both primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for assistance from the FSA, provided eligibility requirements are met. This assistance includes FSA emergency loans and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program. Farmers in eligible counties have 8 months from the date of a Secretarial disaster declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. FSA will consider each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses, security available, and repayment ability. SURE Program applications for 2011 crop losses will be accepted in 2012, when the 2011 farm revenue data required by statute becomes available.

Local FSA offices can provide affected farmers with further information.
